*St. James's, January 15.*  
**T**HIS Day Their Majesties, with Their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, removed from Windsor to the Queen's Palace, to reside during the Winter.

*St. James's, January 18.*  
 This Day being appointed for the Celebration of the Anniversary of the Queen's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock. In the Evening there was a Ball at Court; and Illuminations and other Public Demonstrations of Joy in London and Westminster.

**W**E, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Heretors of the County, and the Magistrates and Principal Inhabitants of the Town of Inverness, thinking it the Duty of all good Men to come forward, in all Times of public Danger, with those Sentiments which announce what their Conduct will be when it shall be necessary for them to act, do declare,

That, venerating our excellent Constitution, we acknowledge with Gratitude the paternal Care with which your Majesty has watched over it; and we rely on that Care, and on the Wisdom of Parliament, for the Preservation of it.

We thank your Majesty in a particular Manner for the parental Vigilance displayed in the Speech delivered from the Throne at the Opening of the present Session of Parliament.

We feel it our Duty, in the present Crisis, to say, that we loyally acknowledge the Government of this Country, as consisting of King, Lords and Commons; and we will discountenance all Doctrines derogatory thereto, and, with our Lives and Fortunes, oppose all Attempts against it.

With every Expression of affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Person, as exemplarily good in public and private Life, we wish to you, Sire, and to all the Branches of your Family, all the Blessings of Peace, Freedom, and Health, and long may you govern us.

**W**E, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Freeholders, Clergy, Commissioners of Supply, Heretors and Inhabitants of the County of Clackmanan, observing, with deep Regret, that Means have been used to excite Discontent in Parts of your Majesty's Kingdom of Great Britain, though not in the Neighbourhood of this County, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Throne in order to testify our Abhorrence of all Measures and Practices tending to create Sedition, Riots, or Tumults, and to express our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person, and to the Constitution of this Realm, as established at the Revolution, in King, Lords, and Commons, as well as our determined Purpose to sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of all and every Part of it, if ever they shall come to be in Danger, which, we trust in God, will never be the Case.

May your Majesty long continue to reign over a free, happy, and grateful People, and to dispense the Blessings we enjoy under our happy Constitution.
