A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Attempts may be made to seduce some of Our Subjects, contrary to their Allegiance and Duty to Us, to enter on board French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or otherwise to adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea: Now We, in order that none of Our Subjects may ignorantly incur the Guilt and Penalties of such Breaches of their Allegiance and Duty, have thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby notifying and declaring, that all Persons being Our Subjects, who shall enter or serve on board any French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or who shall otherwise adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea, will thereby become liable to suffer the Pains of Death, and all other Pains and Penalties of High Treason and Piracy. And We do hereby declare Our Royal Intention and firm Resolution to proceed against all such Offenders according to Law. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentieth Day of February, 1793, in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

The following Address having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Right Honourable the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Council of the City of Edinburgh, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Council of your ancient City of Edinburgh, conceive it to be our Duty to offer to your Majesty our most sincere Thanks for that Expression of your gracious Will, signified to the Nation by your late Royal Message to both Houses of Parliament; a Message which intimates that, in the same Spirit which has distinguished every Act of your Majesty's Reign, you have, in the present Emergency, taken every Step which was necessary to maintain the Honour of the British Crown, and the Rights of a brave, a loyal, and a free People.

Sensible as we are of the Blessings of Peace, which, as a Commercial Nation, it is our Interest to maintain, when it can be done consistently with Public Safety and with National Honour, we should hold ourselves unworthy of the Name of Britons, if in this alarming Crisis of imminent and common Danger, we did not rouse to a Man to repel the hostile Aggression of an Enemy, who, after tearing to Pieces every Bond of Society within her own Dominions, has raised a frantic Arm against the general Peace and Happiness of Europe; who, in Defiance of every Principle of Justice, or of moral Feeling, while

Great Britain had honorably maintained a strict Neutrality, and generously forbore to interfere in her domestic Arrangements, had openly countenanced the seditious Designs of those unworthy Men, who, insensible of the Blessings they enjoyed under this admirable Constitution, had traiterously courted the Fraternity of France, and strove to disseminate in this happy Country the same infamous Principles which had involved that Nation in Misery and Ruin.

Such is that Enemy whom the Circumstances of the Safety of our Allies, the general Peace of Europe, and at length an open Declaration of War against ourselves, now call upon us to resist with all our Force. We prepare therefore to sustain our Part in this most necessary War, as becomes a brave and an independent People. We devote ourselves with manly Zeal to the Defence of our Country, in this Hour of Danger; and we will cheerfully contribute our Lives and Fortunes, in a vigorous and patriotic Exertion to maintain the Honour of the British Arms, to support your Majesty's wise and equitable Government, and to preserve the Purity, Independence, and Stability of our glorious Constitution.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Oldham, Lancashire.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Oldham, Lancashire, highly sensible of the Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and equitable Government, humbly presume to approach the Throne with the warmest Expressions of Loyalty and Gratitude for the wise and salutary Measures adopted by your Majesty for the Suppression of those seditious and libellous Publications which have of late disgraced the Liberty of the Press.

Firmly attached to your Majesty and our glorious and happy Constitution in Church and State, it is with the deepest Regret and utter Abhorrence we see the insidious Attempts of ill-disposed Persons to disseminate those levelling Principles that have caused the horrid Scenes of Rebellion and Murder in a neighbouring Nation, and which, if introduced into this Kingdom, must inevitably deprive us of all an Englishman holds most dear; his Religion, Liberty and Laws.

At the Foot of the Throne we therefore beg Leave to offer our Lives and Fortunes, which we freely devote to the Support of your Majesty's Person and Government.

We deplore the Fate of the late unfortunate and much injured French Monarch, but while the sympathizing Tear flows from our Eyes at the Recital of his unmerited Suffering, we reflect with redoubled Pleasure on the inestimable Happiness of our own Situation, in being Subjects of a Sovereign, whose private Virtues endear him to the Hearts of all his People, as much as his public Conduct commands their Admiration and Respect.

STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

HIS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice, that the following Regulations are established by this Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1st. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers.

2d. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Clerks, not, as before, on separate Slips, but in the Numerical Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Commissioners of Stamps.

3d. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with their Numerical Books, until the final Close of each Day's Drawing.

4th. By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore,

heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
