Europe, of any of the Articles aforciaid, which are or shall be prosibited to be experted otherwise than by the said Act.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from such Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo as are or shall be in His Majesty's Possession, Subject nevertheless to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations and Islands in the West Indies is or shall be subject by Law: But it is His Majefly's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prevent the Importation in American Bottoms of Provisions, Cattle, Grain and Wood of every Kind from the United States of America into fuch Parts of the faid Island as aforefaid, fo long as the same shall be allowed, in pursuance of and under the Terms and Conditions of the faid Articles of Capitulation, or any other Privileges or Exemptions granted by the faid Articles of Capitulation.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and acclare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of such Parts of the said Island of St. Domingo as shall, at the Time of the Entry of such Commodities for Exportation from the said Island, be in the Possession of His Majesty, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in the West Indies.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majetty's Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

'The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for Nis Majesty's Service, should be paid in the

Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of awenty Years, who should, on or before the Twee y-eighth Day of February then following, enter themseives to serve in His Majeste's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as Hi: Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majedy was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferro an board His Majesty's Ships, should be pain to any Person who should discover any Bountage or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, fo that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewart, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this Instant December: And it being judged expedient for His Majetty's Service that the faid Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Counties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant December to the Twenty-eighth Day of February 1794, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
