P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is requisite, in the present Conjuncture of Affairs, to prevent the Exportation of salted Provisions of all Kinds, and of Butter and Cheese, Pease, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, and Forage of any Kind, and of Hides and Leather, manufactured or unmanufactured, to the Ports of France, or of any Countries occupied by the Armies employed by the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, or any of them; it is hereby ordered, by His Majesty in Council, that an Embargo be forthwith laid upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain, with salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, and also upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheese, Pease, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatsoever, and with Hides or Leather, manufactured or unmanufactured; and that the said Embargo do continue and remain upon all such Ships and Vessels until further Order: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Embargo shall not extend to any Ship or Vessel actually retained or employed in His Majesty's Service, nor to any Ship or Vessel which shall be laden by the especial Order and under the Direction of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or the Master-General of the Ordnance, with any of the Articles above enumerated, for the Use or Sustenance of His Majesty's Fleets, Armies, Forts, and Arsenals; nor to any Ships and Vessels

having on Board no greater Quantity of any of the said Articles than shall be necessary to be carried in any such Ships or Vessels on their Voyage Out and Home for the Sustenance, Diet, and Support and Use of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others, or for the Use or Sustenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on Board of such Ships or Vessels; nor to any Ships or Vessels, being British Ships and Vessels, and navigated according to Law, which may be employed in carrying any of the Articles above mentioned to His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, or to the Islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, or to any Country, in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty, or to any of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to any of His Majesty's Forts or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that in all Cases (except Cases of Ships retained or employed in His Majesty's Service, or laden by the especial Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or the Master-General of the Ordnance, for the Use or Sustenance of His Majesty's Fleets, Armies, Forts, and Arsenals, or such Ships and Vessels having on Board no greater Quantity of any of the said Articles than is necessary for the Use and Sustenance of the Crew, Live Stock, and Cattle on Board the said Ships or Vessels, in Manner hereinbefore mentioned) the Merchant Exporter of any of the said Articles do make Oath, on the Entry of such Ships and Vessels, of the due Destination thereof to the

the Place for which such Ships and Vessels shall be entered and cleared out; and do give Security by Bond, in Treble the Value of the Articles so exported, to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port at which such Ships and Vessels shall enter and clear out, with Two other able and sufficient Sureties (of whom the Master of the Ship shall be One) to be approved of by the said Officers of the Customs, to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of such Bond, from the proper Officer of the Customs of the Port to which such Ships or Vessels shall go, or, in case such Ships or Vessels shall go to a Port where there is no such Officer, then from the British Consul resident at such Port, or, in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two British Merchants resident there, Certificates of their having delivered the Articles above enumerated at the Places for which they have been entered; and no such Bonds or Securities shall be delivered up, but on the Production of such Certificates:—And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the said Embargo shall not extend to any Ship or Vessel belonging to the Subjects of Countries in Amity with His Majesty, laden with Leather manufactured; provided that the Merchant Exporter do make Oath of the due Destination of the Ship or Vessel to the Port for which she shall be entered and cleared out, and do give the like Security, with Two other able and sufficient Sureties, being known British Merchants, or other Persons of acknowledged Credit, resident in this Kingdom, to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of such Bond, from the proper Officer of the Customs of the Port to which such Ships or Vessels shall go, or, in case such Ships or Vessels shall go to a Port where there is no such Officer, then from the British Consul resident at such Port, or, in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two British Merchants resident there, Certificates of their having delivered such manufactured Leather at the Place for which it shall have been entered; and no such Bonds or Securities shall be delivered up but on the Production of such Certificates:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PROCLAMATION

FOR

PARDONING DESERTERS.

War-Office, February 26. 1793.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His

Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by His Order in Council, to grant His free Pardon to all Deserters from His Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 30th of April next, to the Corps from which they originally deserted; but if such Corps be not within this Kingdom, they shall then be entitled to the like Pardon, on Condition of surrendering to any other Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, or to any Recruiting Party thereof in Great Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if Able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender, and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged, unless it shall appear that such other Corps, or some Part thereof, was actually in Great Britain at the Time of their surrendering.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable at any future Time to be claimed by that in which they formerly served; Deserters from the Royal Regiment of Artillery, or Corps of Royal Military Artificers and Labourers excepted; who, if serving in other Corps, are only to be entitled to the Benefit of this Pardon upon Condition of declaring themselves Deserters from, and of returning to, the Corps under the Department of the Ordnance to which they originally belonged; and, not so declaring themselves, they shall be liable at any future Time to be claimed by the said Corps, and punished as Deserters.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Custody, His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their own Corps, or upon their being enlisted by some other Corps or Recruiting Party, according as their respective Cases may be, and in Conformity to the Conditions herein before set forth.

Any Soldier, who may have deserted since the First of this instant February, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Borough of Culrofs.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council of your Majesty's ancient Borough of Culrofs, conceive it to be our Duty, at this important Crisis, most humbly to renew those Expressions of inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person and to our happy Constitution, with which we are deeply impressed, and which ought to animate the Breast and actuate the Conduct of every true Briton.

The general Tranquillity of Europe, the Safety of our Allies, our own Existence, as a free and independent Nation, are menaced by these general Enemies of the Liberties and Happiness of Mankind.

In such Circumstances we willingly renounce the Blessings of Peace, how highly soever we prize them, sensible, as we are, that to a great and gallant

People there are Considerations superior to these. With the Spirit of Britons devoted to their Sovereign and to their Country's Cause, we prepare ourselves to sustain our Part in this most just and necessary War, which your Majesty, with the Approbation of your Parliament, has now commenced; and we will cheerfully contribute our Lives and Fortunes, in a vigorous and patriotic Exertion, to maintain the Honour of the British Arms, to support your Majesty's wise and equitable Government, and to defend that glorious Constitution which our Fathers have left us, and which we trust, by the Blessing of Divine Providence, will be transmitted safe from the Attacks of every Invader, whether foreign or domestic, to our latest Posterity.

STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Feb. 12, 1793.

HIS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties think it proper, on the near Approach of the Drawing of the Lottery, to give this Publick Notice, that the following Regulations are established by this Office, for preventing ILLEGAL INSURANCE:

1st. Pursuant to a Settlement with the Committee of City Lands, no Person will be admitted at Guildhall to take down the Numbers as they are drawn but the Clerks of the licensed Lottery-Office-Keepers.

2d. The Numbers are to be taken by the said Clerks, not, as before, on separate Slips, but in the Numerical Book of each Office, signed by the respective Office-Keepers, and counter-signed by Two or more of the Commissioners of Stamps.

3d. No Account of any Part of the Drawing in each Day is to be issued, nor any of the Clerks to return with their Numerical Books, until the final Close of each Day's Drawing.

4th. By a Settlement with Mr. Steele, the Proprietor of the Patent List, the same is not to be published, as heretofore, by Slips, in each Hour, nor by an early Account of the Drawing of each Day, (both of which Communications obviously contributed to the Abuses of illegal Insurance;) but in future only Twice a Week, for the necessary Information of the Publick at large, and at such Hours as the Intelligence can be least perverted for the Abuses of unlicensed Offices, if any such shall remain. But the Commissioners trust, that, by these Regulations, and by the published Notices from the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen, as well as from the Chairman and the Magistrates for Westminster and the County of Middlesex; and likewise from the Magistrates of the Police, of a perfect Co-operation with this Office, the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries will be as totally suppressed as the Sale of illegal Chances, which is completely at an End. The insuperable Difficulties that are now opposed to the illegal Transactions, cannot fail to discourage the Continuance of unlicensed Offices; and the Evidence of the Publick, that if any such should be continued, they must proceed without authentick Intelligence of the Drawings, cannot but prevent, to a great Degree, further Confidence being reposed in the illicit Dealers; who, on their Part, by persisting in illegal Attempts, can only expose themselves, for diminished Profits, to the increased Vigilance of the Magistracy in the effectual Maintenance of the Law.
