The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the First Day of this instant December, to promise and declare, that a Bounty of Three Pounds should be paid to every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds to every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for His Majesty's Service; and a Bounty of Twenty Shillings to all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties is near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties should continue to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant December, to the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

as follows: "The Petitioner, Lord Hood, state the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants Householders, paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, and the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster, called the Temple-Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and Precinct of the Savoy." That the Electors Petitioners delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Electors Petitioners state, that the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, in the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes, and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster, called the Temple Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and the Precinct of the Savoy." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Petitioners, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, and the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Sitting Member, the Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said City and Liberty of Westminster."
