A PROCLAMATION,  
*For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.*

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And we do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Five Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings each Man; and all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as our Royal Bounty, in Lieu of the Bounties promised in Our Royal Pro-

clamation dated the First Day of this instant December; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Checque residing at the Ports where the Ships or Vessels on Board which such Seamen and Landmen may be appointed to serve, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen: And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen so entering themselves shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel on Board which they shall be appointed to serve: And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentysixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, and in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ire-

land, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-three, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there; and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

The humble Address of the Bailiff, Jurats, Town-Clerk, Freemen and Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Seaford, in the County of Sussex.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bailiff, Jurats, Town-Clerk, Freemen and Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Seaford, beg Leave to join the general Voice of the Nation, in approaching the Throne with Sentiments of sincere and inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person, Family and Government; and expressing our Gratitude for the many Blessings we now enjoy; and the firm Confidence we entertain that by your Majesty's constant Exertions for the Happiness of your People, the Tranquillity of this our native Country will long continue uninterrupted.

FEELING it to be an incontrovertible Truth, that the End of Civil Government is the Protection and Happiness of those who are placed under it's Care, and having no less our own Experience than the History of past Ages to bear Testimony to the superior Excellence of the British Constitution, we should esteem ourselves inexcusable if, at this Moment of Alarm and Disquiet, we should neglect to give your Majesty fresh Assurances of our warm and inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government.

In Proportion to our Conviction that this Kingdom far excels all others in the general Form of it's Civil Polity, and in the Enjoyment of every Blessing which can result from legal Subordination, our Surprise and Indignation are excited by the daring and wicked Attempts, which have been so industriously and repeatedly made, for the Purposes of infecting the Minds of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, seducing them from their Allegiance, and rendering them the dreadful Instruments of destroying their own and the Nation's Happiness, at the Expence of every social and sacred Obligation.

Under these Circumstances, we cannot but admire and approve your Majesty's paternal Regard for the Welfare of your People, which has been so recently exhibited in the Exertion of those Constitutional Powers, with which your Majesty is vested, for the Preservation of Peace and good Order; and we pledge ourselves to co-operate with these most salutary Intentions of your Majesty, by using every proper Means to restrain and punish that licentious and disorderly Spirit, which has been so artfully raised and fomented by the Enemies to your Majesty's Government.

In full Confidence that there is sufficient Energy in the Laws and Constitution of this Country to defeat every Attempt, both of it's foreign and internal Foes, to disturb it's Peace and interrupt it's Prosperity, we fervently beseech the Great Ruler of all Events to grant such Wisdom to your Majesty's Counsels, and such Efficacy to your Majesty's just Administration, as will secure to us a lasting Possession of those Advantages and Blessings, which we now so eminently enjoy.

That the Right Honourable Viscount Middleton, the Honourable William Brodrick, and Charles Townshend, Esquire, on the 17th Day of December last, presented their Petition to this House, stating the said Right of Election, as reported by the said Select Committee, and that the Petitioners were not satisfied with the said Resolution; and that they were desirous to be admitted Parties to oppose the said Right of Election, and to have the Benefit of the Statute in that Behalf made and provided; that the Petitioners humbly insist that the Right of Election, as declared by the said Select Committee, is the true and lawful Right of Election for the said Borough of Ludgershall; and therefore pray that they may be admitted as Parties to defend such Right of Election, so reported to the House as aforesaid, and that they may have such further and other Relief as to the Wisdom of the House shall seem meet. I do hereby give Notice, that the House has appointed Thursday the 7th Day of February next, at the same Time that the Petition of the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Middleton, the Honourable William Brodrick and Charles Townshend, Esquire, Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Ludgershall in the County of Wilts is ordered to be considered, to take the said Petition into Consideration. **J**OHN Smyth and William Sotheron, Esquires, having this Day presented their Petition to the House of Commons, setting forth, that upon the Ninth Day of March, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-one, the Select Committee who were appointed to try and determine the Merits of a Petition of Charles Mellish and John Anstruther, Esquires, and also the Petition of several other Persons, Freeholders of Burgage Tenure within

the Borough of Pontefract, and as such claiming to be Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough, severally complaining of an undue Election and Return for the said Borough, reported to this House, that it appeared to the said Select Committee that the Merits of the Petitions did wholly depend upon the Right of Election, and that therefore the said Committee had required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the said Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended: That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the said Charles Mellish and John Anstruther, and the said other Persons, delivered in a Statement respecting the Right of Election for the said Borough, as follows: "That the Right of Election for Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Pontefract, in the County of York, is in Persons having, within the said Borough, a Freehold of Burgage Tenure, paying a Burgage Rent." That the Counsel for the Sitting Members, the said John Smith and William Sotheron, Esquires, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Sitting Members state the Right of Election for the Borough of Pontefract to be in the Inhabitants Householders Resiants." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the said several Petitioners, the said Select Committee reported, that they had determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the Borough of Pontefract, in the County of York." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Sitting Members, the said Select Committee reported, that they had determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is the Right of Election for the said Borough of Pontefract." That John Walsh, Esquire, pretending to be an Elector of Representatives to serve in Parliament for the said Borough of Pontefract, having, on the 15th Day of December last, presented his Petition to the House, to prevent the said Judgment of the said Select Committee from becoming final and conclusive, praying, that he might be admitted as a Party, according to the Form of the Statute in that Case made and provided, to oppose that Right of Election in Favour of which the said Select Committee had reported, as above set forth; and that he might have such further and other Relief in the Premises as to this House shall seem meet, and the Nature of his Case might require; and the Petitioners humbly insisting, that the Right of Election, which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, is the antient and true Right of Election for the said Borough of Pontefract, therefore pray, that they may be admitted as Parties to defend such Right of Election, so reported to the House as aforesaid, according to the Form of the said Statute, and that they may have such further and other Relief as the House shall seem meet, and as the Nature of their Case may require. **W**HEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

**SECTION XVII.** And whereas great Losses and Inconveniencies have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

**SECTION XVIII.** Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

**SECTION XX.** And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

**SECTION XXII.** Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Department severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
