WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town and Vicinity of Scarbrough in the County of York, being deeply impreffed with a lively Senfe of the ineffimable Pri-vileges enjoyed under our most excellent Constitution, do, in this public Manner, declare our Allegiance and unshaken Fidelity to your Majesty's facred Perfon, and our firm and fincere Attachment to the prefent Form of Government as by Law established within these Realms.
