WHEREAS Attempts may be made to seduce some of Our Subjects, contrary to their Allegiance and Duty to Us, to enter on board French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or otherwise to adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea: Now We, in order that none of Our Subjects may ignorantly incur the Guilt and Penalties of such Breaches of their Allegiance and Duty, have thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby notifying and declaring, that all Persons being Our Subjects, who shall enter or serve on board any French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France; with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or who shall otherwise adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea, will thereby become liable to suffer the Pains of Death; and all other Pains and Penalties of High Treason and Piracy. And We do hereby declare Our Royal Intention and firm Resolution to proceed against all such Offenders according to Law. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentieth Day of February, 1793; in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

A PROCLAMATION,
For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States, and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary; by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever; (being our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; that forthwith they; and every of them; do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves; depart from and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries: And further, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every

every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And We do hereby further promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on Board Our Ships, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April next, by any of Our Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of Our Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-Ports, by the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, Chatham, Sheerness, Portsmouth or Plymouth, or the Naval Officers at Harwich or Deal respectively; and (where there are no Clerks of the Cheque or Naval Officers) by the Collector or proper Officer of Our Customs at the Port which may be nearest to the Place where such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken, out of the Money in his Hands, or to be furnished to him for that Purpose by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Clerks of the Cheque, Naval Officers, Collectors or proper Officers of the Customs; respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer who may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service, and the Amount of all Payments so to be made by the Collectors or proper Officers of Our Customs to be reimbursed to them by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, as heretofore, upon authentic Accounts thereof being transmitted to the

said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy by such Collectors or proper Officers of Our Customs.

IT is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that so much of the Order made at this Board on the 6th of this Instant February, as permits all Bye-Boats, whether British or French, employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Passengers between Great Britain and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, to pass and repass, as heretofore, with their respective Complements of Men, be, and the same is hereby, revoked and made void; and that no Ship or Vessel whatsoever belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects, except such as are or may be employed by His Majesty's Post-Master General, in such Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, between the Ports of Great Britain and France, or between the Ports of this Kingdom and the Ports of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, for the Purpose of conveying the Mails, and except such Ships or Vessels as are or may be employed by the Directors of the Post-Offices in France, or in the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, in such Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in consequence of any Agreement which has been or may be made for that Purpose, for conveying the Mails between the Ports of Great Britain and France, and the Countries occupied by the Armies in France, be permitted to clear out or sail for any of the Ports of France, or of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, until further Order.

And His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is hereby further pleased to order, that no Person or Persons whatever be permitted to embark on board any of the before described Ships or Vessels employed in carrying the Mails from this Kingdom to France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, or to land in this Kingdom from any of the Ships or Vessels before described, employed in bringing the Mails from France, or from the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, without such Person

Person or Persons being furnished with a Passport from One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order in Council respecting the Exportation of Wheat and Wheat Flour, for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, and for making further Provisions relative thereto; and also for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit and Potatoes, and to permit the Importation of Corn, Meal or Flour on the Low Duties;" it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, until the End of the present Session of Parliament, from Time to Time, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from Great Britain of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, Bread or Biscuit whatsoever, or of Potatoes; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until the End of this present Session of Parliament, unless His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, shall think proper in the mean Time to revoke this present Order, directly or indirectly export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain; or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Oats or Oatmeal: His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Oats or Oatmeal, which shall have been imported into this Kingdom; and warehoused in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an

Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coastwise, or the carrying out and exporting of Oats and Oatmeal, in the Manner and in the same Proportions and Quantities; and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the said last mentioned Act allowed, at such Times as Oats and Oatmeal are prohibited to be exported, by reason of the Price of Oats and Oatmeal being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the said last mentioned Act contained, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are required and imposed by the said last mentioned Act, or by any other Act now in Force in any of the Cases aforesaid: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare; and it is hereby declared, that all Soldiers who may have deserted His Majesty's Service before the 1st of this instant February, shall receive His Majesty's Pardon for such Offence or Offences of Desertion, on Condition that they join the Regiment in which they last served on or before the 30th Day of April next ensuing; and in case the Regiment in which they last served shall not be within this Kingdom, such Deserters are then to surrender themselves to any other Regiment of His Majesty's Regular Forces, to serve therein, and be accordingly entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon. And in case any such Deserters have been committed for safe Custody to the several Gaols or Prisons belonging to the Counties, Towns, or Places where such Deserters have been found or apprehended; to the End that they might be proceeded against according to Law; and the Names of such Deserters shall have been from Time to Time transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, pursuant to the Provisions of the Acts of Parliament made for punishing Mutiny and Desertion now in Force; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, that all and every Gaoler and Gaolers, Keeper and Keepers of any Gaol, House of Correction, or Prison, where any such Deserter or Deserters is or are in Custody, shall discharge him or them forthwith, without Fee or Reward.

ward, upon receiving a Certificate or Certificates, under the Hand of His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, that the Name or Names of such Defenter or Deserters do appear to him to have been transmitted to the War-Office, pursuant to the Provisions of any of the said Acts: And His Majesty doth hereby further order and require every such Gaoler or Keeper, within the Space of Seven Days after receiving any such Certificate as aforesaid, to make a Return to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being of what such Gaoler or Keeper shall have done in pursuance of such Certificate, and of this His Majesty's Order in Council: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to discharge any Person or Persons, so in Custody for any such Offence of Desertion, who shall have been lawfully committed or detained in the Custody of any such Gaoler or Keeper, for any Crime, Cause or Matter other than such Offence or Offences of Desertion.

The following Address has been presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble and unanimous Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Assistants of the City of Rochester, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Assistants of your antient City of Rochester, beg Leave humbly to address your Majesty on the present Crisis of Public Affairs.

We rejoice that the late Attempts to introduce Confusion into this Kingdom, and we are persuaded that such were made, have been rendered of no Effect by the zealous Combinations of your People, who, happy under equal Laws, and the genuine Liberty and Protection afforded to all Ranks of Men by our excellent Constitution, have united in bearing an universal and determined Testimony of their Attachment to a System which has long been, and, we trust, will long continue to be, productive of unexampled National Happiness and Prosperity.

Having failed in their secret Machinations, our Enemies, the French, are now become Aggressors in a declared War.

On this Occasion, the most important ever known in these Kingdoms, we cannot, in the first Place, but

express the very strong Indignation which we feel at the Language in which the Declaration of Hostilities is announced; it goes to separate the Interests and Cause of your Majesty from that of your People. Your Majesty's mild and paternal Government has at all Times uniformly proved that, with your Majesty, they ever have been, and still are, but one; and we are confident that the unanimous Loyalty of your whole People will conspire with us in execrating a Distinction so treacherous and ill-designed.

We do not wish to dissemble our Conviction, that the Events of War, however prosperous, must unavoidably increase the Burthens already borne by your Majesty's faithful People; but at present the Alternative is, whether, by not shrinking from the Prospect of some Addition to these, we shall be enabled to continue a free and independent People, or whether, at the certain Expence of all that we hold dear, we are to submit to be numbered among the Victims of the unprincipled Ambition and Tyranny of the French Democracy; and we do not, for a Moment, hesitate to make our Choice, but voluntarily stand forth, and without Delay entirely offer to your Majesty our Fortunes and our Lives in Defence of our Country and Constitution, thus unjustifiably attacked.

We offer our Prayers to the Almighty for Success in our just Cause, and that it may be His good Pleasure to crown your Majesty's Exertions with Victory; that He will long preserve your Majesty to your People, and the Blessings of our Constitution unimpaired to us and our Posterity.

WHEREAS His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, by an Order in Council dated the 9th Day of November, 1792, thought fit to order, and it was thereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatever should, from and after the Publication of that Order in the London Gazette, until the 1st Day of March, 1793, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Wheat or Wheat-Flour; His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, did think fit to order, and did thereby order, that nothing therein contained should extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Wheat or Wheat-Flour which should have been imported into this Kingdom and warehoused, in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty of British Corn exported;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coastwise, or the carrying out and exporting of Wheat and Wheat-Flour, in the Manner and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the said Act allowed at such Times as Wheat and Wheat-Flour are prohibited to be exported, by Reason of the Price of Wheat and Wheat-Flour being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the said Act contained, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are required and imposed by the said Act, or by any other Act now in Force in any of the Cases aforesaid. And whereas by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of Council respecting the Exportation of Wheat and Wheat-

That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Sitting Member, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is the Right of Election for the said Borough of Warwick, so far as the said Right is therein described." That the said Select Committee, having duly considered the said Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them, touching the Right of Election for the said Borough of Warwick, have determined, "That, pursuant to the last Determination of the House of Commons, the Right of Election of Burgesses to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Warwick is in such Persons only as pay to Church and Poor in the said Borough, whether Inhabitants or not." By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such

such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairmen and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discontinue the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
