P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Articles of Capitulation, proposed by the Inhabitants of La Grande Anse, including the Quarter at Jeremie, in the Island of St. Domingo in the West Indies, and accepted by Major-General Williamson, His Majesty's Lieutenant-Governor of the Island of Jamaica; and also by Articles of Capitulation, proposed by the Garrison and Inhabitants of Cape Nicola Mole and it's Dependencies, in the said Island of St. Domingo, and accepted by Commodore Ford, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo have been surrendered to His Majesty, and are now in His Majesty's Possession, and the Inhabitants thereof are become Subjects of His Majesty: And whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act more effectually to prevent, during the present War between Great Britain and France, all traitorous Correspondence with, or Aid or Assistance being given to His Majesty's Enemies," all Persons residing or being in Great Britain are prohibited, under the Penalties of High Treason, during the Continuance of the present War between Great Britain and France, from supplying, to or for the Use of any Person or Persons residing or being within any of the Dominions of France, or any Town, Territory, Port or Place annexed to France, or under the Government of the Persons then exercising, or who might thereafter, during the said War, ex-

ercise the Powers of Government in France, divers Articles specified in the said Act, without Licence from His Majesty, under His Sign Manual, or by Order in Council, or by Proclamation, first had and obtained, specifying the Articles with respect to which the same shall be had and obtained, and also the Place and Places from which and to which the same shall be sent: His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful to and for all Persons residing or being in Great Britain to sell, supply and deliver from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, in or out of Europe, or in any Country in Amity with His Majesty, to such Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo as are or shall be in His Majesty's Possession, any of the Articles specified and enumerated in the before mentioned Act, subject nevertheless to such Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures, as the Trade in the said several Articles to any of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations is or shall be liable to by Law: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the Exportation from Great Britain, or from any other of His Majesty's Dominions in or out of Europe, of any of the Articles aforesaid, which are or shall be prohibited to be exported otherwise than by the said Act.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to

and

and from such Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo as are or shall be in His Majesty's Possession, subject nevertheless to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations and Islands in the West Indies is or shall be subject by Law: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prevent the Importation in American Bottoms of Provisions, Cattle, Grain and Wood of every Kind from the United States of America into such Parts of the said Island as aforesaid, so long as the same shall be allowed, in pursuance of and under the Terms and Conditions of the said Articles of Capitulation, or any other Privileges or Exemptions granted by the said Articles of Capitulation.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of such Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo as shall, at the Time of the Entry of such Commodities for Exportation from the said Island, be in the Possession of His Majesty, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in the West Indies.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the

Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant December: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant December to the Twenty-eighth Day of February 1794, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, with Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average

rage Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any such Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the said Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recall such Prohibition of Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose. And whereas, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 28th of August last, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein mentioned and referred to) until the 30th of November, then ensuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare and order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the Thirtieth Day of November then ensuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in

that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats, or Oatmeal; and also to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other. And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ending the Sixteenth Day of November, 1793, that the General Average Prices of Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order mentioned and referred to, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of March, 1794. And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of October, 1793, that the General Average Price of Pease, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, are above the Prices at which Foreign Pease, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Pease, Beans or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order mentioned and referred to, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of March, 1794. And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal; and that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption,

Consumption, any Foreign Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other, in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of March, 1794; and that it shall be lawful in like Manner to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Beans, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Manheim, December 2.

On the 29th Ult. the French Troops, to the Number of 30,000 Men, attacked the Duke of Brunswick in the Retrenchments of Landau, but were repulsed with great Loss. A second Attack was made by them on the 30th, when they were again compelled to retreat; and the Duke of Brunswick having learnt, the following Day, that a Body of the French was again formed at Rainstein, His Serene Highness immediately marched to attack them, and succeeded in driving them beyond Hombourg, after taking from them their Baggage, Artillery and Ammunition. On the same Day a general Attack was made on the whole Line of General Wurmfers Army, and, after an Engagement which lasted the whole Day, the French were driven beyond Straßbourg.

Brussels, December 10.

The Particulars of the frequent Actions which General Wurmfers and the Duke of Brunswick had with the French Army on the 29th and 30th of November, and the 1st and 2d of December, have not yet been received here, further than that the French were repulsed with considerable Loss on those several Days. The Number of French killed, wounded and taken Prisoners, according to the best Accounts, appearing not to be less than 15,000 Men.
