THE Dispatches, of which the following are a Copy and Extracts, were received last Night from Toulon by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

SIR, Toulon, November 18, 1793.

On the Evening of the 15th Instant Fort Mulgrave, situated on the Heights of Balaguier, one of the most effential Posts that cover this Town and Harbour, was vigorously and repeatedly attacked by a large Corps of the Enemy. I have particular Pleasure in mentioning, that, on this Occasion, the very spirited Exertions of the British Troops, stationed at Fort Mulgrave, confifting of a Detachment of the 2d Battalion of the First or Royal Regiment of Foot, commanded by Captain Duncan Campbell, and of a Detachment of the Royal Artillery, commanded by Lieutenant Lemoine, were the principal Means of repulfing the Enemy, and laving that important Post.

The Enemy, from the corroborating Accounts of

different Deserters, are said to have lost in this Attack about 600 Men, killed and wounded. Our Loss, including the Spaniards, Neapolitans, and Sardinians, amounted only to 61. Among the wounded were Captain Duncan Campbell of the Royals, and Lieutenant Lemoine of the Royal Artillery, who, I am happy to add, are now in a favorable State of Recovery.

Extract of a Letter from their Excellencies the Commissioners at Toulon to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, dated Toulon, November 23, 1793.

TE had the Honor of receiving His Majesty's Commission, together with Instructions for the Regulation of our Conduct, on the 14th Instant.

On the 20th we defired a Deputation of the Inhabitants to attend us at the Governor's House. His. Excellency thought it best, for the sake of avoiding all Misunderstanding, to speak on this Occasion from a written Paper, of which we have the Honor to inclose a Copy.

We then read, according to His Majesty's Commands, a Declaration in His Majesty's Name; a Copy of which is inclosed.

We delivered Copies of these Papers to the Chief of the Deputation, and directed them to be printed, published and circulated as generally as possible.

We had the Pleasure to observe, that His Majefty's gracious and honorable Declaration was re-ceived with the strongest Marks of Gratitude and Satisfaction.

His Excellency Governor O'Hara's Speech to the Deputation of Inhabitants on the 20th of November, 1793.

GENTLEMEN,

A S foon as the King was informed of the Events which had taken Place at Toulon, His Majesty was desirous to give an authentic Proof, not only of the Satisfaction which He had experienced from these Events, but also of His entire Approbation of the Engagements which had been entered into, in His Name, with the Town of Toulon. His Majesty was also desirous to give you a positive Assurance that He will punctually sulfil those Engagements.

His Majesty is sensible that the Possession of this Town, under all the Circumstances in which it was

accepted, prefents to His Attention Objects of the greatest Importance, and lays Him under the most facred Obligations. His Majesty has already taken, and will continue to take, every Measure, which Circumstances will permit, for the Protection of the Town and of it's Inhabitants. With a View of providing for these Objects, and of fulfilling, as effectually as possible, the other Duties which arise from the prefent Situation of His Majesty with respect to the Town and Inhabitants of Toulon, He has thought proper to tennide to Lord Hood, Sir Gilbert Elliet, Baronet, and to myfelf, a Commission, which was lately delivered to us, under the Great Seal of England.

By this Commission we are authorized to act, in His Majesty's Name, in the Direction of the Affairs and Civil Interests of Toulon, as also of all other Piaces and Districts in France, which may be occupied by His Majesty's Arms, or come into His Postession, and there to provide for the Establishment of good Order and of a regular Government, for the impartial Aministration of Justice, and the Protection

of Persons and Property.

Thefe, Gentlemen, are the Powers, immediately relative to the Affairs and Concerns of Toulon, with which His Majesty has been pleased to intrust us, and which we have thought proper to impart to you. I will not add any Thing respecting the honorable Intentions and generous Dispositions of His Majesty, because they will be more particularly and more satisfactorily explained to you by a DECLARATION, which, by His Order, we shall address to the Inhabitants of Toulon, and publish in His Name. I shall now conclude by reading it to you.

DECLARATION of the KING.

WE the underligned, Commissioners Plenipotentiary of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, do hereby publish, by His Orders and in His Name,

the following Declaration.

HIS Britannic Majesty having been informed of the Circumstances under which the Town, Harbour, and Forts of Toulon, and the Ships in the said Harbour, have been intrusted to Vice-Admiral Lord Hood, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, and of the Declaration and Proclamations published by the said Vice-Admiral, as well as of the Declaration made to him on the Part of the Inhabitants and People of Toulon, has thought sit, for the surther Satisfaction of the said Inhabitants and People; and for the full Explanation of His Royal Intentions, to declare as follows.

I. When Monarchy shall be restored in France, and a Treaty of Peace concluded, stipulating, in: Favor of His Majesty and His Allies, the Restitution of all Conquests made by France during the War, and a just Indemnisication for the Losses and Expences thereby incurred, and a proper Security for the survey. His Majesty will cause the Town, Forts, and Harbour of Toulon, together with the Ships and Stores therein, to be restored, according to the Engagement entered into by the said Vice-Admiral.

II. His Majesty has given Directions that the most effectual Measures shall be taken for the Protection of the Persons and Property of the Inhabitants of the said Town, and for procuring them the Supplies of Provisions and other Articles of which they may stand in Need; and His Majesty is also graciously pleased to approve of continuing all Persons who held Civil or Military Employments in their respective Places and Occupations, as far as Circumstances and the Good of the Common Cause will permit.

III. His Majestywill do every Thing in His Power, and in Concert with His Allies, to repel any Attacks which may be made against Toulon, and to extend His Protection to all those who may be desireable to have Personnel to it under correspondings.

have Recourse to it, under certain Conditions.

IV. His Majesty sincerely wishes the Happiness of France, but by no Means desires, on this Account, to prescribe any particular Form of Government. The King claims the Right of taking a Part, only because the Anarchy which now desolates that Country threatens the Tranquillity of His own Subjects and that of the other Powers of Europe, whose Safety and

Peace materially depend on the Re-establishment of Order in France, and of a regular System, which may hold out to them a secure Ground of Negotiation and Friendship: And His Majesty does not hesitate to declare, that the Re-establishment of Monarchy, in the Person of Louis XVII. and the lawful Heirs of the Crown, appears to Him the best Mode of accomplishing these just and falutary Views. This Form of Government has not only prevailed in France from the carliest Times, but, being capable of such Limitations as may suit the respective Circumstances of different Nations, has been proved by Experience to be the best adapted, in great Countries, so unite the Advantages of Security and Order with real Liberty.

Such a System, subject to such Modifications as may hereafter be made therein in a regular and legal Manner, when Tranquillity shall have been restored in France, would afford to His Majesty the best and most pleasing Prospect of terminating the Evils and Miseries now endured by the French Nation, and of the Renewal of a regular and amicable Intercourse

between that Country and other States.

It is to these great Ends that His Majesty's Meafures will be directed; and His Protection and Assistance will be extended, as far as Circumstances will admit, to all those who manifest their Desire to concur in so falutary a Work.

ON Monday the 8th of July last the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada waited on his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that he would be pleased to transmit the following Addresses to His Majesty.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Legislative Council of
the Province of Upper Canada.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council of your Province of Upper Canada, in Legislature assembled, most humbly presume to express our unseigned Attachment to your Majesty in the present Situation of Public Affairs.

It is with Astonishment and Grief we have marked the Progress of that unruly Spirit of Innovation and Turbulence, which has actuated the Conduct of a

prevailing Party in France.

The Introduction of a Reform of Government, mutually accepted, and fanctioned by the most solemn Obligations, seems to have been the Signal for unfixing established Opinions, and bringing forward those delusive Projects, which in all Ages have been held out to the Multitude by their instituous Leaders; for affording Pretences to a Party, who, having propagated their Sentiments by Assaliantion and Slaughter, and samilarized their Nation to Scenes of Horror, have smally led them to the Murder of a mild and benevolent Sovereign.

With Scorn and Indignation we have heard of Attempts to introduce the same levelling Spirit, and to justify these atrocious Measures, in Great Britain and Ireland. And we beg Leave to affure your Majesty, that the prompt and zealous Exertions of our Fellow Subjects at Home, in resisting these wild Encroachments, produced Emotions of most grateful Sympathy among the loyal Inhabitants of this remote Province.

The Impufe of British Resentment against such Attempts has, we doubt not, been communicated to

the

the most distant Parts of the British Empire; and, from our own Feelings, we are convinced that all your Majesty's People are influenced by a strong and uniform Principle of Affection and Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and of Detestation against the Perpetrators of those foul Deeds, which have brought a lafting Difgrace on their Country. Satisfied as we are that by our free Constitution we enjoy all the Benefits that human Policy can bestow, our first Prayer is, that we may long continue to receive them under your Majesty's paternal Influence; our next is, that the Miseries of Civil Discord in France may give Way to the Blessings of regular Government, and Tranquillity be restored to Europe.

The humble Address of the House of Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, in Legislature assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the House of Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, in Legislature assembled, approach your Throne with Gratitude and Affection.

In this remote but flourishing Part of your Majesty's Dominions, where we have found Shelter by your Majesty's paternal Care and Clemency, the Fame of those Tumults and Disorders that live in Europe hath but lately arrived; but conceiving that, at a Period so important, it is the Duty of all good Men and faithful Subjects to manifest themselves to their King and Country, we beg Leave to lay before you our Loyalty and Love; and if it should be deemed necessary to add to our tried Zeal and Affection, we assure your Majesty that no Exertion on our Part shall be wanting to convince our Fellow Subjects, that the foremost Rank is our Station amongst those who stand forth for the Protection and Defence of their King and Country.

We cannot advert to the facrilegious Murder in France without Horror and Abhorrence of the Men and Principles which have effected it: But as a Work of Evil fometimes produces Good, we cherish the Hope, that a Conduct so baneful to every Precept of Religion and Law will serve to rivet the Loyalty and Attachment of our Fellow Subjects, as it has our's, to the best of Kings, and of Constitutions the

most excellent.

ON Tuesday the 9th of July last his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor prorogued the Legislature of Upper Canada to the 26th Day of September, and made the following Speech.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen,

IT gives me great Satisfaction that, by your unremitting Diligence, the Public Business of the Seffion has been so far transacted, that I am enabled to confult your personal Convenience, and to dismits you, at an early Period, to your feveral Residences.

It is with Pleasure I perceive that, agreeably to my Recommendation, you have new modelled a Militia Bill, and provided fuch falutary Laws as are fuitable to the present Condition of the Province.

The Act for the gradual Abolition ... Slavery in this Colony, which it has been thought expedient to frame, in no Respect meets from me a more chearful Concurrence, than in that Provision which repeals the Power heretofore held by the Executive

Branch of the Conflitution, and precludes it from giving Sanction to the Importation of Slaves; and I cannot but anticipate, with fingular Pleasure, that fuch Persons as may be in that unhappy Condition. which found Policy and Humanity unite to condemn, added to their own perfonal Protection from all un-due Severity, by the Law of the Land, may from henceforth look forward with Certainty to the Emancipation of their Offspring.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen,

Should the Necessity of any further Revision or Amendments of the Ordinances of the late Province of Quebec attract your Notice during the Recess, I doubt not but in the next Session, by carrying such. Improvements into Execution, you will exemplify that distinguishing Excellence in the British Constitution, of which we daily experience the Benefit, and which has been transmitted to us by our Ancestors as he firmest Security of the Public Prosperity.
