A LETTER was received Yesterday Evening from Admiral Earl Howe to Mr. Stephens, dated that Day, off of Dunnofe in the Isle of Wight, giving an Account of his safe Arrival with the Six captured French Ships of the Line mentioned in his former Letter of the 2d Instant, and with a great Part of His Majesty's Fleet under his Command, having

sent the Remainder into Plymouth Sound. The following are the Returns of the Killed and Wounded on Board His Majesty's Ships, in the Actions with the French Fleet on the 28th and 29th of May, and the 1st Instant; and also of the Numbers Killed and Wounded on Board the French Ships captured and sunk on the last mentioned Day.
