HE King's Most Excellent Majesty, upon the humble Petition, and at the Defire of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in Parliament Assembled, Doth by this His Royal Proclamation, Straitly Charge and Command George Con-Symonds, Charles Walsh, Prichard, and Bistor Biston, otherwise Phaire. B. cston, (late Servant to the Lady Bellasise) who fland Charged as Persons Guilty of the Damnable and Hellish Plot for the Destruction of the Kings Royal Person, and the Subversion of the Government, and for the Extirpation of the True Protestant Religion Esta-blished by Law within this His Kingdom, and are sted from Fustice, so that they cannot at present be Apprehended to be proceeded against according to Law, That they and every of them do before the Temb day of December next ensuing, render themselves respectively to the Lord Chief Fustice of the Kings Bench, or to Jome other of the Fustices of the same Court, who are hereby Commanded forthwith to Commit the Persons of rendring him or themselves, to His Majestes Gael of Newgate, there to remain in safe Custody, in order to their Tryals for the Fasts aforesaid: And His Majesty doth hereby give the said Offenders to understand, That if they shall not render themselves as aforesaid, His Majesty bath Commanded that a Bill shall be Presented to His House of Peers, to be from Fustice, so that they cannot at present be Appre-Bill shall be Presented to Hiu House of Peers, to be Passed into a Law, for Attainting such of them of High Treason, who shall not so render themselves. And His Majesty doth also Charge and Command all and every Lord-Lioutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Confables, and other His Majesties Officers, and Loya! Subjects, That they and every of them do use their utmost Endeavor for the Apprehending of the said Persons, and every of them, and for their Im-prisonment, and safe Custody in manner aftersaid. And for the greater Encouragement of such as shall Discover and Apprehend any of the said Offenders, Ein Majesty doth hereby Graciously Promise to any who shall Disdoth bereby Graciously Promise to any who shall Discover and Apprehend any of the said Offenders, the Remaind of One hundred Pounds, which shall be immediated by paid to the Person or Persons who shall Discover and Apprehend, or cause to be Apprehended, any of the said Offenders, upon Notice and Proof thereof. And surfather, His Majesty doth bereby strictly Charge and Command and Constables, Churchward ns, Freadboroughs, Aythingmen, Borst olders, and other Parish-Officers with in this His K income of England, Dominion of Water. in this His Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wates, and Town of Berwick upon Twend, That they and ewery of them do with all possible Expedition, make alligent Search and inquiry in all Houses within wheir whiching Tariflus Hamley and W. respective Taristes, Hamlets and Villages, and there take an exact L'ccam; t of the Numes and Surnames of all fuel

Persons as are Popish Recusants, or reputed so to be, as well Housholders, as Lodgers and Servants, and every of them, and to make up a present List of the Names and Surnames, Age and Luality of all such Persons being of the Age of Sixteen Tears or upwards, and forthwith to deliver such List to one of the Fusices of the Peace, dwelling in or near adjoining to the Place where such List shall be taken; which said fusice, and such other fusice or Fusices of the Peace of the same County, City, Liberty or Place, who shall be made acquainted with such List, are hereby Required to send for the said Persons so Listed, or such of them to whom by Law the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy may be tendred, and to tender to them and every of them the said Qaths, and in case of a Refusal to take the same, to require the said Person so refusing, to enter into a Recognizance with Two or more sufficient Securities, to appear at the next Sessions of the Peace for such County, City, Liberty or Place; and in Defaute of their Enting into such Recognizance, to Commit them respectively to the Common Gaol, there to remain under safe Castody until the next Luarter-Sessions of the Peace of the said County, City, Liberty or Place where such Persons fo refusing are to be proceeded against according to Law; His Majesty bereby giving the said Fusices to understand, That the better to Enable them to tender the said Oaths, His Majesty bath Commanded respective Commissions to be Issued under the Great Seal of England, Directed to the several Fusices of the Pesca of such Counties, Cities, Liberties or Places, to Authorize and Require them, or any Two of them, to Administer the said Oaths accordingly.

And moreover, His Majesty doth hereby Stratily

And moreover, His Majesty doth hereby Straitly Charge and Command all and every the said Lord-Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, and Fusices of the Peace; That they and every of them do within their respective Furifaitions, proceed without delay to Disarm all such Persons as shall so resule to take the said Oaths. And for the better Esselling thereof. His Majesty is Graciously pleased to Declare, That if any Person shall Discover any considerable quantity of the Arms of any Persons Reculant, or Person so reputed, he shall have as a Reward for the same, the Sum of Ten Pounds, the same to be paid unto him by the Sherist of the County or City where the same shall be done; which said Sum shall be allowed unto such Sherist upon his Accompt in the Exchequer. And lastiy, His Majesty doth hereby surther Charge and Command all and every His Ostivers of or belorging to any of His Sea-Ports. Vienna, Nov. 10. We have an account of a confiderable advantage obtained by General Wurmb against the Hungarian Rebels on the 3d instant near pidzill; That General Wurmb having endeavoured with his Troops to enter into the Berg Towns, but Inding all the passages strongly guarded by the Re-

bels, turned towards Newhere, and detached Maisr General Dunewaldt with 2000 Horse, to possess himfelf of that place, and followed himself with the rest of his Forces. Major-General Dunema de ha i not marched far, when he discovered a Body of 80.0 of the Rebels, whom he attack d, and being prefently feconded by General Wurmb, the Rebels, though at first they made a pretty good resistance, were defeated, and put to flight by the Imperialilis, who were not above 5000 Men; 800 of the Rebels were flain, 15 Colours and two imall Field-pieces taken, and if the night had not put an end to the pursuit, it's thought few of them would have escaped. The Garison of Oldzil seemed at first resolved to defend themselves, and discharged their Cannon upon the Imperialiss; but as soon as they nuderstood the defeat of the Rebels, the Governor furrendred the place, being first assured, that no hurt should be done either to him or his Soldiers, who were most of them of the Neighbouring Inhabitants; and accordingly they had all liberty to return home, after having promifed never to bear Arms again against the Emperor. In this action there were not above 20 of the Imperialiss killed, and of the Rebels 100 common Soldiers, two Lieutenants, and one Enfign, were taken prisoners, who say that this Body that was defeated, was chiefly composed of Germans, Poles, and Coffacks, and that there were very few Hungarians among them. This account was brought to the Emperor by Licutenant Colonel Samberg, dispatched on purpose by General Wurmb; And fince his arrival we have a farther account, that the rest of the Berg Towas are likewise retaken by General Wurmb.

Coningsberg, Nov. 11. The Letter's from Courtland give us an account, that the Suedes Army having lay'n still two or three days, was again upon its march, and intended to encamp as this day at Rutzow, about seven miles from Memel. Those we receive at the same time from Poland, say, that that King had sent orders to General Paets, not to suffer the Suedish Troops to pass through the Territories of the Crown. Two Regiments, with several pieces of Cannon, have been sent from hence to Memel, to strengthen that place, which, it's pelieved, the Suedes design to attack.

Brussels, Nove, 22. The Dutch Troops are at length removed from the Spanish Territories, and are marched towards the Mayery of Bolduc; in pursuance of the orders of the States General. From Liege of the 19 they write, that the French continue quartered in that Country, and that they were fortifying several places in the Country of fuliers. The Spanish Ratifications are not yet arrived.

Para, Nov. 26. From Alface our Letters of the 20 instant give us an account, that the Duke of Lorrain had been several times to view the new Fortifications which are making at the Fort of Kiel, and that his Highness intended to part the 23 or 24 ir stant from Offemburg, on his way for Vienna, The 24 instant arrived here the Sieur Boreel, and the Sieur. Dickwelt, and yesterday the Sieur Odyke, Ambafladors Extraordinary of the States General of the United Provinces. The Mareschal de Crequi is arrived at Court, and bath been very kindly received by the King. The Letters we receive from Hanouer assure us, that the Suedes Army, consisting in 1,000 men, was marching towards Pruffia, and that the Elector of Brandenburg was thereupon fending most of his Forces that way to make head against them.
