The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by

His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-four, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person

having

having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector

or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

Extract of a Letter from His Royal Highness the
Duke of York to Mr. Secretary Dundas, dated
Ghent, January 22, 1794.

I Received Yesterday a Report from Lieutenant-General Count Kinsky, from Tournay, that on Monday the Enemy moved forwards, with Nine Hundred Infantry and One Hundred Cavalry, from Waterloo, and attacked the Post of Aelbecke, which at first was obliged to retire; but the Austrian Out-Posts having immediately assembled, attacked the Enemy in Flank, and drove them completely back to the other Side of Waterloo. The Enemy's Loss was Twenty-one Men killed, and One severely wounded and taken Prisoner. The Austrians had only One Man killed, and One wounded.

Admiralty-Office, January 28, 1794.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Lucas, of His
Majesty's Ship Spynx, to Mr. Stephens, dated
Plymouth, the 21st Instant.

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, being on a Cruise off Cape Clear, on Sunday the 12th Instant, we saw a Sail to the Westward, standing before the Wind: We tacked after her. At Noon she bore up to cross us, which was prevented. At Two P. M. she began an unsuccessful Fire, hoisted the National Flag, and in about Ten or Twelve Minutes struck to His Majesty's Colours.

She proves to be La Trompeuse, a National Brig, mounting 18 Six-Pounders, commanded by Messrs. Biller, a Second Captain, Three Lieutenants and 105 Men; quite a new Vessel, Cutter built, and Stores complete for Three Months.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to approach your Throne with the most faithful and affectionate Attachment

tachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family and Government.

The present miserable State of France forms an instructive Contrast to the Security and Freedom which we enjoy under our happy Constitution. The Lenity and equal Justice of our Laws, and the Mildness of your Majesty's auspicious Government, cannot fail to unite the People of Ireland in the most effectual Measures for the Maintenance of those inestimable Blessings.

We sincerely rejoice that the Spirit of Insurrection, which was for some Time prevalent among some of the lower Orders of the People, is in general suppressed; and we trust that, by the Continuance of that Wisdom and Firmness which has been shewn by your Majesty's Government, they will be preserved in a due Sense of Order, and that the Machinations of those who may attempt to seduce them from their accustomed Loyalty will be defeated and punished.

We are happy to find that the Establishment of an effective Militia in this Kingdom has been carried successfully into Execution. The beneficial Consequences of that constitutional Force are already manifested.

We return your Majesty our sincere Thanks for the Appointment of Commissioners to execute the Office of your Majesty's Treasurer of the Exchequer in this Kingdom, in order that the Payment of the Civil List granted to your Majesty, and a regular Appropriation of the Revenue to distinct Services, may be carried into Execution in a Manner as conformable to the Practice of Great Britain as the relative Situation of this Kingdom will permit.

We shall continue our Attention and Encouragement to the Agriculture and Manufactures of Ireland, and particularly to the Linen Manufacture; and we shall give our accustomed Protection to the Protestant Charter Schools and other Institutions of Public Utility.

We humbly offer our Congratulations to your Majesty, that, by your Majesty's Exertions, the Trade of the Empire has been protected, and the Resources which the Enemy derived from their wealthy Colonies and extensive Trade have been cut off; that several of their unjust Conquests have been recovered; and that many of their Fortresses are possessed by the Forces of your Majesty and your Allies; whilst the Attempts of France to weaken the Security of our happy Constitution have entirely failed.

Your Majesty may confidently rely upon our firm Attachment and Loyalty; and we are determined strenuously to resist, with our Lives and Fortunes, the Efforts of our Enemies, in their desperate Endeavours to subvert every Principle of social Order, and to spread Confusion and Anarchy through every Government in Europe.

When Peace can be obtained, without surrendering the Honor of your Majesty's Crown, or sacrificing the present and future Security of your People and of the rest of Europe, we are satisfied of your Majesty's Determination to exert yourself, in Conjunction with your Allies, to attain that desirable Object.

We offer our sincere Thanks to your Majesty for continuing the Earl of Westmorland in the Government of this Kingdom. The Benefits which we have experienced under his Administration are Evidences of the faithful Representations made by him to your Majesty, and will animate our Zeal in co operating with his Exertions, under your Majesty's Auspices, for the Prosperity of Ireland.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgeesses, in Parliament assembled,

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the warmest Assurances of our Affection and Loyalty, and with the most cordial Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family and Government.

We feel with sensible Satisfaction that the vain Hope of shaking the Stability of your Majesty's Throne, or weakening the Security of our happy Constitution, which seems to have animated the French in their unprovoked Declaration of War, has entirely failed.

We beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty, that not only many of the unjust and oppressive Conquests of the French have been wrested from them, but that the Forces of your Majesty and of your Allies are in Possession of many important Fortresses which belonged to them; and whilst the Advantages which France derived from her extensive Trade and opulent Colonies have been cut off, the Commerce of your Subjects has been generally protected by the Superiority of your Majesty's Fleets.

We have seen with Satisfaction the Suppression of those Outrages and Insurrections which so recently disgraced some of the lower Orders of the People. We are sensible of the Vigor of your Majesty's Government in checking those Disorders, and we shall continue our Exertions till this dangerous Spirit be finally extinguished. We trust that all future Attempts to seduce the lower Classes from their usual Subordination and Loyalty will be defeated, and that the Instigators of such Violences will be brought to condign Punishment.

We acknowledge the beneficial Effects of a National Militia, which has been so successfully established, whilst it presents the best Security against internal Disturbance, it has afforded a considerable Augmentation to the general Force of the Empire.

We cannot sufficiently express our Acknowledgements to your Majesty, for appointing a Commission under the Great Seal to execute the Office of Lord High Treasurer of Ireland, in order to guard the Payment of your Majesty's Civil List, and the strict Appropriation of the Revenue to distinct Services.

We shall with Cheerfulness grant such Supplies, as the extraordinary Exigencies of the Times and the Honor of your Majesty's Crown and Government shall require, knowing that we are engaged in a Contest for our Freedom, Property and Religion. We are ready to support those inestimable Blessings with our Lives and Fortunes.

We shall attend with due Regard to the great Interests of Agriculture, Commerce and Manufactures, and particularly to the Linen Manufacture, and we shall support the Protestant Charter Schools, and the other Public Institutions which are committed to our Protection, with accustomed Liberality.

We sincerely thank your Majesty for your gracious Reliance upon the Loyalty and Attachment of your People of Ireland. We should be indeed insensible of that Happiness which we enjoy under the mild Spirit of our Religion, and the temperate Administration of a just Government, if we were not strenuously resolved to resist those Attacks which threaten the Subversion of every Principle that gives Security to our Persons and Properties; and when we consider the desperate Designs of those Men, who are endeavouring to plunge every Government of Europe in Confusion and Anarchy, and to erect their own Power on the Ruins of Law and Order, your Majesty must be

be assured of our determined Resolution to support your Majesty's Efforts in averting such dreadful Calamities from your faithful People.

We are highly gratified with your gracious Declaration from the Throne, that your Majesty's Object is Peace; and that you will exert yourself, in Conjunction with your Allies, whenever that desirable Object can be obtained, without surrendering the Honour of your Crown, or sacrificing the present and future Security of your People, and of the Rest of Europe.

We sincerely thank your Majesty for continuing the Earl of Westmorland in the Government of this Kingdom, in whose Vigilance we can depend for the Preservation of internal Tranquillity, and under whose Administration the Constitution of Ireland has been substantially improved.

We are confident of the faithful Representations which your Excellency has made of us to His Majesty, and to our zealous Co-operation with your Excellency in promoting the Welfare of Ireland, we shall add our earnest Endeavours to contribute to the Ease and Honor of your Excellency's Administration.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burghesses, in Parliament assembled.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to lay before your Excellency our cordial Thanks for your most excellent Speech from the Throne to both Houses of Parliament.

We congratulate your Excellency that the Hopes of France, in their unprovoked Declaration of War, have been entirely disappointed by the Arms of His Majesty and his Allies. We feel assured that the Firmness of His Majesty's Throne and the Stability of the Constitution of Great Britain and Ireland stand unshaken and unimpaired. We learn, with Satisfaction, that many of the important Fortresses which belonged to the French are in Possession of His Majesty and his Allies; that most of the oppressive Conquests of our Enemies have been wrested from them; and that the Resources derived from their colonial Opulence and extensive Commerce have been almost entirely

tirely cut off, whilst a general Protection has been afforded to the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects.

We acknowledge the vigorous Interposition of your Excellency's Government, which has suppressed that Disposition to Infurrection which was for some Time prevalent among some of the lower Order of the People, and are persuaded that no Exertion will be wanting, on your Part, to impress on their Minds a due Sense of Subordination and Order. We shall heartily concur in whatever Measures may be deemed effectual to defeat or punish the Machinations of those who may attempt to seduce their accustomed Loyalty, and stimulate them to Acts of Sedition and Outrage.

We are highly gratified that the Institution of a National Militia has been successful, and that the People are reconciled to this constitutional Establishment: Its salutary Effects are universally felt in the Return of internal Tranquillity, which it secures, and in the Increase it has afforded to the Public Force of the Empire.

We are truly pleased with your Excellency's Communication from the Throne, that His Majesty has appointed a Commission, under the Great Seal, to execute the Office of High Treasurer in this Kingdom, in order that the Payment of the Civil List granted to the King, and a regular Appropriation of the Revenue to distinct Services, may be carried into Execution in a Manner as conformable to the Practice of Great Britain as the relative Situation of this Kingdom will permit. When we combine this important Measure with those salutary Bills of Regulation, which passed in the last Session, respecting the Grants of Offices and Pensions, and the Revenue of the Crown, we must be fully convinced of your Excellency's Knowledge of our real Interests, and of your efficient Exertions to promote them.

We thank your Excellency for ordering the National Accounts, as well as Estimates for the Service of the ensuing Year, to be laid before us. If the Exigencies of the Time shall require an extraordinary Supply and additional Resources, we shall not forget that we are engaged in a War of absolute Necessity for the Preservation of our Liberty, Properties and Religion; and we shall, at the same Time, consult the true Interest of the Kingdom, and maintain the Honor of His Majesty's Crown.

We shall afford the usual Support to the Protestant Charter Schools and the other Institutions of general Utility, which have been long the Object of our Attention; and we shall direct our serious Care to promote the Agriculture, the Commerce, the Manufactures, and particularly the Linen Manufacture, of this Kingdom.

His Majesty's faithful People will continually endeavour to deserve that Confidence which His Majesty reposes in their Loyalty and Attachment: They will maintain their Religion and Constitution against the unjust Aggression of France, and will resist, with their Lives and Fortunes, the Efforts of those desperate Men, who are endeavouring to erect their Dominion on the Ruins of Law and Order, and to spread Confusion and Anarchy through every Government of Europe.

We are sincerely convinced that His Majesty will, in Conjunction with his Allies, use every favorable Occasion to effectuate a desirable Peace, whenever this great End can be procured without surrendering the Honor of his Crown or sacrificing the present or future Security of his People, and of the rest of Europe.

We are sensible of the Fidelity with which your Excellency represents our Exertions in His Majesty's

Service; and having experienced the beneficial Effect of your Excellency's Administration, we entertain an earnest Hope that His Majesty may long continue your Excellency in the Government of this Kingdom.
