The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS divers injurious Proceedings have lately been had in France in derogation of the Honour of His Majesty's Crown, and of the just Rights of His Subjects: And whereas several unjust Seizures have been there made of the Ships and Goods of His Majesty's Subjects, contrary to the Law of Nations, and to the Faith of Treaties: And whereas the said Acts of unprovoked Hostility have been followed by an open Declaration of War against His Majesty, and His Ally the Republick of the United Provinces; His Majesty, therefore, being determined to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honour of His Crown, and for procuring Reparation and Satisfaction for His injured Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of France, so that as well His Majesty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to France, or to any Persons being Subjects of France, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of France, and bring the same

to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and to that End His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizal to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing and taking the Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to France, or to any Persons being Subjects of France, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of France; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents: And His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon, all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken,

and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels and Goods as shall belong to France, or to any Persons being Subjects of France, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of France; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents: And they are likewise to prepare, and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations, for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes aforementioned. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December last, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, That all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as His Majesty's Royal Bounty. And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties is near expiring, and it

being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties be prolonged and extended from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

IT is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that all Packet-Boats and Bye-Boats, whether British or French, employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Passengers between this Country and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, be permitted to pass and repass, as heretofore, with their respective Complements of Men, and that such French Packets or Bye-Boats as may now be within any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads of this Kingdom, into which it has been usual for such French Packets or Bye-Boats to come, be not detained, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 4th of this instant February, for preventing Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects to enter and clear out for any of the Ports of France, or for the Ports of any Country occupied by the Armies of France, and for stopping all French Ships and Vessels whatever now within, or which shall hereafter come into, any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads within the Kingdom of Great Britain, together with all Persons and Effects on Board the said Ships and Vessels. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

## STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

**H**IS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice, that the following Regulations are established by this Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1st. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers:

2d. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Clerks; not, as before, on separate Slips, but in the Numerical Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Commissioners of Stamps.

3d. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with their Numerical Books, until the final Close of each Day's Drawing.

4th. By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
