The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Inhabitants of the City and Port of Toulon in France have delivered to Vice-Admiral Lord Hood, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, Possession of the said City and Port, and their Dependencies; and the said Vice-Admiral Lord Hood hath taken Possession thereof accordingly; and the same are no longer under the Government of the Persons now exercising the Powers of Government in France, but are under the Protection of His Majesty: And whereas it is expedient that the Inhabitants within the said City and Port, and their Dependencies, should be supplied with Articles necessary for their Sustenance, Accommodation and Defence, notwithstanding the present War between Great Britain and France; His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the Date hereof, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be signified to the contrary, all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and with the said City and Port of Toulon, and the Dependencies thereof, notwithstanding the War between Great Britain and France, except only in such Manner as by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled,

“ An Act more effectually to prevent, during the present War between Great Britain and France, all Traiterous Correspondence with, or Aid or Assistance being given to His Majesty's Enemies,” is prohibited, and is not hereinafter specially authorized; subject, nevertheless, to the same Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, as the said Trade was liable to, immediately before the Commencement of the said War. And whereas by the said Act, during the Continuance of the present War between Great Britain and France, all Persons residing or being in Great Britain are prohibited, under the Penalties of High Treason, from supplying, to or for the Use of any Person or Persons residing or being within any of the Dominions of France, or any Town, Territory, Port or Place annexed to France, or under the Government of the Persons then exercising, or who might thereafter, during the said War, exercise the Powers of Government in France, divers Articles specified in the said Act, without Licence from His Majesty, under His Sign Manual, or by Order in Council or Proclamation first had and obtained, specifying the Articles with respect to which the same shall be had and obtained, and also the Place and Places from which and to which the said Articles shall be sent; His Majesty is pleased further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful to and for all Persons residing or being in Great Britain, to sell, supply and deliver, from any

Port or Place in Great Britain, or in any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, or in any Country in Amity with His Majesty, to the Port of Toulon aforesaid, Wheat, Wheat-Meal or Flour, Barley, Barley-Meal or Flour, Oats ground or unground, Pease, Beans, Rye or Rye-Meal (such Wheat, Wheat-Meal or Flour, Barley, Barley-Meal or Flour, Oats ground or unground, Pease, Beans, Rye or Rye-Meal, if exported from Great Britain, and of British Growth, not being otherwise prohibited from being exported from Great Britain at the Time of such intended Exportation) or Potatoes, or any Flesh or Fish, fresh or salted, or Cheese or Butter, or Beer, Ale, Cyder or Perry, or Wine, Brandy or other Spirituous Liquors; or Hay, Straw, or Forage, or Maize, or Rice ground or unground; or Sugar or Rum, or Coffee, Tea, Chocolate, Cocoa, or Tobacco or Spices, or any Goods or Commodities of the Growth, Production or Manufacture of the East Indies, which shall have been first legally imported into this Kingdom; or Sadlery, Boots or Shoes, or Leather wrought or unwrought; or any other Article of British Manufacture whatever, not being Naval or Military Stores; it being His Majesty's Pleasure, that Naval or Military Stores shall not be exported or sent to the said Port of Toulon, by virtue hereof, without special Licence from His Majesty, under His Sign Manual, or by Order in Council: And also to sell, supply and deliver any Gold or Silver Bullion, or any Notes or Bills of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England; and also to sell, supply and deliver from the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, and from any of His Majesty's Provinces or Colonies in North America, to the said Port of Toulon, any salted Fish taken or caught by British Subjects, any Thing in the before mentioned Act to the contrary notwithstanding; subject, nevertheless, to the same Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, as the Trade in the said several Articles, herein before enumerated or described, was liable to immediately before the Commencement of the present War: Provided always, that all Commodities whatsoever, sent to the Port of Toulon in Manner herein before authorized, shall, if exported from Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or from the Port of Gibraltar, or from the Island of Newfoundland or its Dependencies, or from any of His Majesty's Provinces or Colonies in North America, be exported only in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; and provided also, that the Person or Persons, who shall export any of

the said Commodities from any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the said Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or from the Port of Gibraltar, shall, before the Entry of the same for Exportation, give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Collector or Principal Officer of His Majesty's Customs at the Port from which such Articles respectively shall be exported; or if exported from Gibraltar, to the Satisfaction of the Governor or Commander in Chief at Gibraltar for the Time being, with Two sufficient Sureties, being known British Merchants or other Persons of acknowledged Credit, with Condition that such Commodities shall be sent to the Port of Toulon only, and there delivered; and also to conform, on Arrival at the said Port of Toulon, to all such Rules and Regulations as shall be established there by the Commissioners appointed to act, in His Majesty's Name and Behalf, in superintending, managing and directing the Civil Affairs and Concerns of the said City and Port of Toulon, and their Dependencies; which Bond shall not be discharged but upon producing a Certificate, signed by the Commissioners aforesaid, or by some Person or Persons authorized for that Purpose by the said Commissioners, testifying that the Condition of such Bond has been complied with; or upon Proof being made, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Customs in England and Scotland respectively, that the said Articles were taken by Enemies, or perished in the Sea.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and doth hereby order, that all Commodities, being of the Growth or Manufacture of the said City and Port of Toulon, and their Dependencies, or of any other Part of France which shall be declared by His Majesty, or by Persons duly authorized by His Majesty for that Purpose, to be under the Protection of His Majesty, (such Commodities being certified to be of the said Growth or Manufacture, in such Form and Manner as shall be required and directed by any Person or Persons who shall be duly authorized for that Purpose) shall be permitted to be imported into the Ports of this Kingdom, in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, as Goods of the like Sort would have been subject to, coming from France, immediately before the Commencement of the present War, according to Law, and according to the Treaty of Navigation and Commerce between Great Britain and France, signed at Versailles the Twentieth Day of September, 1786, and the Convention signed

signed on the Fifteenth Day of January, 1787. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

" Tremble O thou Oppressor of the People, that reigneth upon the Throne, and ye Ministers of State, weep for ye shall fall, Weep oh ye Conductors of this vile and wicked War, ye who grind the Face of the Poor, oppress the People, and starve the Industrious Mechanic—My Friends, you are oppressed, you know it,—Revenge it, Lord Buckingham who died the other Day, had Thirty Thousand Pounds, yearly For setting his Arse in the House of Lords, and doing nothing—Think of this, ye who work hard, and have hardly a Crust to put in your Mouths, think how many wretches it would have made happy, in short my Friends Liberty calls aloud, ye who will hear her Voice may you be free, and happy, He who does not let him starve and be damned.

" Sunday, Sept. 14th.

" N, B, Be resolute, and you shall be happy, he who wishes well to the Cause of Liberty, let him repair to Chaple Field at Five oClock

" This Afternoon

" to begin a Glorious Revolution."
