the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all fuch Ships, Veffels and Goods as shall belong to France, or to any Perfons being Subjects of France, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of France; and that fuch Powers and Claufes be inferted in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents : And they are likewife to prepare, and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draught of fuch Instructions as may be proper to be fent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majelly's Foreign Governments and Plantations, for their Guidance herein; as alfo another Draught of Inftructions for fuch Ships as shall be commiffignated for the Purpoles aforementioned. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed; by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date-the Twenty-fixth Day of December lafl, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, net above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who foould, on or before the Twentyeighth Day of February then following, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Licutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Veflels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy : And whereas His Majefty was also graciously pleafed, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, That all Ablebodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themselves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as His Majefty's Royal Bounty. And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties is near expiring, and it

T is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that all Packet-Boats and Bye-Boats, whether British or French, employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Paffengers between this Country and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, be permitted to pais and repais, as heretofore, with their respective Complements of Men, and that fuch French Packets or Bye-Boats as may now be within any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads of this Kingdom, into which it has been ufual for fuch French Packets or Bye-Boats to come, be notdetained, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 4th of this Instant February, for preventing Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majefty's Subjects to enter and clear out for any of the Ports of France, or for the Ports of any Country occupied by the Armies of France, and for flopping all French Ships and Veffels whatever now within, or which shall hereafter come into, any of the Ports, Harbours or Roads within the Kingdom of Great Britain, together with all Perfons and Effects on Board the faid Ships and Veffels. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commillioners of His Majefly's Treafury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
