**W**E, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged with France, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will vouchsafe a special Blessing on Our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Friday the Nineteenth Day of April next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments, which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us, and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Per-

formance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

**T**HIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor, and the Earl of Graham, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

*An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.*

*An Act to provide for the Families of Persons chosen by Lot to serve in the Militia of this Kingdom, and of Substitutes serving therein; and to explain and amend an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England.*

*An Act for making and maintaining a navigable Canal, from or nearly from a Place called the Saltisford, in the Parish of St. Mary, in the Borough of Warwick, into or near to the Parish of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, and to terminate at or near to a*

*certain navigable Canal in or near to the Town of Birmingham, called the Digbeth Branch of the Birmingham, and Birmingham and Fazeley Canal Navigations.*

*An Act for reviving, continuing and amending certain Acts of the Fourteenth and Thirtieth Years of King George the Second, so far as relates to repairing the Road from the North End of Wakefield Bridge to Halifax in the West Riding of the County of York.*

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Catholic Peers, Clergy, and Commoners of Great Britain.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Catholic Peers, Clergy and Commoners of your Kingdom of Great Britain, beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence, at a Time when the disastrous Events in a neighbouring Kingdom have nearly involved all Europe in the Calamities of a War, to assure your Majesty of our most loyal and unfeigned Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Crown and Dignity, to the Constitution of our Country, and of our utter Abhorrence of all Principles subversive of Order and Government, and tending to promote Anarchy and Confusion.

Deeply sensible of the manifold Blessings which we enjoy under the Clemency of your Majesty's Government, attached by new Ties of Gratitude and Affection to our Country, by the Favours which the Legislature has lately conferred on us, we have still to lament that the Delicacy of our Situation leaves us no other Means of manifesting our Zeal to your Majesty, and our Wishes to serve our Country, except the sincere Assurance that we shall ever be ready, in our respective Situations, with our Lives and Fortunes, to co-operate with our Fellow-Subjects in the Defence and Support of your Majesty's Person and the Constitution of these Realms in any Manner which your Majesty's Government shall deem expedient.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Counsellors of the City of Bath.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Counsellors of the City of Bath, in Common Council assembled, feel it a Duty incumbent on us to renew our Professions of Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, at a Moment when the unprovoked Rage of a neighbouring Nation has declared War upon both.

We observe with Concern that the Thirst of Conquest and Dominion is not confined to the Cabinet of France, but pervades the Body of that People.

We see, with just Alarm, that the avowed Principles of their internal Government, founded, as is now but too manifest, in Irreligion and Murder, leave no Security to this Country, for the Preservation of its dearest Rights against their pernicious Designs but its own Vigour and Fortitude.

WE, the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Council of the City of Glasgow, in Council assembled, beg Leave, in the present Emergency, to renew our Assurances of Loyalty to your Majesty and Attachment to the Constitution.

Sensible of the Happiness which we have enjoyed during your Majesty's mild and auspicious Reign, we have beheld with Abhorrence the Attempts of those who would wish to overturn the Government, Peace and good Order of these Kingdoms, and to substitute Anarchy and Confusion in their Stead.

*Queen's Palace, March 2.*

The Queen has been pleased to appoint Doctor Thomas Gilborne and Doctor William Heberden, jun. to be Her Majesty's Physicians in Extraordinary.

*Turin, February 16.*

Intelligence has been received here, that on the 27th of January the French Squadron in the Gulph of Cagliari, consisting of 20 or 21 Ships, of which Four were Bomb Vessels, and Seven Ships of the Line, having approached the City of Cagliari, began to bombard it, and were answered by a brisk Firing of red hot Balls. This Attack was continued for Three Days, when the Ships retired out of the Reach of the Cannon, but without quitting the Gulph. Several of the Ships were damaged in their Masts and Rigging, and One was set on Fire by a red hot Ball, but by the timely Assistance of the others the Fire was extinguished. The Bombs produced no Effect but upon the Suburbs below the City, and only five Men were killed. During the Cannonading the French attempted to land in several Places to procure Provisions, but they were every where repulsed by the Militia, and lost upwards of 500 Men.

*Aranjuez, February 18.*

On Thursday last M. Bourgoing, the French Chargé d'Affaires at this Court, left Madrid on his Return to Paris by the Way of Barcelona.

*Hague, March 2.*

His Royal Highness the Duke of York arrived here on Wednesday Evening, and the Ships and Transports, with the Brigade of Guards, arrived at Helvoet Yesterday at Five o'Clock, perfectly safe and well.

Breda has surrendered by Capitulation: The Garrison marched out on the 25th Ultimo, with their Arms and Field Pieces, towards the Garrisons of Heusden, Bois le Duc, &c. under an explicit Condition to be at Liberty to serve during the War.

*Hague, March 4.*

An Account has been received here of the Austrian Army under General Clairfait having passed the Roer on the Night of the 28th Ultimo, and repulsed the French Army, as well on the Side of Duren as on that of Juliers, and compelled them to retreat beyond Aldenhaven, with the Loss on the Side of the French of 2000 Men killed, wounded or taken Prisoners, 12 Pieces of Cannon, 13 Ammunition Wagons, and the Military Chest. On the following Day His Royal Highness the Archduke attacked several French Batteries, and took Nine Pieces of Cannon.

*Hague, March 5.*

An Officer arrived here this Evening with an Account of the Capitulation of Gertruydenburg, after Three Days Bombardment, on the same Conditions as those given at Breda. The Garrison, consisting of a Swiss Regiment and 160 Cavalry, is to evacuate the Town Tomorrow, with the Cannon of the Battalions, all the Horses, and to march to Bois le Duc.

*Hague, March 6.*

An Officer is just arrived from the Prince of Hesse at Maestricht with Intelligence, that on the 3d Instant the Prince de Saxe Cobourg obtained a most compleat Victory over the French, chasing them out of Aix la Chapelle as far as Liege, with a Loss, on their Part, of 4000 killed, 1600 Prisoners, and more than 20 Pieces of Cannon. On the same Day Prince Frederic of Brunfwick took some Batteries at Zwalm, killed 1300 of the French at Brugge, and took 700 Prisoners, and marched towards Ruremonde.

The French retired from before Maestricht with Precipitation, and left some Baggage and Cannon. They had thrown above 6000 Shells into the Town.

Yesterday the French retired about a League before Williamstadt, and had suspended the Firing. An Officer, who left the Place last Night, says that the brave Garrison was still under Arms, and in high Spirits.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise a Reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS** to any Person (except as is before excepted) who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid by the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.

**T**HE Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury having appointed Money for the Payment of Half-Pay to Sea-Officers from the 1st of July to the 31st of December last, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf: These are to give Notice, that the several Payments will begin to be made at the Pay-Office, by the Treasurer of the Navy, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, on the following Days, viz.

Monday the 11th and Tuesday the 12th instant, to Admirals, Captains, and their Attornies.

On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday the 13th, 14th and 15th instant, to Lieutenants and their Attornies:

And on Saturday the 16th instant, to Masters and Surgeons.

After which the List will be recalled the First and Third Wednesdays in every Month, that all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them; and not only bring with them the Affidavit required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefits of any Publick Employ, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid their Half-Pay, but also to produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths of Allegiance required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty: And in case any of the said Officers should not be able to attend themselves, but employ Attornies for that Purpose, that the said Attornies do produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

Where Officers are Abroad on Leave, their Agents are to produce attested Copies of such Leave, before the Half-Pay can be paid.

STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

**H**IS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice, that the following Regulations are established by this Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1<sup>st</sup>. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers.

2<sup>d</sup>. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Clerks, not, as before, on separate Slips, but in the Numerical Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Commissioners of Stamps.

3<sup>d</sup>. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with their Numerical Books, until the final Close of each Day's Drawing.

4<sup>th</sup>. By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietors of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
