A PROCLAMATION,

For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States, and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries: And further, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We ex-

pect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And We do hereby further promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on Board Our Ships, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April next, by any of Our Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of Our Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, Chatham, Sheerness, Portsmouth or Plymouth, or the Naval Officers at Harwich or Deal respectively; and (where there are no Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officers) by the Collector or proper Officer of Our Customs at the Port which may be nearest to the Place where such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken, out of the Money in his Hands, or to be furnished to him for that Purpose by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, upon a Certificate being produced to the said

said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Clerks of the Cheque, Naval Officers, Collectors or proper Officers of the Customs, respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer who may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service, and the Amount of all Payments so to be made by the Collectors or proper Officers of Our Customs to be reimbursed to them by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, as heretofore, upon authentic Accounts thereof being transmitted to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy by such Collectors or proper Officers of Our Customs.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Sixteenth Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, and in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

G O D Save the K I N G.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 16th of February, 1793,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared, that all Soldiers who may have deserted His Majesty's Service before the 1st of this instant February, shall receive His Majesty's Pardon for such Offence or Offences of Desertion, on Condition that they join the Regiment in which they last served on or before the 30th Day of April next ensuing; and in case the Regiment in which they last served shall not be within this Kingdom, such Deserters are then to surrender themselves to any other Regiment of His Majesty's Regular Forces, to serve therein, and be accordingly entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon. And in case any such Deserters have been committed for safe Custody to the several Gaols or Prisons belonging to the Counties, Towns, or Places where such Deserters have been found or apprehended, to the End that they might be proceeded against according to Law; and the Names of such Deserters shall have been from Time to Time transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, pursuant to the Provisions of the Acts of Parliament made for punishing Mutiny and Desertion now in Force; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, that all and every Gaoler and Gaolers, Keeper and Keepers of any Gaol, House of Correction, or Prison, where any such Deserter or Deserters is or are in Custody, shall discharge him or them forthwith, without Fee or Reward, upon receiving a Certificate or Certificates, under the Hand of His Majesty's Secretary at War

for the Time being, that the Name or Names of such Deserter or Deserters do appear to him to have been transmitted to the War-Office, pursuant to the Provisions of any of the said Acts: And His Majesty doth hereby further order and require every such Gaoler or Keeper, within the Space of Seven Days after receiving any such Certificate as aforesaid, to make a Return to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being of what such Gaoler or Keeper shall have done in pursuance of such Certificate, and of this His Majesty's Order in Council: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to discharge any Person or Persons, so in Custody for any such Offence of Desertion, who shall have been lawfully committed or detained in the Custody of any such Gaoler or Keeper, for any Crime, Cause or Matter other than such Offence or Offences of Desertion.

This Day the Right Honorable Sir James Sanderson, Knt. Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty, (being introduced by the Right Honorable Lord Herbert, Vice-Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household) with the following Address, which was read by Sir John William Rose, Knt. Recorder.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WEB, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to renew our most solemn Assurances of firm Allegiance to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, and of Attachment to the Constitution of these Kingdoms as by Law established.

Deeply impressed with Sentiments of Veneration for a System of Government, wisely framed to perpetuate the Prosperity and Happiness of every individual Subject to it's Authority, and in consequence secure by it's Protection, great must have been our Concern at the late nefarious and daring Strides of desperate and wicked Men towards the Subversion of the Peace and Order of Civil Society, who, with the blackest Ingratitude, were availing themselves of the Freedom and Privileges of this highly favoured Land to compass it's Destruction.

With increased Indignation we were bound to deplore that, to attain this treasonable Purpose, they had dared, in open Concert with Persons in the executive Government of France, to offer their Principles and Proceedings as a Subject of Admiration to a free, loyal and happy People.

To what fatal Events the mischievous and obdurate Councils of that unhappy Country have led, the Page of History, darkened with the foulest Deed that ever excited Horror in the human Heart, will but too faithfully record; and the late dreadful Instance of their sanguinary Malice will be remembered as long as persecuted Virtue shall deserve the Pity, and deliberate Cruelty the Execration of Mankind.

The paternal Regard for the Peace and Welfare of your People, which induced your Majesty to embody the Militia, and convene your Parliament at a most important Conjunction; cannot but warm every loyal Breast with Sentiments of the most lively Gratitude; and we can with Confidence assure your Majesty, that it is the united Voice of your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London, when we declare, that being sensible of the Necessity of vigorously opposing the Perfidy, Ambition and Aggrandizement of France, now evinced by her Declaration of War and Commencement of Hostilities against this Country, in order to maintain the Security and Honor of your Majesty's Crown, and to preserve inviolate the Constitution of these Realms, the sacred Source, under Providence, of all our Blessings, we are ready to sacrifice our dearest Interests in the Defence of your Majesty's Crown and Person, and of that substantial Freedom, which the Subjects of the British Empire are conscious they enjoy.

The Assurances of the City of London, of their firm Allegiance to My Person, and of their Attachment to Our

happy Constitution, cannot but be highly acceptable to Me; and I rely with Confidence that their Attention will constantly be directed towards the Suppression and Discouragement of every Proceeding which might tend to the Subversion of the Peace and Order of Civil Society. The City of London may always depend upon My Favor and Countenance, and My constant Care not only to maintain and defend the Rights of My Crown, but to protect and encourage the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom, and to preserve inviolate the Constitution as by Law established.
