PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Ast passed in the Twentyeighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade · between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies " and Plantations in North America and in the " West India Islands, and the Countries belonging. " to the United States of America, and between " His Majesty's faid Subjects and the Foreign Islands " in the Well Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to impower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, fo authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by

His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Band Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing Seafon only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the faid Island from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majefly's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from fome Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpote a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no tonger; provided that no fuch Licence as aforefaid, granged after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-four, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is here wirther pleased to order, That the Master, of Person having

having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newsoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newsoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge

or Command of the faid Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the Ninth Day of October last, His Majesty was pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare, that from and after the Date of the faid Order, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be fignified to the contrary, all His loving Subjects might lawfully trade to and with the City and Port of Toulon, and the Dependencies thereof, under certain Exceptions, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, specified in the faid Order; and further to order and declare as n the same Order is ex pressed: whereas the faid City and Port of Toulon, and the Dependencies thereof, are no longer under the Protection of His Majesty, but are under the Government of the Perfons exercifing the Powers of Governmeut in France: It is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the faid Order in Council, and every Part thereof, be, and the same is hereby, from the Day of the Date of this prefent Order in Council, vacated and repealed. It is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Will and Pleasure, that the faid Order shall continue in full Force and Effect as to all Commodities permitted by the faid Order to be imported from the faid City and Port of Toulon, and their Dependencies, into the Ports of this Kingdom, in the Manner mentioned in the faid Order, which shall be proved, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or to such Persons as they shall appoint, to have been actually shipped for such Importation during the Time that the faid Port was under the Protection of His Majesty. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentyty-fourth of July, 1793, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowiprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twentyfifth Day of this inflant January; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the fuid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January, presume to trasuport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores; or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inslicted by an Act, passed in the last Session of of Parliament, intituled, " An A& to enable His · Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval " Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Ex-" portation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, " when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in " Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordrance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; por to the Exportation of the faid several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Purpoles of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purpofes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production. within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commifsioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Dublin-Castle, January 21, 1794.

This Day His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, a Message was sent from His Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Have His Majesty's Commands to meet you in Parliament. You must have fest, with the highest Satisfaction, that, by the Success of His Majesty's Arms and those of His Allies, the Hopes of Franca, in their unprovoked Declaration of War, to impair the Stability or shake the Constitution of Great Britain and Ireland, have been utterly disappointed.

The Forces of His Majesty and His Allies are in Possession of many important Fortresses which belonged to the French, and many of their oppressive and unjust Conquests have been wrested from them; and, whilst the Trade of the Empire has been generally protected, the Resources which our Enemies derived from their wealthy Settlements and extensive Commerce have been almost entirely cut off.

I have the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that the Spirit of Insurrection, which was for some Time prevalent among the lower Orders of People, is in general suppressed. No Exertion shall be wanting, on my Part, to bring them to a due Sense of Order and Subordination, and to prevent and punish the Machinations of those who may aim to seduce them from their accustomed Loyaky into Acts of Sedition and Outrage.

The Law for rendering a Militia in this Kingdom effectual has been carried successfully into Execution. I am happy to find that the People are at length sully reconciled to this Institution, which has already been attended by the most beneficial Consequences, in producing internal Tranquillity, and contributing to the general Strength and Force of the Empire.

I am commanied to acquaint you, that His Majesty has appointed a Commission under the Great Seal, to execute the Office of Lord High Treasurer of this Kingdom, in order that the Payment of the Civil List granted to His Majesty, and a regular Appropriation of the Revenue to distinct Services, may be carried into Execution in a Manner as conformable to the Practice of Great Britain, as the relative Situation of this Kingdom will permit.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons, .

My Loads, and Gentlemen,

His Majesty has the fullest Reliance upon the Loyalty and Attachment of His People of Ireland. You are now, by the unjust Aggression of France, involved in a Contest for your Religion, for your Constitution, and for the Preservation of every Principle which upholds social Order, or gives Security to your Persons or Properties. In such a Cause, His Majesty has no Doubt of being cordually supported, by the Efforts of all His Subjects, in resisting the desperate Designs of Men, who are endeavouring to erect their own Power and Dominion on the Ruins of Law and Order, and to involve every Government of Europe in a general Scene of Consuson and Anarchy. His Majesty's Object is Peace; and He will exert

His Majesty's Object is Peace; and He will exert Himself, in Conjunction with His Allies, whenever an Occasion shall present itself, for obtaining this desirable End, without surrendering the Honor of His Crown, or facrificing the present or suture Security of His People and of the Rest of Europe.

You may depend upon my faithful Representations of your Services to His Majesty; and I will zealously co-operate with your Exertions for the Welfare and Prosperity of Ireland.

Madrid, January 1.

Intelligence has been received from Barcelona, That on the 20th Ultimo the Spanish Troops, which were at Banuls de Mar, attacked the Town of Port Vendre, and the Entrenchments on the Heights behind the Place, and carried them, after an obstinate and bloody Action, taking Six Pieces of Cannon: That General Cuesta afterwards directed a sudden Attack upon Fort St. Elmo, where the French had retired from Port Vendre, and, notwithstanding the incessant Fire kept up by the Garrison, Two Batta-lions of Walloons and some other Corps gained the almost inaccessible Heights by which the Place is commanded, and obliged the Garrison to surrender Prisoners of War: That the Guns of the Fort of St. Elmo were immediately turned upon the Town of Collieure, which was given up at Discretion the next Morning: That, on the zift, the Marquis de las Amarillas, at the Head of Three Columns, attacked the Flank of the Batteries and Entrenchments in the Front of the Spanish Van Guard at Bolo, carried Three Batteries, and obliged the French to retreat to Banuls de Afpres: That a false Attack was, at the same Time, made on the Right of the Enemy's Camp by a Column from Ceret. commanded by the Portuguese General Forbes, and another, on the Lest by General Hurrigaray, who fell in with a Column of 2000 Men, on their March from Perpignan to the Camp at Basuls de Aspres. which they charged, killed 500 Men on the Spot and in the Pursuit, took 200 Prisoners, and Two Baggage Waggons, with very inconsiderable Loss. One thousand seven hundred and eighty five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practifed with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

Section XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Primes abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

Section XX. And be it further enacted and declared. That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall nave been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unlest it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six wonths after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Halds of the Control success of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as the shall judge reasonable; and in uch Cases the Voucners shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay to granted, on Para, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cafes, of paying fuch Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, Shall mink he to fet and impose; which Fine the faid Court is hereby authorized and impowered to fet and impose accordingly.
