 Primate of all Ireland, and Baron Rokeby of Ar-
 magh aforesaid; such Arms being first duly exempli-
 fied according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in
 the Heralds Office: And also to order that this His
 Majesty’s Concession and Declaration be registered in
 His College of Arms.
