## Whitebail, Auguft 14.

THE Difpatches, of which the following are Copies; were Yelterday received at the Office of the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Maje!ty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

## S I R,

Eftreux, Auguft 6, 1793.
1 HAVE the Honor to inclofe you a Lift of the Garrifon of Valenciennes, as it ftood at the End of the Siege, with that of the Stores which were taken in the Town. It was! computed that between 6 and 7,000 . Men marched out of the Place, the reft being fick or wounded, Part of which remained in the Hofpitals, and Part followed in Waggons. The Garrifon was efeorted to the firt advanced Polts of the Enemy. Accounts have been fince received of their having retired to different Parts of the Country.

I had the Opportunity of mentioning to you, in a former Letter, that the Conduct of the Troops under the more immediate Command of His Royal Highnefs had been fuch as to merit the higheft Com: mendatica; and it would be unjuf not to obferve;
that equal Praife is due to thofe of His Imperial Majefy.

Thefe were commanded by General Count de Ferraris, an Officer of diftinguifhed Abilities, of which he furnihed ample Proofs upon this Occafion.
The Siege was conducted with great Skill and Science by Colonel Fromm, Chief Eugineer: The Artillery was under the Command of General Unterberger, and appears to have been perfectly well directed, by it's Effect upon the Enemy's Works; and the Number of Guns which were found difmounted apon the Ramparts.
Juft as the Army arrived upon it's Ground, a Party of the Enemy, coming, as it is fuppofed, from Bouchain, attacked an advanced Party of Hanoverians.' They were driven back, with fome Lofs, by Six Squadrons of Hanovarian Cavalry. His Royal Highnefs Prince Erneft was perfonally engaged, and ditinguifhed himfelf upon this Occafion.
