WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged with France, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will vouchsafe a special Blessing on Our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Friday the Nineteenth Day of April next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments, which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us, and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Per-

formance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful; and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

WHEREAS Attempts may be made to seduce some of Our Subjects, contrary to their Allegiance and Duty to Us, to enter on board French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or otherwise to adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea: Now We, in order that none of Our Subjects may ignorantly incur the Guilt and Penalties of such Breaches of their Allegiance and Duty, have thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby notifying and declaring, that all Persons being Our Subjects, who shall enter or serve on board any French Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels of France, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or who shall otherwise adhere or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea, will thereby become liable to suffer the Pains of Death, and all other Pains and Penalties of High-Treason and Piracy. And We do

hereby declare Our Royal Intention and firm Resolution to proceed against all such Offenders according to Law. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentieth Day of February, 1793, in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

War-Office, February 26, 1793.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by His Order in Council, to grant His free Pardon to all Deserters from His Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 30th of April next, to the Corps from which they originally deserted; but if such Corps be not within this Kingdom, they shall then be entitled to the like Pardon, on Condition of surrendering to any other Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, or to any Recruiting Party thereof in Great Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if Able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender, and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged, unless it shall appear that such other Corps, or some Part thereof, was actually in Great Britain at the Time of their surrendering.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable at any future Time to be claimed by that in which they formerly served; Deserters from the Royal Regiment of Artillery, or Corps of Royal Military Artificers and Labourers excepted; who, if serving in other Corps, are only to be entitled to the Benefit of this Pardon upon Condition of declaring themselves Deserters from, and of returning to, the Corps under the Department of the Ordnance to which they originally belonged; and, not so declaring themselves, they shall be liable at any future

Time

Time to be claimed by the said Corps, and punished as Deserters.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Custody, His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their own Corps, or upon their being enlisted by some other Corps or Recruiting Party, according as their respective Cases may be, and in Conformity to the Conditions herein before set forth.

Any Soldier, who may have deserted since the First of this instant February, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared, that all Soldiers who may have deserted His Majesty's Service before the 1st of this instant February, shall receive His Majesty's Pardon for such Offence or Offences of Desertion, on Condition that they join the Regiment in which they last served on or before the 30th Day of April next ensuing; and in case the Regiment in which they last served shall not be within this Kingdom, such Deserters are then to surrender themselves to any other Regiment of His Majesty's Regular Forces, to serve therein, and be accordingly entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon. And in case any such Deserters have been committed for safe Custody to the several Gaols or Prisons belonging to the Counties, Towns, or Places where such Deserters have been found or apprehended, to the End that they might be proceeded against according to Law; and the Names of such Deserters shall have been from Time to Time transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, pursuant to the Provisions of the Acts of Parliament made for punishing Mutiny and Desertion now in Force; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, that all and every Gaoler and Gaolers, Keeper and Keepers of any Gaol, House of Correction, or Prison, where any such Deserter or Deserters is or are in Custody, shall discharge him or them forthwith, without Fee or Reward, upon receiving a Certificate or Certificates, under the Hand of His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, that the Name or Names of such Deserter or Deserters do appear to him to have been transmitted to the War-Office, pursuant to the Pro-

visions of any of the said Acts: And His Majesty doth hereby further order and require every such Gaoler or Keeper, within the Space of Seven Days after receiving any such Certificate as aforesaid, to make a Return to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being of what such Gaoler or Keeper shall have done in pursuance of such Certificate, and of this His Majesty's Order in Council: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to discharge any Person or Persons, so in Custody for any such Offence of Desertion, who shall have been lawfully committed or detained in the Custody of any such Gaoler or Keeper, for any Crime, Cause or Matter other than such Offence or Offences of Desertion.

IT is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that so much of the Order made at this Board on the 6th of this Instant February, as permits all Bye-Boats, whether British or French, employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Passengers between Great Britain and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, to pass and repass, as heretofore, with their respective Complements of Men, be, and the same is hereby, revoked and made void; and that no Ship or Vessel whatsoever belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects, except such as are or may be employed by His Majesty's Post-Master General, in such Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, between the Ports of Great Britain and France, or between the Ports of this Kingdom and the Ports of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, for the Purpose of conveying the Mails, and except such Ships or Vessels as are or may be employed by the Directors of the Post-Offices in France, or in the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, in such Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in consequence of any Agreement which has been or may be made for that Purpose, for conveying the Mails between the Ports of Great Britain and France, and the Countries occupied by the Armies in France, be permitted to clear out or sail for any of the Ports of France, or of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, until further Order.

And His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is hereby further pleased to order, that no Person or Persons whatever be permitted to embark on board any of the before described Ships or Vessels employed in carrying the Mails from this Kingdom

in France; or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, or to land in this Kingdom from any of the Ships or Vessels before described, employed in bringing the Mails from France, or from the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, without such Person or Persons being furnished with a Passport from One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order in Council respecting the Exportation of Wheat and Wheat Flour, for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, and for making further Provisions relative thereto; and also for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit and Potatoes, and to permit the Importation of Corn, Meal or Flour on the Low Duties;" it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, until the End of the present Session of Parliament, from Time to Time, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from Great Britain of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, Bread or Biscuit whatsoever, or of Potatoes; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until the End of this present Session of Parliament, unless His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, shall think proper in the mean Time to revoke this present Order, directly or indirectly export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Oats or Oatmeal: His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and doth hereby order,

that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Oats or Oatmeal, which shall have been imported into this Kingdom, and warehoused in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coastwise, or the carrying out and exporting of Oats and Oatmeal, in the Manner and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the said last mentioned Act allowed, at such Times as Oats and Oatmeal are prohibited to be exported, by reason of the Price of Oats and Oatmeal being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the said last mentioned Act contained, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are required and imposed by the said last mentioned Act, or by any other Act now in Force in any of the Cases aforesaid: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Borough of Great Yarmouth, in the County of Norfolk, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to renew the Assurances of our constant and inviolable Allegiance to our Sovereign, and of our unshaken Attachment to the Constitution; a Constitution, which cannot but be the more endeared to us, from the fatal Events that have taken Place in a neighbouring Country, where a wild and frantic Spirit of universal Innovation has, in the Space of a few Years, changed the Disposition, subverted the moral and religious Principles, and entirely destroyed the Happiness of a deluded People, and has at length enabled their desperate Leaders to commit the most atrocious Act of deliberate Cruelty that ever disgraced Mankind.

It is not to be wondered at, that the same Men, after having, in Breach of solemn and repeated Declarations, annexed some of the Countries, they have overrun, to their former Dominions, and obliged others, at the Point of the Sword, to accept a Constitution they disliked, should, on the most groundless Pretences, have declared War against Great Britain and the United Provinces; Guarantees of some of the Territories thus invaded and possessed, and the constant Defenders of all independent Powers, against the Aggressions and Encroachments of France.

We of this commercial Town are well aware that we may suffer severely in our Trade during the Con-

rest; but we should ill deserve the Name of Britons were private Considerations to lessen our Zeal in a Cause, where the Honor of the Crown and the Safety of the People are so materially concerned.

Impressed with these Sentiments, we shall give every Assistance in our Power to the Prosecution of of this just and necessary War; and we trust that the Wisdom of your Majesty's Measures, zealously and firmly supported by the Exertions of a free and loyal People, will stop the further Progress of a System, which aims at disturbing the Tranquillity, perverting the Principles and weakening the Foundations of all established Governments; and that the temporary Evils of War will, at a short Period, be compensated by a safe, an honorable and a lasting Peace.

By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentic Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
