The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, expired upon the 7th Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 7th Day of this instant June, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of

Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the

Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of August next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is. and are thereby authorized, with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked

E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any such Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the said Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recall such Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose. And whereas, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 28th of August, 1793, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein mentioned and referred to) until the 30th of November then ensuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare and order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the Thirtieth Day of November then ensuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats, or Oatmeal; and also to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the Twenty-seventh Day of November, 1793, and by another Order dated the 26th Day of February,

1794, the Prohibitions and Permissions in the said Order contained were to continue and remain in Force until the 4th Day of June, 1794; in the Manner in the said Two last mentioned Orders respectively contained.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ending the Seventh Day of June, 1794, that the General Average Prices of Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order mentioned and referred to, shall be, and the same is hereby revived and shall continue in Force until the First Day of October, 1794.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of May, 1794, that the General Average Price of Oats, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, is above the Price at which Foreign Oats are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Oats from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order mentioned and referred to, shall be, and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in Force until the First Day of October, 1794. And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other, in the said Order contained, shall be, and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in Force until the First Day of October, 1794.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

A Letter, of which the following is a Copy, has been this Morning received from His Royal Highness the Duke of York by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

S I R,

*Renais, June 28, 1794.*

HAVING received Intelligence, on Tuesday Night, that the Enemy had moved forward in great Force upon General Clairfayt's Position, and that they had detached a Corps to attack Oudenarde, I found it absolutely necessary, for the Defence of the Scheldt, to march immediately to this Place, as from hence I could, with greater Facility, support that Place, and move upon any Point at which they might attempt to force a Passage.

The Enemy obliged General Clairfayt to abandon his Position at Deynse, and fall back upon Ghent on Wednesday, where they again attacked him the next Day, but were fortunately repulsed.

This Retreat of General Clairfayt rendered it impossible for General Walmoden to support himself with so small a Body of Troops as he had under his Command at Bruges. He therefore found it necessary to abandon that Place on Thursday, and to fall back to Landmarck, and join General Clairfayt's Right Flank.

The Consequences of these last Movements, though necessary, are exceedingly unpleasant, as all immediate Communication with Ostend is cut off.

Yesterday the Enemy made another Attempt upon Oudenarde, which they cannonaded the whole Day, and even carried in the Afternoon the Fauxbourg; but were driven out again in the Night, and have now retreated to a small Distance.

Yesterday Evening I received the disagreeable Intelligence of the Prince of Cobourg's having failed in his Attack upon the French Army at Gosselies and Fleurus, as well as of the Surrender of Charleroi.

Enclosed I send a Translation of the Account which I have received from the Prince of Cobourg.

*Report of the Action of the 26th of June, 1794, near Fleurus.*

*Marbais, June 26, 1794.*

ALTHOUGH there was great Reason to suspect that Charleroi was already in the Hands of the Enemy, yet, as no certain Intelligence could possibly be procured, the Attack, which had been determined upon for its Relief, became necessary, to prevent the Fate of so important a Place as Charleroi being left to Chance.

In consequence, the Army marched on the 25th in Five Columns, and early on the Morning of the 26th attacked the Enemy's entrenched Position between Lambusart, Espinies and Gosselies.

The Attack, which was executed with great Resolution, was every where successful, and the Enemy's advanced Corps, although protected by strong Redoubts, were driven back. In the Evening the Left Wing arrived at the principal Heights on this Side the Sambre.

The Ground here forms a gentle Declivity, which the Enemy had fortified by a very extensive Line of Redoubts, in which they had brought an immense Number of Cannon. Notwithstanding these Obstacles, the Left Wing attempted to force the Enemy's Position with fixed Bayonets. But the Surrender of Charleroi, which took Place on the Evening of the 25th, having enabled the Enemy to reinforce themselves with the Besieging Army, and thus to bring the greatest

Part

Part of their Force against our Left Wing, this Advantage, added to those of their Situation, and of the Quantity of heavy Artillery, enabled them to repulse our Attack. The Troops, nevertheless, formed again under the Fire of the Enemy's Guns, and would have renewed the Attack with the same Resolution, had not the Certainty of the Fall of Charleroi, now confirmed by the Reports of Prisoners, and by several other Circumstances, determined our General Officers not to expose their brave Troops any further. They halted to remove the Wounded, and to give the Infantry Time to rest, and then began the Retreat, which was effected, with the greatest Order, as far as Marbais, where the Army passes this Night, and will march to Nivelles To-morrow, to cover the Country as far as is possible, and to protect Namur.

Our Loss is not very considerable, and may perhaps amount to 1500 Men. No Cannon have been lost, but a Howitzer and One Colour have been taken from the Enemy.

Whitehall, July 1.

By a Letter received from Lieutenant-General the Earl of Moira, dated the 29th of last Month, it appears, that his Lordship and the Troops under his Command had arrived at Malle, Four Miles from Bruges, on the great Causeway to Ghent. It also appears, by a Letter from Colonel Vyse, dated at Ostend on the same Day, that he was then embarking the 8th, 33d, and 44th Regiments, and the Rest of the Troops, Artillery and Stores, intending to evacuate that Place.

Vienna, June 11.

On Sunday Morning last the Empress was safely delivered of a Princess, who was christened on Monday, and called after her Godmother the Queen of Naples.
