*Extract of a Letter from Sir James Murray, Adjutant-General to the Forces under the Command of His Royal Highness the Duke of York, to Mr. Secretary Dundas, dated Ypres, August 20, 1793.*

**F**IELD-Marshal Freytag halted last Night at Vlacmeringhue: His Advanced Guard at Poperinghen. He marched this Evening with the Intention of passing the Yser at Day-Break, and attacking the Enemy's Posts at Rexpode and Hondfhotte. The former is said to consist of about 800 Men. The Field-Marshal has communicated to His Royal Highness the Dispositions which he has made for this Purpose, and they offer every Prospect of Success.

*Postscript, dated Furnes, August 21, 1793.*

AS the Army was approaching Ostend, I kept my Letter till this Day, in Hopes of being able to give some Account of Marshal Freytag's Operations. His Royal Highness has just received Information, that he has defeated the Enemy at Oost Capelle, Rexmode, and Hondfchoot. He has taken Eleven Pieces of Cannon and 200 Prisoners, and killed about the same Number of Men. The Pursuit was continued to within a small Distance of Bergues.

There are on our Side about Forty killed and wounded.

mise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the

Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant August: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the Twenty-fifth of January last, to order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever should at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles before mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, (except for the Purposes and to the Places mentioned in the said Order;) which Order was, by another Order dated the Twenty-fourth Day of July last, continued for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twenty-fifth of the said Month of July. And whereas it hath been represented, on Behalf of the principal Importers and Venders of Bar-Iron in the City of London, that great Loss and Inconvenience will result to the Trade, by the Exportation of Bar-Iron continuing to be prohibited to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, without special Orders being obtained for that Purpose: His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, (as it is hereby ordered) That from and after the Date hereof, the Exportation of Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall, notwithstanding the said Orders, be permitted and allowed

from any of the Ports of this Kingdom to any Country, in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty, in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; provided the Merchant Exporter of any such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of the Bond, from the British Consul resident at the Port for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be cleared out, or, in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two-British Merchants resident there, a Certificate or Certificates that such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron has been all duly delivered at the Ports for which the same was cleared out; and the Bonds or Securities shall not be cancelled or delivered up but on the Production of such Certificate or Certificates. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

THE Wisdom and Firmness that have distinguished your Conduct during the present Session, and the Attention you have afforded to the many important Objects of your Deliberations, demand my sincere Acknowledgements, and enable me to relieve you from further Attendance in Parliament.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have His Majesty's Commands to thank you for the liberal Supplies you have voted for the Public Service, and for the honourable Support of His Majesty's Government. You may rely upon their faithful Application.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Wisdom and Liberality with which you attended to His Majesty's Recommendation in Favour of his Roman Catholic Subjects; are highly pleasing to the King. You must be fully sensible of His Majesty's gracious Condescension in committing to your Judgment the Application of the Hereditary Revenue: And I am ordered by His Majesty to signify His Approbation of the Provisions which have been made for the Support of His Civil Government and the Honour and Dignity of His Crown; and to express his Confidence that your liberal Concessions to the Roman Catholics, and the Measures for the Regulation of the Public Expenditure; and for the Limitation of Offices and Pensions; to which His Majesty has been graciously pleased to consent with a View to the Advantage of the Public, will cement a general Union of Sentiment among all Classes of His Majesty's Subjects in Support of the established Constitution.

His Majesty has seen, with real Satisfaction, that friendly Disposition, which has been manifested by the

the Parliaments of Great Britain and Ireland, for strengthening the Connexion of the Two Kingdoms by mutual Acts of Concession. I am, authorized to acquaint you that an Act has passed the British Parliament to permit Goods of Asia, Africa or America, legally imported into Ireland, to be imported from thence into Great Britain. This is a signal Proof of her Attention to your Interests; whilst the Confirmation of the Charter of the East India Company by the Parliament of Ireland, displays on your Part a cordial Zeal for the Support of Great Britain, and a judicious Consideration of the great and essential Interests of the Empire.

I am to make my Acknowledgements for the many salutary Laws you have enacted to strengthen the Executive Government, which will materially tend to defeat the Designs of the Enemies to the Freedom and Happiness of this Kingdom.

The Apprehensions of Embarrassment, which for a Time hung over Commercial Transactions, were to me a Subject of the utmost Anxiety; and I am to return you my Thanks for sanctioning those Measures which I took in Support of Credit, and which, I trust, have had the happiest Effect in preventing the ill Consequences of such Apprehensions.

The Spirit of Discontent, which prevailed amongst the lower Classes of the People at the Beginning of the Session, has since burst into Acts of Riot and Insurrection; and I have been under the painful Necessity of employing His Majesty's Forces, whose Steadiness and good Conduct have on all Occasions been manifested, and by whose Exertions the Civil Magistrates have been enabled, in a great Measure, to restore to general Tranquillity.

Under all the Circumstances of the Country, I thought it proper to call forth a very considerable Portion of the Militia of this Kingdom. I am to express His Majesty's Approbation of a Measure which affords a present material Assistance, and lays the Foundation of a permanent Constitutional Force, that has been found, by Experience in Great Britain, of great Resource in public Emergencies.

His Majesty feels with the greatest Concern the Expence brought upon His People by Domestic Disturbances, added to the Consequences of a Foreign War, into which we have been forced by the wanton and unprovoked Aggression of France; but you will reflect that you are contending for the Preservation of your Property and for the Security of your happy Constitution.

The Successes with which it hath pleased the Divine Providence to bless the Arms of His Majesty and his Allies, afford the best Prospect of a happy Issue to this important Contest; and it is His Majesty's earnest Hope, that a Continuance of vigorous Exertions will finally obtain a secure and lasting Peace.

I have entire Confidence that in your respective Counties you will exert your utmost Influence in maintaining the Public Tranquillity and in carrying the Law in full Execution: You may be assured that I shall, on all Occasions, take the most speedy and effectual Measures, in the Exercise of those Powers with which I am invested, for the Repression of Outrage and Tumult, and the Protection of His Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects.
