

and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels and Goods as shall belong to France, or to any Persons being Subjects of France, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of France; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents: And they are likewise to prepare, and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations, for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes aforementioned. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased; by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December last, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, That all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as His Majesty's Royal Bounty. And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties is near expiring, and it

being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties be prolonged and extended from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that all Packet-Boats and Bye-Boats, whether British or French, employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Passengers between this Country and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, be permitted to pass and repass, as heretofore, with their respective Complements of Men, and that such French Packets or Bye-Boats as may now be within any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads of this Kingdom, into which it has been usual for such French Packets or Bye-Boats to come, be not detained, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 4th of this instant February, for preventing Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects to enter and clear out for any of the Ports of France, or for the Ports of any Country occupied by the Armies of France, and for stopping all French Ships and Vessels whatever now within, or which shall hereafter come into, any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads within the Kingdom of Great Britain, together with all Persons and Effects on Board the said Ships and Vessels. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
