Stockholm, February 26.

The Royal Family set out on Friday next for Up-
 sala, to assist at the Ceremonies of a Jubilee in Com-
 memoration of the Introduction of the Protestant
 Religion in Sweden. During the Regent's Absence
 the Duke of Ostrogothia is to have the Command of
 the Garrison at Stockholm.

Frankfort, March 9.

Konigstein surrendered to the Prussians Yesterday,
 and the late French Garrison which occupied that
 Fortrefs, consisting of about 440 Men, are arrived
 in this City.

Dort, March 15.

Intelligence has just been received from Willemstadt,
 that the Garrison made a Sally, with 45 Men only;
 that they spiked Three Eighteen-Pounders, which
 were in the Battery under the Dyke, killed 20 French-
 men, and took Nine Prisoners, without losing a single
 Man.

Hague, March 15.

It appears, by recent Accounts received here, that
 48 Pieces of Cannon were taken at Liege, and very
 large Magazines of Hay, Corn, and above 40,000
 Muskets.

Hague, March 17.

Intelligence is just received here, that the French
 have raised the Siege of Willemstadt, evacuated
 Klundert, and retreated towards Antwerp, after setting
 Fire to the Village of Moerdyk, and to their own
 Batteries, and leaving some Cannon behind them.

Whitehall, March 9, 1793.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King,
 that on the Evening of December the 25th, 1792,
 about Ten o'Clock, the Meeting House belonging to a
 Society of Protestant Dissenters, at Guilsborough in the
 County of Northampton, was discovered to be on Fire,
 and, in a few Hours, was entirely consumed; and
 that, from several Circumstances, there is Reason to
 suspect, that this Fire did not happen from Accident,
 but that the said Meeting House was wilfully and
 maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons un-
 known.

 ing to Justice the Persons concerned in setting Fire to
 the Meeting House abovementioned, is hereby pleased
 to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of
 them (except the Person who actually set Fire thereto)
 who shall discover his or Accomplice or Accomplices
 therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended
 and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is
 hereby pleased to promise a Reward of TWO
 HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person (ex-
 cept as is before excepted) who shall make such Dis-
 covery as aforesaid, to be paid by the Right Ho-
 nourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treas-
 ury, upon the Conviction of any One or more of the
 Offenders.

STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

His Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp
 Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of
 the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice,
 that the following Regulations are established by this
 Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1st. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of
 City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to
 take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the
 Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers.

2d. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Cerks,
 not, as before, on separate Slips; but in the Numerical
 Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-
 Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Com-
 missioners of Stamps.

3d. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each
 Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with
 their
