The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for preventing Money or Effects, in the Hands of His Majesty's Subjects, belonging to or disposeable by Persons resident in France, being applied to the Use of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, and for preserving the Property thereof for the Benefit of the individual Owners thereof," all Persons, residing or being in Great Britain, are forbidden, under the Penalties of High Treason, during the present War, to pay, send, supply or deliver, or cause to be paid, sent, supplied or delivered, either in Great Britain or France, or in any other Country, either by Payment or Remittance of any Bill of Exchange, Note, Draught, Obligation, or Order for Money, or in any other Manner whatsoever, any Money to or for the Use of the Persons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France, or to or for the Use of any Persons or Person who, on the First Day of January, 1794, were or are, or, at any Time since, have or has been, or who, at the Time of such Act done, should be within any of the Dominions of France, or any Country, Territory or Place which was, on the 1st Day of January, 1794, or which should be, during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, under the Government of the Per-

sons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France:—And all Persons, residing or being in Great Britain, are also prohibited, under the Pains and Penalties of the Statute of Prohibition and Præmunire, during the said War, to send, supply or deliver, or cause or procure to be sent, supplied or delivered, either in Great Britain, or in any other Country or Place whatsoever, to or for the Use of the Persons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France, or to or for the Use of any Persons or Person who, on the said First Day of January, 1794, were or was, or at any Time since had been, or, at the Time of such Act done, should be, within any of the Dominions of France, or in any Country, Territory or Place which was, on the said 1st Day of January, 1794, or which should, during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, be under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France: And all Persons residing or being in Great Britain are prohibited, under Penalties and Forfeitures specified in the said Act, to pay or satisfy in any Manner, during the said War, any Bill of Exchange, Note, Draught, Obligation or Order for Money, in Part or in the Whole, which, since the said First Day of January, 1794, has been, or, at any Time during the said War, shall be, drawn or accepted, or indorsed, or in any Manner negotiated in, or in any Manner sent from any Part of the Dominions of France, or any Country, Territory or Place which was, on the said First Day of January,

1794, or at any Time during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, shall be under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who should exercise the Powers of Government in France, or drawn, accepted or indorsed, or in any Manner negotiated by, or for the Use of, or upon the Credit of, or upon the Credit of the Effects of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, or of any Persons or Person who, on the said First Day of January, 1794, were or was, or at any Time since have or has been, or who, at the Time of such Act done, shall be, in any of the Dominions of France, or in any such Country, Territory or Place as aforesaid: And all Persons residing or being in Great Britain are prohibited, under the Penalties and Forfeitures specified in the said Act, to pay or otherwise satisfy, deliver or part with, any Money, Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Draughts, Obligations or Orders for Money, Securities for Money, Goods, Wares, Merchandizes or Effects whatsoever, of or belonging to the Persons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France, or to any Persons or Person who, on the said First Day of January, 1794, were or was, or at any Time since have or has been, or who, at the Time of such Act done, shall be, in any of the Dominions of France, or in any Country, Territory or Place which was, on the said First Day of January, 1794, or at any Time during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, shall be, under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who should exercise, the Powers of Government in France. And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that many Persons, who are Subjects of the United States of North America, and engaged in Houses of Trade established there, may have been, on and since the First Day of January, 1794, within the Dominions of France or other the Countries, Territories or Places then under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, while the Firms of such respective Houses have remained in North America, and transacted their ordinary Commercial Business with other Countries, and therefore the Commercial Intercourse between His Majesty's Subjects in Great Britain and the Subjects of the said United States, may be embarrassed by the Restrictions contained in the said Act, unless His Majesty shall, in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Act of Parliament, give His Royal Licence and Authority to enable Persons in Great Britain to do such Acts as shall be necessary for carrying on such Commercial Intercourse with North America, notwithstanding the Restrictions contained in the said Act, so far as may be consistent with the general Intent and Purposes of the said Act.

And whereas it has also been represented to His Majesty, that, from the extensive Effect of the foregoing Circumstances, considerable Delay and Inconvenience may arise, in case it shall be requisite to obtain a special Licence on every Occasion for such Purpose: And whereas by another Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for more effectually preserving Money or Effects in the Hands of His Majesty's Subjects belonging to or disposable by Persons resident in France, for the Benefit of the individual Owners thereof," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, that in all Cases in which His Majesty shall think proper to grant any Licence or Licences, general or special, by His Sign Manual, Order in Council or Proclamation, to do any Act or Acts under particular Circumstances, or upon special Terms or Conditions expressed in such Licences respectively, the Proof of the Existence of such Circumstances, and of the Performance of or Compliance with such Terms and Conditions, shall, in all Proceedings whatsoever, Criminal or Civil, lie on the Person or Persons acting under such Licences respectively, or claiming the Benefit thereof: His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful for any Person residing or being in Great Britain to pay any Bill drawn in any Part of North America by any House of Trade established in any Part of North America, upon any Persons or Person in Great Britain, and to pay any Sum or Sums of Money on Account of any House of Trade established in any Part of North America, notwithstanding any One or more of the House of Trade by whom such Bill shall have been drawn, or for whose Use such Bill, or Sum or Sums of Money, shall be paid, shall have been, or shall be, within any of the Dominions of France, or any Country, Territory or Place which was on the said First Day of January, 1794, or which since has been, or which shall be, during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France: Provided such Bill shall have been so drawn for the Purpose only of some Commercial Transaction bona fide between such House of Trade so established in North America and some House of Trade in Great Britain, or in some other Part of His Majesty's Dominions, or in some Country in Amity with His Majesty, or for the Purpose of some Commercial Transaction with France, relative to Articles not prohibited to be exported from this Kingdom to France, and shall not have been drawn for the Purpose, directly or indirectly, of carrying on any Commerce, other than as aforesaid, with, or making or providing any Remittance to France.

France, or any Country, Territory or Place which now is, or, at the Time of such Act done, shall be, under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who shall exercise, the Powers of Government in France:—And His Majesty is pleased further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful for any Person or Persons, residing or being in Great Britain, to send, supply, or deliver, and cause or procure to be sent, supplied or delivered, any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, to, for, or on Account of any House of Trade in North America, notwithstanding any One or more Person or Persons, engaged in such House of Trade, shall have been, or shall be within any of the Dominions of France, or any Country, Territory or Place, which was, on the 1st Day of January, 1794, or which since has been, or which shall be, during the said War, and at the Time of such Act done, under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who shall exercise, the Powers of Government in France.

Provided such Goods, Wares or Merchandize shall be so sent, supplied or delivered, *bonâ fide* for the sole Use and Benefit of such House of Trade in North America, and not for the Purpose, directly or indirectly, of carrying any Commerce with, or making or providing any Remittance to France, or any Country, Territory or Place which now is, or at the Time of such Act done, shall be, under the Government of the Persons exercising, or who shall exercise, the Powers of Government in France.

Provided also, that all and every Person and Persons who shall take the Benefit of such Licence hereby granted, shall so take the same, upon Condition that in case of any Proceeding, Criminal or Civil, under the Provisions of the said Act of Parliament, for any Thing alledged to have been done contrary thereto, any Question shall arise whether the Thing so done was authorized by the Licence hereby given, the Proof that such Thing was done under the particular Circumstances, according to the special Terms and Conditions required by this Order, shall lie on the Persons claiming the Benefit of such Licence.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is highly important to the internal Tranquillity and future Security of the Islands, or Territories, Parts of Islands, in the West Indies, which, since the Commencement of the present War, have been conquered by His Majesty's Arms, or surrendered to His Majesty, to prevent, during the Continuance of the said War, too great a

Resort to such Islands, or Parts of Islands, of Persons not Subjects to His Majesty, and particularly of such as are Enemies to His Majesty; His Majesty, taking the Premises into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Person, being an Alien, who shall have been a Subject of His late Most Christian Majesty, or shall be under the Government of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, shall resort or go to such Parts of the Island of St. Domingo as are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, or to the Island of Martinique, or to any other Islands or Parts of Islands in the West Indies, Part of the Dominions of His late Most Christian Majesty, which are or may be in the Possession of His Majesty, during the said War, without special Licence first had and obtained from His Majesty, or from the Governor appointed by His Majesty, or, in his Absence, the Lieutenant-Governor so appointed, or the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively, or some Persons or Person authorized to grant such Licence by His Majesty, or by such Commander in Chief at Jamaica or the Leeward Islands respectively: And it is further ordered, that no such Alien shall be permitted to land in any of the said Islands, or Parts of Islands, so in the Possession of His Majesty, without such Licence as afore-said: But nevertheless His Majesty is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby further ordered and declared, that nothing in this Order contained shall be construed or taken in any Manner to affect any Treaty or Capitulation made or entered into upon the Conquest or Surrender of such Islands or Parts of Islands respectively, or any Article or Thing in any such Treaty or Capitulation contained. And the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors so appointed by His Majesty in the said Islands and Parts of Islands, and the Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at Jamaica and the Leeward Islands respectively, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A Letter, of which the following is a Copy, was last Night received from Major-General Alexander Stewart, by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

S I R, *Ostend, June 15, 1794.*

I Think it my Duty to inform you, that Lieutenant-Colonel Pitcairn, with the 8th Light Dragoons and the 38th and 55th Regiments of Foot, joined this Garrison Yesterday Morning.

Major-General De Hammeritein, under whose Command they were, had failed in an Attack he made the Day before, on a very superior Force of the Enemy, at Ghits. After the Action he retreated to Thorout, and in the Night, falling back himself with the Hanoverians to Bruges, he ordered the British Troops to Ostend.

Lieutenant-Colonel Pitcairn speaks very favorably of the Conduct of these Regiments. Subjoined is a List of the Killed, Wounded and Missing.
