THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, ht to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or hy the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February: And it being judged expe dient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid-Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next, inclusive: Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Ast passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at he first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any fuch Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the faid Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the faid Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any fuch Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the fecond Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recall fuch Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, fuch Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose. And whereas, in pursuance of the Powers veited in His Majesty by the said A&, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleafed, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 28th of August last, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein mentioned and referred to) until the 30th of November then enfuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg. Pease, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare and order, that from and after the Date of the faid Order, until the Thirtieth Day of November then ensuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg Oats,

Oats, or Oatmeal; and also import into any Port or Place in that Pare of Littein called Scotland, and to take cotted Lailey, for Home Consumption, any Port Lailey, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Port 1 of the second Low Duty only, mentional in the said Table marked E. and no other.

First whereas by an Order in Council, dated the Twenty-feventh Day of November last, it was ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Cats, or any other Meal-Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England; and also the faid Prohibidea to export Peafe, Beans or Oats, or any Meal-Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Post or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibitions in the said Order mentioned and referred to, should be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of March, 1794; and also that the faid Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Confumption, any Foreign Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal, and the faid Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Peafe, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the fecond Low Duty only, in the faid Order contained, should be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of March, 1794.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ending the Fifteenth Day of February, 1794, that the General Average Prices of Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatineal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Foreign Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the faid Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, purfuant to the Powers given by the faid Ast, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision respecting the said Prohibition in the faid Order mentioned and referred to, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of June, 1794.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of February, 1794, that the General Average Price of Oats, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, is above the Price at which Foreign

Oats are allowed by Law to be imported at the firft Low Duty specified in the faid Table marked E.; His Majorry, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the faid Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Oats from any Fort or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Proviiion, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the faid Order mentioned and referred to, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of June, 1794. And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforefaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Bear or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal, on Payment of the fecond Low Duty only, mentioned in the faid Table marked E. and no other, in the faid Order contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Fourth Day of June, 1794.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Vienna, February 8. A Shock of an Earthquake was very sensibly felt in this Capital on Thursday last, at about One o'Clock, P. M.

Whitehall, February 26, 1794.

Whereas it has been bumbly represented to His Majesty, that, early in the Morning of Sunday the 19th of January last, a large Ging of Smugglers, to the Number of Forty or more, armed with Fire Arms, assembled in the Neighbourhood of Chrischen in the County of Southampton, for the Furpose of running and assisting in the landing of a Cargo of Foreign Spirituous Liquors and other uncustomed Goods, out of a large Tub-Boat; and that John Williams and James Cammell, Two Officers of His Majesty's Customs, being cruizing in their respective Boats on the Coast near the said Place, discovered the said Tub-Boat; which appeared to be deeply laden, and attempted to make Seizure of the fame, but in so doing they and their Boats Crew were repea-tedly fired at by the Smugglers on Board the said Tub-Boat, and likewise by a Number of other Persons of the same Party, who were on the Shore for the Space of Three Hours, during which Time they were thereby prevented from approaching the said Boat, and making Seizure thereof, until a Party of the South Hampsbire Militia arriving, they were, with their Assistance, enabled to overpower the Smugglers and make Seizure of the faid Boat and Cargo, which confifted of upwards of One Thousand Four Hundred Gallons of Foreign Spirituous Liquers, besides Thirteen Bales of Tobacco.

And whereas Information having been given upon Oath of the above Facts, Two Perjons named Michael Bonner and John Woodgate have already been appre-bended and committed to take their Trial for the faid Offence at the Assizes to be holden at Winchester, in and for the County of Southampton: And whereas a Perfon named Nicholas Briggs, who is supposed to be the Master of the said Boat, appears to have been One of the faid Gang at the Time this Outrage was committed; but the faid Nicholas Briggs, and the Rest of the Persons concerned have not yet been taken.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Nicholas Briggs, or any other of the Persons concerned in this atrocious Opence, who are not yet apprehended, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Parden to any One of them who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that any One or more of them may be apprehended and conwitted of the faid Offence.
