A PROCLAMATION.

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And we do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Five Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings each Man; and all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as our Royal Bounty, in Lieu of the Bounties promised in Our Royal Pro-

clamation dated the First Day of this instant December; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Checque residing at the Ports where the Ships or Vessels on Board which such Seamen and Landmen may be appointed to serve, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen: And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen so entering themselves shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel on Board which they shall be appointed to serve: And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, and in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, a Report from the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council appointed for the Consideration of all Matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, proposing that all Ships and Vessels clearing out for the Coast of Africa for Trade, should be permitted to take on Board and export such Quantities of Gunpowder, Arms and Ammunition, as shall be necessary for their respective Voyages; His Majesty, having taken the said Report into Consideration, was pleased, with the Advice His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels clearing out for the Coast of Africa, for the Purpose of carrying on the Trade there, be permitted to take on Board, as an assorted Part of their Cargoes, as much Gunpowder and as large a Quantity of trading Guns, Pistols, Cutlasses, Flint and Lead Balls, Bars and Shot, as the Exporters shall think necessary, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th of this instant December; provided that sufficient Security be given to the Principal Officers of His Majesty's Customs of the Port in which the Ships are fitted out, and before they proceed upon their respective Voyages, in Treble the Value of the Articles exported, that the same shall be expended in Trade upon the Coast of Africa; which Security is not to be cancelled, until Proof of such Expenditure has been made by the Oath of the Captain or Master of the Ship or Vessel, in like Manner as is practised with Regard to Spirits and East India Goods used in carrying on that Trade: And His Majesty is further pleased to order, that all Ships and Vessels trading to the said Coast be allowed to take on Board, for their Defence, whatever Quantity of Carriage-Guns, Swivels and Small Arms, shall be judged proper by the respective Masters thereof; provided that no greater Quantity be taken on Board any One Ship for her Defence, than Twelve Carriage Guns and Twelve Swivels, together with One Musquet or Blunderbuss, One Pair of Pistols, and One Cutlass, for every Person of which the Ship's Company shall consist, and Ammunition in Proportion; and provided also that sufficient Security be in the like Manner given to the said Principal Officers of the Customs at the Ports where the Ships shall be fitted out, in Treble the Value of the Carriage Guns, Swivels

and Small Arms, to be taken on Board for the Defence of the Ships, to bring back the said Carriage Guns, Swivels and Small Arms, when the Voyage is completed, and to account, upon Oath, for the Expenditure of the Ammunition: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, a Report from the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council, appointed for the Consideration of all Matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, humbly submitting to His Majesty, at this Board, that it will tend greatly to the Advantage of Trade for a general Order in Council to be issued to permit and allow Salt Petre and Gunpowder to be carried Coastwise, in small Quantities, under certain Restrictions to be prescribed by the said Order; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order that Salt Petre and Gunpowder be permitted to be carried Coastwise to and from any of the Ports of this Kingdom, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th of this instant December; provided that no greater Quantity of Salt Petre and Gunpowder be shipped, or laden or carried Coastwise, at any One Time, in any One Ship or Vessel, than One Ton of Salt Petre and Fifty Barrels of Gunpowder, except such as shall be shipped, laden and carried Coastwise by Direction of the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, and Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service; and also except such as shall be shipped, laden and carried Coastwise, under Leave or Permission in that Behalf from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; and provided also that sufficient Security be first given to the proper Officers of His Majesty's Customs, in Treble the Value of the Salt Petre and Gunpowder intended to be sent Coastwise, to carry the same to the Places proposed, and none other; and that a Certificate or Certificates be produced, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which the respective Quantities of Salt Petre and Gunpowder shall be shipped, of the same having been duly landed at such Ports; in Failure of which the Bonds

to be immediately put in Suit; which Certificate or Certificates the Commissioners of the Customs are hereby required to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

ANimated with sincere Zeal; and inspired with unalterable Attachment to your Royal Person, and fully sensible of the most inestimable Advantages which we, in common with our Fellow Subjects, derive from our happy and invaluable Constitution, (the most glorious that ever existed) it is with the deepest Concern that we have observed the Attempts of wicked, desperate and designing Men, tending; by illegal Associations and seditious Writings, to inflame the Minds of your Majesty's Subjects, and totally to subvert all Order and Government whatever, we feel it our Duty to declare our utmost Abhorrence of such Proceedings, and to express our Gratitude for your Majesty's paternal Care, so eminently displayed in the Exertion of those Constitutional Measures, so wisely adopted by your Majesty, for the Maintenance of internal Tranquillity; and solemnly to assure your Majesty, that, on all Occasions, we will bear true Allegiance to your illustrious House, and with our Lives and Fortunes maintain that sacred Constitution of King, Lords and Commons, calculated so effectually to protect the Person and Property of every Subject.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Capital Burgesses of the Borough of Preston, in the County of Lancaster, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YOUR Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Capital Burgesses of the Borough of Preston, in the County of Lancaster, in Common Council assembled, again presume to renew those Professions of Loyalty and Affection to your Majesty, which, upon a recent Occasion, they laid before the Throne, and to acknowledge, with the warmest Sense of Gratitude, your Majesty's Vigilance and Care in the Preservation and Protection of our excellent Constitution of Government by your late wife and well-timed Measures; a Constitution the most approved in Theory by the Voice of Anti-

That the Declaration and Resolution of the 4th Day of December (of which the following is a Copy) be subscribed by every Person, previous to his being admitted a Member:

"We, the undersigned, animated with a just Sense of the peculiar Blessings and Privileges we in common enjoy with all other the Subjects of these Realms; and taking into our Consideration the alarming Symptoms of those dangerous Doctrines that are attempted to be introduced under the most fallacious Colours, have resolved to associate, for the express Purpose of assisting the Civil Power; and do bind ourselves to each other in the most solemn Manner, that we will not desert the Principle on which alone we have joined together, that of supporting the happy Constitution of this Country as by Law established."

That every Person, upon his Admission, shall pay the Sum of One Guinea to the Treasurer.
