The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of Council respecting the Exportation of Wheat and Wheat Flour; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, and for making further Provisions relative thereto; and also for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit and Potatoes; and to permit the Importation of Corn, Meal or Flour on the Low Duties;" His Majesty is authorized, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, until the End of the present Session of Parliament, to permit generally, for a limited Time, the Importation of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, subject to either of the Low Duties specified in the Table D, in the Act passed in the 31st Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported;" and in like Manner to recall such Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: His Majesty doth there-

fore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers vested in him by the first above recited Act, hereby order, that it shall be lawful, during the Space of Four Months from the Date of this Order in Council, to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Rye and Rye-Meal, at the lowest Duty specified in the said Table D, in the said Act passed in the 31st Year of His Majesty's Reign: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be

made and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-three, shall be of any Force or Effect; And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or

Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there; having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

to carry the said Bread, Flour and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty;

The humble Address of the Mayor, Justices, Aldermen, Burgeses; and other Inhabitants of the Borough of St. Ive's, in the County of Cornwall.

Most Gracious Sovereign;

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Justices, Aldermen, Burgeses, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of St. Ive's, in the County of Cornwall, cannot observe, without the greatest Regret, the Designs of ill-minded Men to subvert our happy Constitution: We had hoped that your Majesty's Royal Proclamation, and the Addresses from all Ranks and Degrees of your Majesty's Subjects, would have rendered your further Interference unnecessary. We cannot help repeating, on this Occasion, our warmest Veneration for your Majesty's Person; Family and Government, and that we will, to the utmost of our Power; defend the same with our Lives and Properties.

St. Ive's, January 1, 1793:

The following Address has been presented to the King by Lord William Gordon, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bedchamber in Waiting; Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy; Freeholders, Farmers, and other Inhabitants of the Town of Horsham and the Neighbourhood thereof.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WHEN your Majesty was pleased, out of your paternal Goodness, to issue a Proclamation for the Suppression of all wicked and seditious Writings and Correspondences with Foreign Powers, which were then dispersing through and carrying on in this Kingdom, and which could only be intended to overturn our happy Constitution; and when we saw your Majesty's faithful Subjects express their Loyalty and Thanks to your Majesty for such your great Attention; we were in hopes all such infamous Practices would have ceased; but, instead thereof, we were extremely sorry to find that such wicked and seditious Writings increased, Associations were formed, and Correspondences still carried on to such a Length, that made it necessary for your Majesty to call out your Militia, and summons your Parliament to meet at an earlier Period than was otherwise intended; we then thought it necessary, and accordingly signed a Declaration that we would, to the utmost of our Power, suppress all such seditious and treasonable Writings and Associations, and at all Times support your Majesty and our happy and glorious Constitution, and the Magistrates, in putting the Laws in Force against all such evil-minded Persons, in every Manner and by every Means that was in our Power.

The universal Associations, Resolutions and Declarations that have been made and entered into by your

your Majesty's faithful Subjects throughout this Kingdom, leaves but little Doubt (we trust) that the Aiders and Abettors of such wicked and scandalous Proceedings will be found out and punished (as far as they can) equal to their Deserts; and that this happy, glorious, and envied Constitution will be handed down to Posterity as sacred as we have received it from our Ancestors.

We wish not for the spilling of Blood when it can be avoided; but should that daring Spirit, which has shewn itself in Foreign Parts, continue to make it necessary for your Majesty to go to War, we hope (under the Divine Providence) that such Success will attend your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land, against all your Enemies, as to compleatly prevent every Attempt in future to disturb the Peace and Prosperity of this happy Kingdom.

That your Majesty may live long, happy, and prosperous in this World, and enjoy everlasting Felicity in the World to come, is and shall be the ardent Prayers of your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects.
