WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged with France, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Friday the Twenty-eighth Day of February next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect

the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

WHEREAS John Jones, of Woodside in the Township of Ashton, in the Parish of Tarvin in the County of Chester, Yeoman, was, upon the Ninth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, charged by Information, upon the Oaths of credible Persons, by them subscribed, before the Reverend Peplow Ward, of the City of Chester, Clerk, George William Prescott, of the Abbey Square, in the same City, Esquire, Charles Henchman, of the same City, Esquire, and Richard Richardson, of Capenhurst in the County of Chester, Esquire, Four of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said County, with having, on the First Day of October, in the said Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, at Woodside aforesaid, in the Township aforesaid, and Parish

and County aforesaid, wilfully and maliciously, with loaded Guns and Pistols, shot at and wounded Samuel Thomas, of the City of Chester aforesaid, Sheriff's Officer, and also Daniel Whitfield, of the same City, Labourer, and also Robert Foulkes, of the same City, Labourer, such several Persons then and there being in the Township of Ashton aforesaid, in the Parish and County aforesaid; which Information was afterwards certified by the said Justices of the Peace, to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, in that Case made and provided: His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said John Jones do and shall surrender himself, within the Space of Forty Days, to One of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, or to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, to the End that he may be forthcoming to answer the said Offence and Offences wherewith he stands charged by the said Information, according to due Course of Law. And His Majesty is pleased further to order, as it is hereby ordered, that this Order shall be printed and published in the next London Gazette, and shall be forthwith transmitted to the Sheriff of the said County of Chester; and that the said Sheriff shall, within Six Days after the Receipt thereof, by himself or his Officers, proclaim the same Order, between the Hours of Ten in the Morning and Two in the Afternoon, in the Market Places, upon the respective Market Days, of Two Market Towns in the said County of Chester, near the Place where such Offence and Offences were committed, and shall cause a true Copy of this Order to be affixed upon some public Place in each of such Market Towns, according to the true Intent and Meaning of the said Act, in such Case made and provided.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the Ninth Day of October last, His Majesty was pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be signified to the contrary, all His loving Subjects might lawfully trade to and with the City and Port of Toulon, and the Dependencies thereof, under certain Exceptions, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, specified in the said

said Order; and further to order and declare as in the same Order is expressed: And whereas the said City and Port of Toulon, and the Dependencies thereof, are no longer under the Protection of His Majesty, but are under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France: It is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the said Order in Council, and every Part thereof, be, and the same is hereby, from the Day of the Date of this present Order in Council, vacated and repealed. It is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Will and Pleasure, that the said Order shall continue in full Force and Effect as to all Commodities permitted by the said Order to be imported from the said City and Port of Toulon, and their Dependencies, into the Ports of this Kingdom, in the Manner mentioned in the said Order, which shall be proved, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or to such Persons as they shall appoint, to have been actually shipped for such Importation during the Time that the said Port was under the Protection of His Majesty. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fourth of July, 1793, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores; or ship or lade any of the Articles above

mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that

that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

St. James's, January 15.

THIS Day Their Majesties, with Their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, removed from Windsor to the Queen's Palace to reside during the Winter.

St. James's, January 18.

This Day being appointed for the Celebration of the Anniversary of the Queen's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired at One o'Clock. In the Evening there will be a Ball at Court, and Illuminations and other Public Demonstrations of Joy in London and Westminster.

St. James's, January 15.

This Day the Marquis de Circello, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Two Sicilies, had a Private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials:

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are Extracts, have been received over Land from India by the Honorable Court of Directors for Affairs of the Honorable United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies.

Extract of a Letter from the Governor and Council at Bengal, in their Political Department, to the Court of Directors, dated Bengal, August 1. 1793.

ON the 11th of June we received from the Governor in Council at Fort St. George, by the Drake Cruizer, which had arrived there from Suez on the 21st, Copies of Dispatches, dated the 10th of April, from Mr. Baldwin, His Majesty's Consul at Alexandria, with a Detail of Intelligence from Europe, notifying, in positive Terms, that the French had declared War against England and Holland on the 1st of February, 1793. We therefore issued Orders, which were effected without Resistance, for the taking Possession of Chandernagore and the several French Factories in this Country, and seizing the Vessels here that carried the French Flag.

The Government of Madras immediately commenced the necessary Preparation for the Siege of Pondicherry, where Colonel Floyd, with a Detach-

ment, arrived on the 11th of July, to blockade it on the Land Side, while the Commodore, with His Majesty's Frigate the Minerva, and Three of our China Ships, the Triton, Warley and Royal Charlotte, were employed to prevent Supplies from being imported by Sea; and the French Factories of Arica and Yanam have been taken Possession of by the Officers of the Madras Government.

Extract of a Letter from the Governor and Council at Bombay, in their Political Department, to the Court of Directors, dated Bombay, September 3. 1793.

HAVING authentic Intelligence, by the Drake Cruizer from Suez, that Hostilities had actually commenced between Great Britain and France, we issued the necessary Orders for reducing the Fort of Mahé, and taking Possession of their Factory at Surat, which we have the Pleasure to acquaint you have been effected without Resistance.

Whitehall, January 18.

The King has been pleased to grant to Sir Benjamin Thompson, Knt. Privy Counsellor, Lieutenant-General, and Commander in Chief of the General Staff of the Army of His Most Serene Highness the Elector Palatine Duke of Bavaria, and Colonel Proprietor of His Highness's Regiment of Artillery, His Royal Licence and Authority to accept the Title and Dignity of a Count of the Holy Roman Empire, by the Title and Title of Count of Rumford; which hath been conferred upon him, expressly as a Reward for his Public Services, by his said Highness the Elector, in the Month of May, 1792, when His Most Serene Highness was in the Exercise of the Powers of a Vicar of the Empire.

His Majesty has likewise been pleased to grant to the said Sir Benjamin Thompson, Count of Rumford, His Royal Permission to wear the Royal Military Order of Saint Stanislaus, and the most Ancient and Royal Order of the White Eagle of Poland; both of which have been conferred upon him, the former in the Month of July, 1785, and the latter in the Month of August, 1789, by His Majesty the King of Poland:

And also to order that these His Majesty's Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.

and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money

Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods before-mentioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted By Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
