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*St. James's, July 1.*

**T**HE King and Queen set out from Windsor on Thursday the 26th of last Month, early in the Morning, for Portsmouth, accompanied by Their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Augusta and Elizabeth, and attended by Lady Courtown, Lady Frances Howard, and Lady Caroline Waldegrave; and, arriving at Portsea Bridge about Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, were saluted, on their entering the Lines, by the Guns at that Barrier.

On their Arrival at the Lion Gate Their Majesties were received by General Sir William Augustus Pitt, K. B. Governor of Portsmouth, who delivered to the King the Keys of the Garrison, which His Majesty was pleased to return to him.

On Their Majesties entering the Lion Gate, the Guns round the whole Ramparts were fired, beginning at the Battery next to that Gate, and ending with the Block-House Battery on the Gosport Side.

Their Majesties then proceeded to the Dock-Yard, and arrived at the Commissioner's House at Half past Ten o'Clock, where they were received at the Door by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Board of Admiralty, the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces, the Master-General of the Ordnance, the Earl of Harrington Goldstick in Waiting, Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Bart. Commanding Officer in the Port, and by the Commissioners of the Navy and Victualling, &c. At Twelve o'Clock Their Majesties, with the Princesses Augusta and Elizabeth, and Their Royal Highnesses Prince Ernest Augustus, with the Princesses Mary, Sophia and Amelia, (who arrived at the Commissioner's House the Night before) went to the King's Stairs, where they embarked in the Barge prepared for their Reception, the Royal Standard being immediately hoisted, and, attended by the Earl of Chatham, First Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty, proceeded to Spithead; Admiral Sir Peter Parker, in his Barge with his Flag flying, leading the Procession, and the Board of Admiralty in their Barge carrying the Flag of their Office, immediately preceding the King's Barge, which was followed by Admiral Sir Alexander Hood, K. B. and Rear-Admiral Gardner, in their Barges, by those of Rear-Admirals Bowyer and Pasley, (though they were unable to attend themselves) having their respective Flags flying, and by the Captains of all the Line of Battle Ships at Portsmouth and Spithead, and of the Frigates of the Channel Fleet, in their respective

Boats, with Pendants flying, in Two Lines, according to their Seniority.

As Their Majesties passed the Garrison they were saluted with Twenty-one Guns from the Battery on the Platform, and, when the Royal Standard was seen from the Fleet at Spithead, they were saluted in the same Manner by the several Ships there, which was repeated by the Guns on the Platform; and as they passed the Ships (all of which were manned on their Lower and Topmast Shrouds) their Companies gave Three Cheers; the Guard being turned out, bearing a March, and the Officers saluting.

On Their Majesties going on board the Queen Charlotte, the Royal Standard was hoisted at the Main Topmast Head, the Flag of the Lord High Admiral at the Fore Topmast Head, and the Union Flag at the Mizzen Topmast Head; the Admiralty Flag was directly afterwards hoisted on board the Queen, at which Time the Flags of Admiral Earl Howe and Rear-Admiral Gardner were removed, and hoisted on board the Pegasus and Latona; the Standard was immediately saluted by the whole Fleet, as before; the Queen (in which the Admiralty Flag was flying) having fired Two Guns as a Signal for that Purpose, and the Salute was answered by an equal Number of Guns from the Battery on the Platform.

The King, on his coming upon the Quarter-Deck, presented Admiral Earl Howe with a Sword, richly set with Diamonds, and likewise with a Gold Chain to be worn about the Neck; and he also presented Admiral Sir Alexander Hood, Rear-Admiral Gardner, and Sir Roger Curtis First Captain of the Fleet, with similar Chains; to each of which is to be suspended a Medal now preparing for that Purpose.

Their Majesties and the Royal Family, having partaken of a cold Collation with Admiral Earl Howe, went into their Barge about Six o'Clock, attended by the Earl of Chatham; and returned into the Harbour in the same Order of Procession in which they went to Spithead, with this Difference only, that Admiral Earl Howe, in his Barge with the Union Flag hoisted, led the Procession instead of Admiral Sir Peter Parker, who took his Station in the Rear immediately after the King's Barge; the Ships at Spithead and the Battery on the Platform saluting as before. On their Arrival in the Harbour, they rowed round the French Prizes captured by Admiral Earl Howe, and then returned to the Commissioner's House.

Friday, June 27.

Their Majesties and the Royal Family this Morning viewed, amongst other Parts of the Dock-Yard, several of the Storehouses, the Sail-Loft, Rigging-House, the new South Dock, the Double Dock, and Basin, (going on board and viewing in their Way Le Pompée, of 74 Guns, lately brought from Toulon); the Smith's Old Shop, where the Anchor-Smiths were at Work in forging Parts of Two large Anchors; and afterwards proceeded, in their Carriages escorted by a Party of the Life-Guards, to the Governor's House in the Garrison, where His Majesty had a Public Levee; at which the Ministers and Nobility, as well as the Admirals and Captains of the Channel Fleet who could attend, were present (the latter of whom had the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand) and also several other Officers, Civil and Military, who came to pay their Duty to His Majesty, who was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Samuel Marshall, Esq. One of the Commissioners, and William Rule, Esq. One of the Surveyors, of His Majesty's Navy.

The Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Town were introduced, and presented the following Address to the King, viz.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most faithful Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of Portsmouth, with infinite Satisfaction and Joy, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, to offer our Congratulations on your Majesty's Arrival in this your ancient and most loyal Borough.

Anxious for the Glory of your Majesty's Reign, and the Prosperity of your Dominions, we rejoice at the signal Victory, which the extraordinary Exertions of the British Fleet have lately obtained.

The intrepid and judicious Conduct of the Commander in Chief, the spirited Behaviour of the Officers, the heroic Valour of the Seamen, Marines and Soldiers, must ever be remembered with the warmest Emotions, demand our highest Expressions of Gratitude, and be distinguished with unexampled Lustre in the Annals of this Kingdom.

We reflect, with Concern, upon the wretched State of Anarchy and Confusion to which a neighbouring Nation is reduced; from their Misfortunes we learn an instructive Lesson, and, by contemplating their Distresses, we know how to value the British Constitution.

With Hearts full of Zeal and Attachment, we beg to assure your Majesty of our determined Resolution to discountenance and resist every Kind of Innovation and Disorder that may, (but which we trust will never) arise in this Country, and to approve ourselves your Majesty's most dutiful, loyal and affectionate Subjects.

THEY afterwards were introduced to the Queen, and presented the following Address to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the ancient Borough of Portsmouth, with the purest Sentiments of Respect, embrace this glorious Occasion of presenting our humble Duty to your Majesty.

The exalted Qualities of your Mind, the great Example of every public and private Virtue for which your Majesty has been so long and so eminently distinguished, fill our Minds with the highest Sense of Gratitude and Affection.

Long may your Majesty continue to witness the Success of the British Arms against all our Enemies, and may the noble Victory, we celebrate, be only the Harbinger of others, greater and more important, until the Blessings of Peace and Tranquillity shall be restored, and nothing remain to disturb the Comfort and Happiness of your Majesty and your Family, to the latest Posterity.

They were all received very graciously, and had the Honour to kiss Their Majesties Hands.

WHEN the Levee was over, Their Majesties and the Royal Family returned, in their Carriages escorted as before, to the Dock-Yard, where His Majesty viewed several of the Storehouses, the Masthouses, and other Buildings, which he had not visited before; and afterwards the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Earl Howe, and the other Flag Officers of the Channel Fleet who were able to attend, together with the First Captain of the said Fleet, the Admiral commanding in Chief in the Port, the Master-General of the Ordnance, the Governor of the Garrison, and some of Their Majesties Suite, had the Honour to dine at the King's Table in the Commissioner's House.

About Six o'Clock Their Majesties and the Royal Family embarked in the King's Barge, in which the Royal Standard was immediately hoisted, attended by the Earl of Chatham as before, by the Board of Admiralty and the Commissioners of the Navy in their Barges, with the Flags of their respective Offices flying, and by Admiral Sir Peter Parker and the Flag Officers of the Channel Fleet (who were able to attend) in their Barges, with their respective Flags flying also, and proceeded up the Harbour to view the French Prizes taken and brought in by Admiral Earl Howe's Fleet; and, having visited each of them, returned in the Evening to the Commissioner's House, before which a great Number of the Artificers and Workmen of the Yard were drawn up, and sung "God save the King," "Rule Britannia," &c.

Saturday, June 28.

The King this Morning viewed some other Parts of the Dock-Yard; and afterwards Their Majesties and the Royal Family proceeded, in their Carriages escorted as on the preceding Day, to the Governor's House in the Garrison; on the Parade before which the South Gloucester Militia, under the Command of the Earl of Berkeley, were drawn up for His Majesty's Inspection, who expressed himself highly satisfied with their Appearance. Their Majesties and the Royal Family then returned, in their Carriages under the same Escort, to the Gun-Wharf, where they were received by the Master-General of the Ordnance; and, having viewed the New Armory and the different Storehouses, His Majesty was pleased to express his great Satisfaction at the Order in which every Thing was kept, and then proceeded to the Dock-Yard, where the Prince of Wales (a fine Second Rate of 98 Guns) was soon afterwards launched; His Royal Highness Prince Ernest Augustus performing the usual Ceremony of naming her.

In the Interval, between Their Majesties and the Princesses entering the Pavilion prepared for their Reception, and the Ship's going off, several of the Artificers and Workmen of the Yard, who were drawn up near to the Ship and opposite the Royal Pavilion, sung again "God save the King," "Rule Britannia," &c. &c.

The Launch of the above mentioned Ship was performed in the completest Manner, and to the general Satisfaction of Their Majesties, the Royal Family and the numerous Spectators, who filled every Part of the Yard, and the Ships in the Harbour, within View; which, added to the great Number of Sailing Vessels and Boats attending upon the Occasion, and the Fineness of the Day, exhibited the most brilliant and charming Spectacle that can be imagined.

When the Launch was over, Their Majesties and the Royal Family repaired to the King's Stairs, embarked on Board the Barge, where the Standard was immediately hoisted, and, attended by the Board of Admiralty, the Flag Officers and Captains in their respective Barges, with their Colours and Pennants flying, proceeded to Spithead, and were saluted, as they came in Sight, with 21 Guns, from the Platform Battery, and from each of the Ships at Spithead, which

which were manned, had their Guard turned out, and cheered, as before.

Their Majesties and the Royal Family, on their Arrival at Spithead, went on board the Aquilon Frigate of 32 Guns, commanded by the Honorable Captain Stopford, attended by the Board of Admiralty and Admiral Sir Peter Parker, when the Royal Standard was hoisted at the Main Toppallant-Mast Head, the Lord High Admiral's Flag at the Fore Toppallant-Mast Head, and the Union Flag at the Mizzen Toppallant-Mast Head, the other Ships saluting as before. The Board of Admiralty then repaired on board the Niger Frigate of 32 Guns, commanded by the Honorable Captain Legge, when the Flag of their Office was hoisted at her Main Toppallant-Mast Head, and Admiral Sir Peter Parker returned to his proper Ship. Shortly afterwards both Frigates got under Sail, and stood with a fine Breeze towards the Needles; and, on their Arrival off Cowes, Their Majesties were saluted by the Monarch of 74 Guns, on board which Rear-Admiral Sir James Wallace's Flag was flying, also by the Andromache Frigate and the Hornet Sloop, under his Command, and by the Perseus Frigate, all of which were lying there, were manned in their Shrouds, had their Guard turned out, and cheered as Their Majesties passed.

The Tide being nearly spent, and the Wind not favorable for going back in the Frigates to Spithead, Their Majesties and the Royal Family, the Board of Admiralty, and the Admiral Earl Howe, returned in their respective Barges to the Dock-Yard, where they arrived about Ten o'Clock in the Evening.

*Sunday, June 29.*

Their Majesties and the Royal Family went this Morning to the Chapel in the Dock-Yard, attended by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Board of Admiralty, Admiral Earl Howe, the Admirals and other Officers of the Fleet, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and the Commissioners of the Navy and Victualling, &c. where Prayers were read by the Reverend Mr. Howell, and a Sermon, suitable to the Occasion, was afterwards preached by the Reverend Mr. Scott, Chaplain to the Ordinary. Their Majesties and the Royal Family then went to see the Ship, (launched the Day before) which had been taken into Dock to be coppered; an Operation then in Hand, and which was compleatly performed in Eight Hours and Ten Minutes. His Majesty, after inspecting very minutely every Part of the Ship, and going to the Bottom of the Dock to see the Copper Sheathing put on, returned, with the Queen and Royal Family, to the Commissioner's House, where the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, Admiral Earl Howe, Admiral Sir Alexander Hood, Rear-Admiral Gardner, Sir Roger Curtis, and the Post Captains of the Channel Fleet, had the Honor of dining at His Majesty's Table; previous to which Rear-Admiral Gardner had the Honor to kiss His Majesty's Hand upon being appointed Major-General of Marines.

When Dinner was over, Their Majesties and the Royal Family went, in their Carriages escorted as before, to the Governor's House in the Garrison; and His Majesty, Prince Ernest Augustus, the Commander in Chief of the Forces, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and other General Officers, &c. having walked entirely round the Whole of the Ramparts, came back to the Governor's House, and, with the Queen and Royal Family, afterwards went up to the Queen's Bastion adjoining, and then, escorted as before, returned in the Evening to the Commissioner's House in the Dock-Yard.

*Monday, June 30.*

His Majesty this Morning went to see the Prince of Wales, which (having been completely coppered

in the Course of Yesterday, as before mentioned) was put out of Dock and afloat in the Harbour, and returned afterwards to the Commissioner's House, where His Majesty was pleased to signify his Intention of granting the Dignity of a Baronet of Great Britain to Charles Saxton, Esq<sup>r</sup> the Resident Commissioner, and conferred the Honor of Knighthood on Captain Bayne of the Queen's Regiment, in consequence of which they had both the Honor of kissing His Majesty's Hand. Their Majesties and the Royal Family went afterwards, about Nine o'Clock, to the King's Stairs, embarked on board the King's Barge, where the Royal Standard was immediately hoisted, and proceeded to Spithead; Admiral Earl Howe, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Admirals and Captains, in their several Barges, (with their respective Colours and Pendants hoisted as before) attending; and, upon coming in View of the Battery on the Platform, were saluted with Twenty-one Guns from that Battery, followed by the Guns round the Ramparts, and, when the Royal Standard came in Sight of the Fleet at Spithead, they were saluted by the same Number of Guns from each of the Ships there.

On their Arrival at Spithead Their Majesties and the Royal Family went on Board the Aquilon Frigate, when the Royal Standard, with the Lord High Admiral's Flag and the Union Flag, were hoisted, and Their Majesties were saluted by the Ships at Spithead as before; and, soon afterwards, the Aquilon made Sail with a fair Wind to Southampton, (attended by the Niger Frigate) where they and the Royal Family landed about Two o'Clock, and immediately proceeded to Windsor, and arrived there, in perfect Health, at Ten the same Evening.

The Shores, both on the Portsmouth and Gosport Side, were lined with an incredible Number of People, whenever Their Majesties and the Royal Family went from the Dock-Yard by Water, who expressed their Loyalty to Their Majesties, as they passed along, by Acclamations and other Demonstrations of Joy; and the Houses, as well as the Steeple of the Church in the Town of Portsmouth, and the Houses and Buildings in Portsea and Gosport, were illuminated every Night (except Sunday) during Their Majesties Stay; and several transparent Paintings and other Devices, which had been prepared for the Occasion, were exhibited in different Parts of those Towns.

The King was pleased to express the highest Approbation of the Forwardness in which he found the Refitment of the Channel Fleet, of the excellent Condition of the Dock-Yard, Arsenal and Garrison, and of the Regularity with which every Thing was conducted; and shewed the utmost Satisfaction at the Demonstrations of Loyalty and Affection with which Their Majesties and the Royal Family were received wherever they went by all Ranks of People.

The Weather was remarkably fine during the whole Time Their Majesties and the Royal Family remained at Portsmouth, and every Thing seemed in an eminent Degree to favour the Royal Visit.

His Majesty, before he left Portsmouth, was graciously pleased to give Orders for Donations to be made, out of his Privy Purse, to the Artificers, Workmen and Labourers of the Dock-Yard, including the Ordinary, to the Workmen and Labourers of the Victualling and Ordnance Departments at the Port, and to the Crews of the Queen Charlotte and Aquilon and the Chatham Yacht, similar in Proportion to their Numbers to those which were made when His Majesty was at Portsmouth in 1773. And His Majesty was also graciously pleased to order One Hundred Pounds to be distributed to the Poor of each of the Parishes of Portsmouth and Portsea, Fifty Pounds to the Poor of Gosport, and Fifty Pounds to the Debtors in Portsmouth Goal, amounting, with other Donations, to upwards of Three Thousand Pounds.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of August next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The following Address has been transmitted by the Earl of Radnor, Recorder of Old Sarum, to the Right Hon. Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal

Secretary of State for the Home Department, and presented by him to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty:

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to present our Congratulations to your Majesty on the late important and glorious Victory obtained by the British Fleet, under the Command of Earl Howe, over that of the French.

We regard it as of the most signal Advantage to this Country; and hope the Enemy will learn, as well from that as the many other great and successful Operations of your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land, that no Danger can daunt the Spirit of a Briton in the Defence of his King and Country; and that his Valour is only to be equalled by his Generosity to a vanquished Foe.

We feel it particularly incumbent, on this Occasion, to assure your Majesty of our inviolable Attachment to our present happy Constitution; and, as a Proof of our Esteem for the Blessings we enjoy under it, are determined, by every Means in our Power, to maintain and uphold the same, and to resist all Attempts whatever which may tend to disturb the Public Peace.

We deplore the sad Necessity of the present War; and well-knowing your Majesty's anxious Solitude for the Welfare and Prosperity of your People, anticipate what your Majesty's Feelings will be, when you shall have the supreme Happiness of informing them of the Return of Peace and Tranquillity to these Kingdoms.

We sincerely pray to the Great Disposer of all Events, that your Majesty's Councils, Fleets and Armies may proceed with the desired Success, to effect so great a Blessing; and that your Majesty may long live the revered Father of your People, happy in the Enjoyment of every domestic Comfort, and known to the World as the King of a brave and loyal Nation.
