HIS Day the Lords being met, a Mesfage was fent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several As agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for

the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Ait for preventing Money or Effects, in the Hands of His Majesty's Subjects, belonging to or difposeable by Persons resident in France, being applied to the Uje of the Persons exercifing the Powers of Governmem in France; and for preserving the Property thereof for the Benefit of the individual Owners thereof.

An A.1 for repoaling the Stamp Duties on Gloves and Mittens fold by Retail.

An Act for repealing the Duties on the Registry of Burials, Births, Marriages and Christenings.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have emitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments; and to indemnify Justices of the Peace, or others, who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities. Corporations and Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be samped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or mistaid, and for allowing them Time is provide Admissions duly stamped; to give further Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to

Attornies and Solicitors; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace, within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the
