THE following Addreffes have been prefented to the King: Which Addreffes His Majesty was pleafed to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Provoft, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Aberdeen, in Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majefty's moft dutiful and loyal Subjefts, the Provoft, Magiftrates, and Council of the City of Aberdeen, humbly beg Leave to exprefs to your Majefty our grateful Senie of your paternal Care and Attention to the permanent Intereft of your faithful People, in taking fuch timely Steps as Circumftances have rendered neceffary for maintaining the Honour of the Crown and the Freedom of the Nation.

Although we regret that the ineffimable Bleffings of Peace fhould fuffer any Interruption, yet when we fee an ambitious Enemy indiferiminately carrying the Ravages of War among it's furrounding Neighbours, making hoftile and unprovoked Attacks on your Majefty, your Subjects, and your Allies; when we have feen that perfidious Nation openly correfponding with and countenancing fome of your Majefty's Subjects in their feditious Attempts to diffeminate the moft pernicious. Principles, tending not only to corrupt the Morals of the People, but to fap the Foundation of our happy Conftitution; and when we have every Reafon to believe that it chearfully affords Shelter and Protection to fuch of your Majefty's Subjects as have rendered themfelves obnoxious to the mild Laws of this free and happy Country, we cannot forbear to teffify, in the moft explicit Manner, our Sentiments of the Meafures that have been taken to avert the impending Dangers. We therefore declare not only our moft cordial Approbation of thefe Meafures, but our determined Refolution to fupport them to the utnoft of our Power. And we devoutly fupplicate Almighty God, that

your Majefty's Councils may be directed with fuch Wifdom and Prudence, and that your Arms may be crowned with fuch Succefs, as may fpeedily reftore Peace to this Commercial Country, a Bleffing which we effect effectial to it's Happinefs and Profperity.

Signed in Name and Prefence, and by Appointment of the Magistrates and Town Council of Aberdeen, in Council convened, and the Common City Seal affixed hereto, at Aberdeen, the 4th Day of March, in the Year 1793, by
