THE following Address has been presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Borough of Queensferry.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Council of your Borough of Queensferry, humbly approach your Majesty with our most sincere Thanks for your Royal Message to both Houses of Parliament; a Message in which your Majesty has been pleased to announce that, in the present Emergency of Public Affairs, you have taken every necessary Step to maintain the Honour of the Nation and the Rights of a free and loyal People. Although we consider Peace as the most valuable of Blessings, as it is the State in which Men would wish to live with one another, and as it is the State most favourable to the Interests of a Commercial Country; yet, when a neighbouring Nation, after having overturned every venerable Principle of social Order within her own Dominions, has been seen to act on Views of Aggrandizement, and has already made Aggressions hostile to the Peace and Safety of Europe; when she has held out the Arm of her Fraternity to some of our deluded, discontented Countrymen, and has boasted she would plant the Tree of Liberty in our happy Island, where it has long flourished; when she is this Moment invading the Country of our Allies, and has actually issued forth a Decree of War against ourselves; in such Circumstances of Aggression, in such a Season of Danger and Alarm, Peace, we conceive, to be inconsistent with Public Safety and National Honour.

In a War to which we are thus irresistibly driven, remembering that we are the Subjects of a King who is the Father of his People and the Citizens of a free State, we will zealously sustain the Part of a loyal People; and feeling it to be our Duty, it is our determined Resolution, to make every vigorous and patriotic Exertion to maintain the Honour of the

British Arms, to support your Majesty's mild and equitable Government, and to preserve the Purity, Independence and Stability of our glorious Constitution.

Signed in our Presence, and at our Desire, by our Chief Magistrate, at Queensferry, the 5th Day of March, 1793, the Seal of the Borough being also hereto affixed.

The Royal Family set out on Friday next for Up-

It appears, by recent Accounts received here, that  
 48 Pieces of Cannon were taken at Liege, and very  
 large Magazines of Hay, Corn, and above 40,000  
 Muskets.

Hague, March 17.

Intelligence is just received here, that the French  
 have raised the Siege of Willemstadt, evacuated  
 Klundert, and retreated towards Antwerp, after setting  
 Fire to the Village of Moerdyk, and to their own  
 Batteries, and leaving some Cannon behind them.

## STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

*H*IS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp  
 Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of  
 the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice,  
 that the following Regulations are established by this  
 Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1st. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of  
 City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to  
 take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the  
 Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers.

2d. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Clerks,  
 not, as before, on separate Slips; but in the Numerical  
 Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-  
 Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Com-  
 missioners of Stamps.

3d. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each  
 Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with  
 their

their Numerical Books, until the final Close of each Day's Drawing.

4th. By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
