THE General Assembly of the Province of Lower Canada met on the 17th Instant, when his Excellency Major-General Clarke, Lieutenant-Governor, opened the Session with a Speech, which, together with the Addresses to his Excellency from the Legislative Council and Assembly, and his Excellency's Answers thereto, are as follow :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

OUR most gracious Sovereign, always watchful over the Happiness of His People, having taken into Consideration the Condition of His loyal Subjects of this Province, and recommended them to His Parliament for such Change in their Colonial Government as Circumstances might require and admit, the Act was passed that has made it my Duty, as it is my Pride, to meet you in General Assembly, which I have endeavoured to do at a Season least inconvenient to your private Interests.

On a Day like this, signalized by the Commencement in this Country of that Form of Government which has raised the Kingdom, to which it is subordinate, to the highest Elevation, it is impossible not to feel Emotions difficult to be expressed.

However pleasant the Task, it cannot be a necessary one on the present Occasion to display the Fitness of this System, to promote the Felicity all Governments profess to have in View, but is under none so well established as by the British, which, after having been celebrated for Ages by the first Pens of Europe, at this Moment gives Great Britain decided and enviable Distinctions of real Glory, beyond all other Nations of the World.

What I feel on the Change that brings us to this memorable Convention, I persuade myself must be a common Sentiment with all who have Capacity to discern the Magnitude of the Blessing conferred ; and

therefore I content myself with barely suggesting, that, next to the Gratitude due for it to the Almighty Arbiter of the Universe, we cannot sufficiently extol the Magnanimity and Grace of the King, the common Father of His People, and of that Parliament who have so generously co-operated for that Establishment, which is most deservedly the Subject of our general Joy.

To give an Opportunity for your loyal and grateful Acknowledgments to His Majesty is one of my Motives for calling you together ; and that Debt discharged, your Councils will, doubtless, be next employed for enacting the Laws necessary to confirm and augment the Prosperity of your Country.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

Acquainted as you are with the Condition and Desires of the People you represent, it is from your House the Public will chiefly expect such ordinary Provision as the Common Weal may require ; and I trust that if any Measures conducive to it shall necessarily be postponed for maturer Consideration at a subsequent Session, no Regulations of indispensable Utility will escape your present Attention.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

Great Britain being happily at Peace with all the World, and, I hope, without Apprehension of it's Interruption, the present Moment must be most fit and urgent for all those Arrangements, best made at a Season of Tranquillity, and falling within the Sphere of our Trust. The Conviction I feel of your Disposition to cultivate that Harmony amongst yourselves and each Branch of the Legislature, which is always essential to the public Good and private Satisfaction, makes it unnecessary for me to enlarge upon this Subject. Such Objects, as it may become my Duty to recommend to your Consideration, shall be occasionally

tionally communicated by Message; and you may assure yourselves, Gentlemen, that feeling, as I do, peculiar Satisfaction in being placed, through His Majesty's Favor, in a Situation to forward His benevolent Intentions, I shall most cheerfully concur in every Measure advancive of the Prosperity of this Colony, and consistent with the general Interests of the Empire, which justly claims, and I am fully satisfied will ever experience your warmest Attachment and Support.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council of the Province of Lower Canada, beg Leave to return you our humble Thanks for your Speech from the Throne.

Whether our Thoughts are confined to the past and the present, or extended to the future Condition of this Country, in every View we perceive Motives to unusual Solemnity, and find ourselves embarrassed for Language to express the Sensations excited by this singular and eventful Day.

All Praise to the unerring Providence of God, which, after rending the Bands asunder that united Canada to the Power that planted it, now rescues it from the Tragedies acting upon a Theatre of Anarchy, outraging Humanity, and even to Savages a Reproach.

We confess, therefore, our grateful Acknowledgments to Heaven, that on our Discharge from that Connection we were delivered over to the Care of a Monarch, who, by making the Success of His Arms the Means of extending His Beneficence, has an uncontroversial Right to our affectionate Fidelity, and most of all for that last and greatest of the repeated Instances of His Munificence, by which we enter into a generous Participation of the Privileges and Safety of native Inhabitants of a Kingdom, distinguished for its Felicity under a political Frame of all others best calculated to enlarge and secure it. God Almighty give us the Wisdom to preserve this inestimable Treasure, and to hand it down to our latest Posterity.

After such a Declaration, made with equal Piety and Loyalty, we know not how to add stronger Assurances of the Gratitude we owe to a Sovereign, to whom we pledge ourselves in all our Councils for the Welfare of this remote Part of His Dominions, never to be unmindful of that true Test of Colonial Merit, the Abandonment of every Partiality repugnant to the general Interest of that Empire, of which it has pleased the Almighty and wise Arbiter of the World to make us a Part.

Accept our Thanks, Sir, for your friendly Recommendation to the Harmony essential to our Prosperity; and be assured of our Confidence in every Measure that can bring Credit to an Administration disposed to co-operate with the King's Grace, and the Generosity of His Parliament; with the Example of that, the most illustrious Diet of the World in our Eye, we will make it our Study to follow the Steps of that Branch of it, which we are constituted to supply in the humble Sphere of a subordinate Legislation.

His Excellency's Answer.

Gentlemen,

Accept my warmest Thanks for this Address, which is highly descriptive of the affectionate Loyalty and Gratitude that are so justly due to the best of Sovereigns,

and affords the most flattering Hope that while your Councils are directed to such Objects as may ensure the Prosperity of this Province, you will not be unmindful of the general Welfare of the British Empire.

To his Excellency Alured Clarke, Esq; Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of Lower Canada, Major-General, commanding His Majesty's Forces in North America, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Members of the House of Assembly of Lower Canada, in Assembly met, beg Leave to return you the Thanks of this House for your Excellency's Speech.

Truly sensible of the paternal Solitude of our most gracious Sovereign, in watching over the Happiness of His People, and of the Justice and Benevolence of the Parliament of Great Britain, in granting to His Majesty's loyal Subjects of this Province a new and liberal Constitution for their Colonial Government, we shall ever retain the most grateful and lively Sense of the Duties we owe to the Parent State; and we feel ourselves strongly called upon to acknowledge your Excellency's great Attention to us individually, in assembling us at a Time least inconvenient to our private Affairs, and for providing so suitable a House for our Reception.

We cannot express the Emotions which arose in our Breasts on that ever memorable Day, when we entered on the Enjoyment of a Constitution assimilated to that Form of Government which has carried the Glory of our Mother Country to the highest Elevation.

It is a very high Satisfaction to us to have an Opportunity of joining in Praise and Admiration of the System of Government of Great Britain, which gives to it so decided a Superiority and Advantage over other Nations; but how much greater is our Happiness in forming, at this Period, a Part of the Subjects of such a Government, of which we more and more feel the benign Influence.

We beg Leave to assure your Excellency that our Feelings and those of our Constituents, fully sensible of the Magnitude of the Blessings conferred by the Change that brought us to so memorable a Convention, are of the most lively Nature, and, next to our Gratitude to the Almighty Arbiter of the Universe, we cannot sufficiently extol the Magnanimity and Grace of the King, the common Father of His People, and of that Parliament which has so generously co-operated for the Establishment that is most deservedly the Subject of our general Joy.

It is an unparalleled Happiness for us to have an Opportunity of presenting to His Majesty our loyal Thanks, and of expressing to Him our Gratitude: Such Homage is the Language of our Hearts, and is due from us for all the Favours with which we have been loaded. That Duty fulfilled, we will turn our Attention, with most ardent Zeal, to forming such Laws as may tend to the Prosperity and Advantage of our Country.

Considering the Condition and Desires of the People we represent, our utmost Care shall be directed towards such ordinary Provision as the Common Weal may require; and if any Measures conducive thereto are necessarily postponed for more mature Consideration in a subsequent Session, we will at least exert our Endeavours that no Objects of indispen-
Utility

Utility may be postponed beyond the Period required for that Maturity of Reflection which their Importance may require.

We hear with Pleasure that Great Britain is at Peace with all the World; and we consider this as the most favourable Time for the Consideration of the Objects that fall within the Sphere of our Charge. To cultivate Harmony among ourselves and each Branch of the Legislature, is our most ardent Wish, convinced as we are, that it is a Condition essentially necessary to the Public Good and our own private Satisfaction.

We will at all Times give the most speedy and deliberate Consideration to such Messages as we may receive from your Excellency:

And we congratulate ourselves that it hath pleased His Majesty to place your Excellency in a Situation of forwarding His benevolent Intentions. We shall consider it our Duty to concur with your Excellency in every Measure conducive to the Prosperity of this Province, and consistent with the general Interest of the Empire.

These are the Means by which we will endeavour to evince our sincere Gratitude, and on which we found the Hope of that Support whereof we stand in Need.

This Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting for One Year the several Duties therein mentioned, in Lieu of all other Duties payable upon the Articles therein specified during the said Term, and for continuing the Effect of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, signed at Versailles on the 26th Day of September, 1786, between His Majesty and the Most Christian King; and for regulating the Trade between this Kingdom and His Majesty's Colonies; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for regulating and extending the Tobacco Trade.

An Act for securing the Payment of the Annuities and of the Interest upon the Principal Sums therein provided for, and towards the Discharge of such Principal Sums in such Manner as therein is directed; and

for enabling the Officers of His Majesty's Treasury to receive certain Sums for a limited Time in Manner therein mentioned; and for other Purposes.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, certain Duties and Rates upon the Portage and Conveyance of all Letters and Packets within this Kingdom.

An Act for regulating the Payment of Bounties on the Exportation of certain Manufactures of this Kingdom.

An Act for regulating the Allowance of the Drawback and Payment of the Bounty on the Exportation of Sugar.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters within this Kingdom.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, several Duties therein mentioned, to be levied by the Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties.

An Act for granting the several Sums therein mentioned for certain pious and charitable Purposes.

An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen and Marines employed in the Royal Navy, by rendering it more easy to Petty Officers and Seamen, Non-commissioned Officers of Marines, and Marines, to remit their Wages to this Kingdom, and by providing for the Payment in this Kingdom of Wages due to deceased Officers, Seamen and Marines, as aforesaid.

An Act for further continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for facilitating the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the United States of America.

An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Town of Castlecomer, in the County of Kilkenny, to the City of Kilkenny.

Hague, March 30.

Intelligence has been received here, that the Citadel of Namur is taken by the Austrians, and that a considerable Body of the Austrian Troops has been detached from that Place to join the Prince of Saxe-Cobourg's Army.

Ostend, March 30.

The French Troops left this Town for Dunkirk about Three o'Clock this Afternoon, and at Four, One of His Britannick Majesty's Cutters entered the Port. Most of the Prizes had failed before the Cutter arrived; the others, which were to have failed this Day, are stopped. Three English Brigs are still here, under the Care of the British Consul.

The said Mary Richardson was committed to Devoizes Bridewell on the said Charge in November last, but escaped from thence on the 24th of December.

Whoever shall apprehend the said Mary Richardson, and secure her in any of His Majesty's Goals of this Kingdom, shall be entitled to a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, to be paid on her Conviction.
