

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare; and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of the said Island of Martique, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in the West Indies.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to affect or dispense with any of the Provisions contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date this Day, prohibiting the Resort of Aliens to the said Island without Licence for that Purpose.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is highly important to the internal Tranquillity and future Security of the Islands, or Territories, Parts of Islands, in the West Indies, which, since the Commencement of the present War, have been conquered by His Majesty's Arms, or surrendered to His Majesty, to prevent, during the Continuance of the said War, too great a Resort to such Islands, or Parts of Islands, of Persons not Subjects to His Majesty, and particularly of such as are Enemies to His Majesty; His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Person, being an Alien, who shall have been a Subject of His late Most Christian Majesty, or shall be under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, shall resort or go to such Parts of the Island of St. Domingo as are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, or to the Island of Martinique, or to any other Islands or Parts of Islands in the West Indies, Part of the Dominions of His late Most Christian Majesty, which are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, during the said War, without special Licence first had and obtained

from His Majesty, or from the Governor appointed by His Majesty, or, in his Absence, the Lieutenant-Governor so appointed, or the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively, or some Persons or Person authorized to grant such Licence by His Majesty, or by such Commander in Chief at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively: And it is further ordered; that no such Alien shall be permitted to land in any of the said Islands, or Parts of Islands, so in the Possession of His Majesty, without such Licence as aforesaid: But nevertheless His Majesty is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing in this Order contained shall be construed or taken in any Manner to affect any Treaty or Capitulation made or entered into upon the Conquest or Surrender of such Islands or Parts of Islands respectively, or any Article or Thing in any such Treaty or Capitulation contained: And the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors so appointed by His Majesty in the said Islands and Parts of Islands, and the Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica and the Leeward Islands respectively, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain:

Whitehall, May 17:

THE King having been pleased to order that the Colours taken at Martinico, which were lately brought to the Palace at St. James's, should be deposited in the Cathedral of St. Paul; and this Day being appointed for that Purpose, proper Detachments of Horse and Foot Guards were ordered to parade at St. James's at Ten o'Clock, and marched before His Majesty (who was pleased to see them pass by) in the following Order:

A Captain and Forty Life Guards;
A Serjeant and Twelve Grenadiers,
Music of the First Regiment of Guards,
Twenty-nine Serjeants with the French Colours,
Four Companies of Grenadiers.

A Field Officer and One Hundred of the Life Guards:
In this Manner they proceeded to the West Gate of St. Paul's, where the Colours were received by the Dean and Chapter, attended by the Choir; about which Time the Guns at the Tower and in St. James's Park were fired.

The said Colours are to be put up in some public Part of the said Cathedral Church, as a lasting Memorial of the Success of His Majesty's Arms, in the Reduction of the important Island of Martinico.
