Copenhagen, January 3.

By a Royal Edict of the 7th of November, 1792, the Trade with the Danish Settlements upon the Coast of Guinea is declared free to all Nations whatsoever, without Exception, trading in Foreign-built Ships, and without any Restraint respecting the Articles of Importation or of Exportation, including Negroes; it being understood, however, that these shall not be exported 'till the End of the Year 1802, conformably to the Decree of the 16th of March, 1792: And it is ordered, that, for the Maintenance of the Forts, there shall, in the mean Time, be paid for every Male or Female Negro, exported from the said Settlements, and destined for the Danish and other Colonies, the Sum of Ten Crowns Currency of Denmark. The Half of this Duty shall, however, be remitted on each Female Negro imported into the Danish West India Islands, upon the Production of the Certificate of such Female Negro having been exported from the Danish Settlements on the Coast of Guinea, and of the Duty on Exportation having been duly paid.

CHELSEA HOSPITAL.

THESE arc, by Order of the Right Honourable the Lords and others Commissioners for managing the Affairs of the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, to give Notice, that (it having been thought necessary that a further Call of the Out-Pensioners of the said Hospital should forthwith take Place, that such Call should extend to those Out-Pensioners residing in the Counties of Kent, Essex, and Surry, whose Residences in the said Counties are beyond the Distance of Twenty-five Miles from London, and who are not included in the former Call) His Majesty has been pleased to direct that the said Out-Pensioners,

so residing in the said Counties as aforesaid, (the Cavalry, Letter-Men, such as by the Hospital Books are upwards of Fifty Years of Age, those who have served Twenty-five Years in the Army previous to their Discharges, as well as all those who may be blind, or have lost their Limbs, *excepted*) do personally and regimentally appear at the said Hospital, on the respective Days as are undermentioned, and appointed for them, and when and where Attendance will be given from Nine o'Clock in the Morning till Three in the Afternoon, in order to be examined by a Board, to be held for the Purpose, of their being sent to Garrison *only*.

Notice is also given, that every Man found fit for Duty, on his Arrival at the Garrison to which he shall be sent, shall be entitled to a Bounty of One Guinea, or so much thereof as shall remain after supplying him with proper Necessaries, and that he be accounted with for his Subsistence as an Invalid for the Number of Days deemed requisite for his Journey from the Place of his Residence to his appointed Garrison; and those who, on Examination, are found unfit for Duty, are to be dismissed, with proportionate Subsistence to carry them back to their Homes.

And it is further notified, that all such of the said Out-Pensioners (*except such as are above excepted*) who shall not appear and shew themselves at the said Hospital, as is hereby directed, will be considered as otherwise provided for by Government, or dead, and will accordingly be struck off the Books of the said Hospital.
