Portsmouth, Febr. 28.

Esserday was held a Councel of War aboard the War Pight, at spirithead, where the Captains of the two Fire-ships that differred the St. Patrick, were again brought to their Tryal, and Captain Seely that was present at the Engagement, but incee poled not, was found to have been much wanting to his dury, and accordingly condemned to be flior to death ; the Tryal of the other Captain referred to another Meeting.

The same day the Bristol Fregar strived here, having in cruting on the Coasts of France; claced ashoar two Merlaking the Alarm, and coming in to their affiftance, secured

Minebead, Febr. 26. This last week were apprehended in this County ; at Stokegurfy, nine persons well horsed and armed, suspected as Highway-men, two of them upon Ex-amination consessing a Designe laid by them to have rebbed the houle of one-Mrs. Gutterell, where they hoped to meet with an easie purchase of egicar Boory, and are fince committed to the Goal at Ilcheffer, in order to their Tryal the next Affizes at Taunton Cattle.

Danezick; Feb. 19. Our latest Letters from Warsam in-form us of the removal of the King to Cracom; where he intends to continue for some time, endeavoring to appeale the disorders of his own Country, and put them into a posture to defend themselves against the Enemy, who every day are augmenting their numbers, and threatning their farther advance into the body of Polinie. Some of the Polish Companies were forced to seek their safety in Micrailbom, whither they were pursued by the Tartars and Coffacks, and the Town thrice assaulted by them, but were eath time beaten off with great flaughter, and forced to quit the place. They fell afterwards upon the City of Bar, commanded by one Prior, a Captain of Horle, who so stoutly defended it, that belides a great number of his enemies killed upon the place, be took 400 priloners, bur finding his stores too little for the number of people in the Town, he was constrained to save onelycheprincipal Officers, giving up the rest to the mercy of his Soldiers, who immediatly cut them in pieces.

Tire King hath ordered all his forces to be drawn together, which with a confiderable number of the Nobility, are already marched as far as Reuschlemberg. The lesser Nobility and Gentry of the Palatines, are also resolved to raile an Army to be commanded by a General of their own chu-

Vienna, Febr. 20. The Blates of the Lower Austria having confidered of the late Propositions made to them by his Imperial Majery, have resolved to supply him with the sam of 300000 Rixdollars, and to maintain some thousands of Soldiers upon their own expences for the Emperors lervice. And it is believed the States of the upper Austria, with the Provinces of Tyrol, Styrin, Carinthia, and Crain 3 as allo the Kingdom of Bohemia, together with Silefia and Moravia, will be easily induced to follow their example by their free offers of proportionable supplies,

The Affairs of Politud take up the thoughts of this Court,

the great Council being frequently deliberating about the fittelt means of affilting them; in order whereunto, Ten Regiments are designed to be, speedily, commanded to the Frontiers of Silesia towards Poland; and order is taken for the new clothing them at Breslaw.

We are also advised, that the King of Poland has delired the affiftance of the Swedes, which he intends to recompence with the giving up one half of Lythuania to that King, and to prevent the delign of the enemy, who Chis feater) may enter into Poland by that Countrey, His Highness the E-lector of Brandenburgh, with the Estates of Poland, Fruffia. Lythuania, and Curland, ir entred into a League for their Murnal Dierace and Affitiance, and to oppoe the enemy, if he make any attempts to paist i rough any parts of their jurildictic:

The States of the Lower Hungary are affectibled at Neuf-fol, to examine their grievances: Those of the Upper Hungary feem unwilling to make their appearance there, and diflatisfied with their procedure, which administers cause of jealousie, that they have some private design on foor, having no manifest cause of disgust given them.

A Monk lately arriving here from Constantinople, informs us, that upon the Addresses made to the Sultan by the Ambassadors from the Cossacks, they were very savorably heard, and answered; the Grand Seignior not onely granting them his protection, but promising to assist them against what force loever, with the whole power of his Empire :. And immedistely gave order to the Dukes of Wallachia and Moldavia, to fend him a particular of what forces they were able to bring into the field.

Venice, Febr. 23. Our late Letters from Candia inform us of the arrival of our Convoy, under the Command of Semitecolo; and that twelve Gallies laden with Bisket and other Provisions, were bythe Admiral of our Fleer, which is riding at Paros, sent into Candia, our Squadrons successively cruifing to intercept the provisions deligned for the succors of the Turks, and to engage feven Corfayres of Tripoly that are plying near Supienza, if they have the courage to attend

them.

The G and Visier continues Rill at Retimo, much indifposed and unable to keep the Field in person, but has given order for the strengthning of Candia, and raising a Battery near the Lagaret, to hinder the passage of our Ships for the relief of the City, against which our Forces have with some success cast up a strong Fort, to bear them from the place, and hinder the Enemy from making any nearer approaches. The Visier has received fresh Commands from the Sulvan, to employ all his Endeavours for the gaining of the Metro-polis, and is making extraordinary preparations against Spring, giving out they intend vigorously the reduction of Dalmatia, as well as Candia. The Visier has been much distatisfie twith the former proceeding of the Bassa of Canea and Candia Nuova, whole heads he has taken off, under pretence that they were wanting in their duties the last Summer, and has proceeded with the like severity against several other Officers, whom he has also put to death for exemples to others: He has always with him the Aga of the Janisaries in quality of paymaster to the Army, with great summs of money to be expended in this War, whose Counsel and Advice much sways him in all his actions of any Importance. In the mean time, the Senate here is frequently confulting about the most effectual ways and methods of carrying on the War for the defence of our Territories against the common Enemy, towards which they have earneftly sollicited all the Neigh. bouring Princes, and are much satisfied with the great A .-

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fistances lent by his Holineis, and the Encouragements given by him to other Princes, to follow his example in so pious a work, of such high Concernment to the common Interest of Christendom.

Legorn, Febr. 21. This week arrived here two French Ships from Smyrna, advising us that the Genous Ambassadour was parted from Confiantinople, intending tor Adrianople, there to delite an Audience i cm the G and Seignier, which from the Civilities already shewn them, they guess will not be a matter of much difficulty to obtain.

Here is also come in another French Basque from Scanderoon, and a French Tarran likewife from Smyrna in twenty days: By Letters from those parts, we are ac vised that seeisfaction has been required of the Exench, for the loss of Provisions put aboard; ten of their Ships which fell some time since into the hands of the Ventians, and were as the Turks apprehend, too easily given up, without opposition. The French have perisoned the Grand Seignfor to remit somewhat of the rigour of their Demands, but have received no answer that p'eales them, but are referred back again to the Grand Viller, from whom they expect but little favour.

The Sr. Bartholomew a Vessel formerly taken by the Malteles, is again restored, and returned to Constantinople, but has left behinde her above half her Goods of a very confiderable value, for which they will be obliged to make full faif-fection. They likewise tell us of the great preparations made in all parts of the Turks Dominion, for the affistance of the Grand Visier in Candia, where leveral Ships and Gallies are arrived from Tripoli, Tunk, and Algier, to tender their Service: but they also assure us, that in an attempt made by the Turks upon the City of Candia, to give them a diversion, the better to secure a Party of theirs employed in the casting upa Trench, they were so warmly entertained by the Be-sleged, that they were fored to leave their Designe in much disorder, with the loss of 600 of their Men.

Hamburg, Feb. 25. The City of Bremen is not yet fatisfied with the Ratification of the Treaty with the Sweller, but hope that such eff aual means may be used by the Mediation and Interpolition of the Assembly at Ratisbon, and. that other at Heildisheim, that no alterations may be made in their first Agreement: To which purpose they have sent their Deputies to both places, to preis el eir Concernments, and have dispatche other to Stande, to insit upon the Raisieation, in confidence wherect they were induced to dismis 22 or 1500 of their Souldiers.

From Cassell we are informed, that the Treaty of a Marriage between the Prince Royal of Denmark, and the Princels of Hesse Cassell, continues in the lame posture as formerly ; but an Ambailadour is suddenly expected from that Court, upon whose arrival some issue will be put to that Affair : but we are assured that the Duke Regert de Hoiflein Gottorf; is married to the Princis Royal of Denmark.

The Queen Christina's Royal Mascarade has been lately Danced here with infinite satisfaction, it was called The Enchanted Palace of Armide, in which the principal Actors were the Queen her felf, the Princels Charlotte de Saxenlanenberg, Midam La Landigrave, Madam La Connestable, the Princels of Mechlenberg, the Countesses of Brandenstein, Koning mark, and Ranizow, with several other great Ladies, amongst whom the Feildheres Daughter ; with these Danced, the Counts Wrangel, Koningsmark, Marshall Wurty, the Landgrave, and several other great Personages: All of them being the Evening before treated with an extraordinary Feast, and concluded the Mask with a Banquer of excellent Sweemeais.

Franksort, March 1. Yesterday the Landtgrave of Hessen Darmstatt arrived here with fis lately espouled Princels of Saxe Gotten, and went the hext Morning for Darmftatt, where they were received with extraordinary Mignificence, ten Companies of the Citizens in Arms, and in excellent Order, being drawn up on both fides the way from the City-Gate to the Palace : Before the Landtgrave marched the principal persons of the City on horse-back, led by the chief Magi-Erates, and followed by a hundred more of the Chizens, all

well mounted, with their Corner; then came an hundredof the principal young men of the City richly clad; after them followed a Troop belonging to the Landigrave, then at a little diftance ten Trumpeters with a Kettle Drum, followed by a great number of led Horses, with rich Imbroidered Saddles and Furniture; then marched the Nobility very richly habited, immediately preceding the Landtgrave, accompanied by his Brother, af er whom followed the Princes alone, drawn in a rich Charlot, and attended by the Guards on horse-back, and followed with a great Train of Cozehes, In the fame order they were afterwards conducted cut of the City, the Magistrates having first made them Prefent of

Very considerable value.

Hague, March 9. This week the States of Hollandmen to confider of the raifing the two hundred penny for the year 1668. which 'tis faid is also resolved. From Amfterdam we are told, that Monfieur de la Rocks, who commands a Squadron for the King of France, went thence on Friday last with 3 or 400 Soldiers for Denmark where the two Ships called the Great Danes and the Frederick, built there for the French service, are supposed to be reasy to fail, but want men, which they hope to be supplied with from Hamburgh, Lubeck, and other places upon the Sea Coasts, he having orders to lift what numbers he can for the service of his Fleet; and cissaid, the King of Dennate is by agreement to surnish himself 300.
