The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, with Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any such Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the said Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken

as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recal such Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose, unless such Order be made before the Thirtieth Day of June, 1793. And whereas, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 21st of June last, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein expressed) until the 31st of August then ensuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Wheat, Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation

tation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the Thirtieth Day of August then ensuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Wheat, Wheat-Meal or Flour, Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats, or Oatmeal; and also to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other. And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ending the Seventeenth Day of August, 1793, that the General Average Prices of Wheat, Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Foreign Wheat, Wheat-Meal and Flour, Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Wheat, Wheat-Meal or Flour, or Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Sixteenth Day of November, 1793, or until His Majesty shall think fit to revoke this present Order; and that the Prohibition to export Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Thirtieth Day of November, 1793. And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of August, 1793, that the General Average Prices of Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, are above the Prices at which Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pur-

suant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Thirtieth Day of November, 1793. And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal; and that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other, in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Thirtieth Day of November, 1793.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the Thirteenth of March, 1793, to order, that an Embargo should be forthwith laid upon all Ships or Vessels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, and also upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheese, Pease, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatsoever, and with Hides or Leather manufactured or unmanufactured; but it was His Majesty's Pleasure, amongst other Things, that the said Embargo should not extend to any Ships or Vessels, being British Ships and Vessels, and navigated according to Law, which may be employed in carrying any of the Articles abovementioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty: And whereas it has been represented, on Behalf of the Merchants Importers and Exporters of Rice, that Orders for Rice have been received from Foreign Ports, to which British Vessels very seldom resort, and that if the Exportation of Rice to Countries in Amity with His Majesty,

Majesty, in Foreign Bottoms, is not permitted, the Trade in that Article will be greatly injured; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the Date hereof, the Exportation of Rice shall, notwithstanding the said Order, be permitted and allowed from any of the Ports in this Kingdom to any Country in or out of Europe in Amity with His Majesty, in Foreign Ships or Vessels, provided the Merchant Exporter of any such Rice do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which such Rice shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, with Two sufficient Sureties, being known British Merchants, or other Persons of acknowledged Credit resident in this Kingdom, to be approved of by the proper Officers of the Customs, to carry the said Rice to the Place for which it is so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of the Bond, from the British Consul resident at the Port for which such Rice shall be cleared out, or in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two British Merchants resident there, a Certificate or Certificates that such Rice has been all duly delivered at the Port for which the same was cleared out; and the Bonds or Securities shall not be cancelled or delivered up but on the Production of such Certificate or Certificates.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December last, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or

Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on-board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this Instant August: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the Twenty-fifth of January last, to order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever should at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards,

Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles before mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, (except for the Purposes and to the Places mentioned in the said Order;) which Order was, by another Order dated the Twenty-fourth Day of July last, continued for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twenty-fifth of the said Month of July. And whereas it hath been represented, on Behalf of the principal Importers and Venders of Bar-Iron in the City of London, that great Loss and Inconvenience will result to the Trade, by the Exportation of Bar-Iron continuing to be prohibited to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, without special Orders being obtained for that Purpose: His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, (as it is hereby ordered) That from and after the Date hereof, the Exportation of Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall, notwithstanding the said Orders, be permitted and allowed from any of the Ports of this Kingdom to any Country, in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty, in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; provided the Merchant Exporter of any such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of the Bond, from the British Consul resident at the Port for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be cleared out, or, in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two British Merchants resident there, a Certificate or Certificates that such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron has been all duly delivered at the Ports for which the same was cleared out; and the Bonds or Securities shall not be cancelled or delivered up but on the Production of such Certificate or Certificates. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
