The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been con-« cerned in advising or carrying into Execution an " Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-" jesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of " Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His " Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto," it was, amongst other Things, enacted, That His Majesty might, by Proclamation or Order in Council when He should see Cause, and for such Time as should be therein expressed, prohibit the exporting or carrying Coastwife, or the attempting to export or carry Coastwife, any Pot or Pearl-Ash, or other Articles, which should be judged by His Majesty to be capable of being converted into Naval or Military Stores, or made useful in increasing Naval or Military Stores; and it was thereby provided that His Majesty might, by special Licence under His Sign Manual, or in fuch Order in Council or Proclamation, make such Exception with respect to the Exportation or carrying Coastwife of any Pot or Pearl Ash, or other Articles as aforesaid, and such Regulations concerning the Manner of exporting or carrying the same Coastwise, as to Him, with the Advice of His Privy Council, should appear to be proper, specifying the faid Articles, and also the

Place and Places to and from which the same should or might be so exported or carried Coastwife: And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, doth therefore; with the Advice of His Privy Council, under the Authority of the faid Act, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Veslel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council; upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by the aforementioned Act: But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His-Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the Well Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena; or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies,

Indies, the Exporters of the faid Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS the Island of Martinique in the West Indies has been conquered by His Majetty's Forces, under the Command of General Sir Charles Grey and Vice-Admiral Sir John Jervis, and the faid Island is now in His Majesty's Possession: And whereas by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act ... more effectually to prevent, during the present War between Great Britain and France, all trai-44 torous Correspondence with, or Aid or Assistance " being given to His Majesty's Enemies," all Perfons refiding or being in Great Britain are prohibited, under the Penalties of High Treason, during the Continuance of the present War between Great Britain and France, from supplying, to or for the Use of any Person or Persons residing or being within any of the Dominions of France, or any Town, Territory, Port or Place annexed to France, or under the Government of the Perfons then exercifing, or who might thereafter, during the faid War, exercise the Powers of Government in France, divers Articles specified in the faid Act, without Licence from His Majesty, under His Sign Manual, or by Order in Council, or by Proclamation first had and obtained, specifying the Articles with respect to which the same shall be had and obtained, and also the Place and Places from which and to which the Tame shall be feat: His Majesty, taking the Premifes into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful to and for all Persons, residing or being in Great Britain, to fell, supply and deliver from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in or out of Europe, or in any Country in Amity with His Majesty, to the faid Island of Martinique, being in His Majesty's Possession, any of the Articles specified and enumerated in the before mentioned Act, subject, nevertheless, to such Duties. Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures as the Trade, in the faid several Articles to any of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations is or shall be liable to by Law; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the Exportation from Great Britain, or from any other of His Majesty's Dominions in or out of Europe, of any of the Articles aforefaid, which are or shall be prohibited to be exported otherwise than by the said Act.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Island of Martinique, subject, nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations and Islands in the West Indies, is or shall be subject by Law.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of the said Island of Martinique, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in the West Indies.

And His Majesty is pleased further to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to affect or dispense with any of the Provisions contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date this Day, prohibiting the Resort of Aliens to the said Island without Licence for that Purpose.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THEREAS it is highly important to the internal Tranquillity and future Security of the Islands, or Territories, Parts of Islands; in the West Indies, which, fince the Commencement of the present War, have been conquered by His Majesty's Arms, or furrendered to His Majesty, to prevent, during the Continuance of the faid War, too great a Refort to such Islands, or Parts of Islands, of Persons not Subjects to His Majesty, and particularly of such as are Edemies to His Majesty; His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Person, being an Alien, who shall have been a Subject of His late Most Christian Majesty, or shall be under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, shall refort or go to such Parts of the Island of St. Domingo as are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, or to the Island of Martinique, or to any other Islands or Parts of Islands in the West Indies, Part of the Dominions of His late Most Christian Majesty, which are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, during the said War, without special Licence first had and obtained from His Majesty, or from the Governor appointed by His Majesty, or, in his Absence, the Lieutenant-Governor so appointed, or the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively, or some Persons or Person authorized to grant fuch Licence by His Majesty, or by fuch Commander in Chief at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively: And it is further ordered, that no fuch Alien shall be permitted to land in any of the faid Islands, or Parts of Islands, so in the Possession of His Majesty, without such Licence as aforefaid: But nevertheless His Majesty is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing in this Order contained shall be construed or taken in any Manner to affect any Treaty or Capitulation made or entered into upon the Conquest or Surrender of such Islands or Parts of Islands respectively, or any Article or Thing in any fuch Treaty or Capitulation contained. And the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors so appointed by His Majesty in the said Islands and Parts of Islands, and the Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica and the Leeward Islands respectively, are to give the necessary. Directions herein as, to them may respectively appertain.

His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful to and for all Persons residing or being in Great Britain, to fell, supply and deliver from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in or out of Europe, or in any Country in Amity with His Majesty, to the said Island of St. Lucia, and also to the said Island of Guadaloupe, Marie Galante, and it's other Dependencies, being in His Majesty's Possession, any of the Articles specified and enumerated in the before mentioned Act, subject, nevertheless, to such Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties and Forseitures, as the Trade in the said several Articles, to any of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations, is or shall be liable to by Law: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the Exportation from Great Britain, or from any other of His Majesty's Dominions in or out of Europe, of any of the Articles aforesaid, which are or shall be prohibited to be exported otherwise than by the said Act.

And His Majesty is surther pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce or Manusacture of the said Island of St. Lucia, and also of the said Island of Guadaloups, Marie Galante, and it's other Dependencies, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties and Forseitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in the Well Indies.

And His Majesty is pleased surther to order and and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to effect or dispense with any of the Provisions contained in His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the 7th Day of this Instant, prohibiting the Resort of Aliens to such Parts of the Island of St. Domingo, as were or might be in the Possession of His Majesty, or to the Island of Martinique, or to any other Islands, or Parts of Islands, is the West Indies, Part of the Dominions of His late Most Christian Majesty, which were or might be in the Possession of His Majesty during the present War, without Licence for that Purpose.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directious herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

May it please your Majesty,

WE received with the utmost Respect and Gratitude the gracious Letter with which your Marjesty hath been pleased to honour this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. It affords us the highest Satisfaction to be assured that our unalterable Attachment to your Person and Government, and our Attention to the important Objects of our Meeting have, on former Occasions, made so favourable an Impression on your Royal Mind. We regard your Majesty's Commendation as a most pleasing Recompence for our past Services, and a most animating Inducement to persevere in that faithful Discharge of our Duty which your Majesty has graciously declared will insure to us the Continuance of your undiminished Considence and Affection.
