The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen of the Town or Borough of Kingston upon Hull.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, beg Leave to offer our warmest Congratulations on the late splendid Victory obtained by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Earl Howe. Confiding in your Majesty's wonted Anxiety to promote the Welfare and Happiness of your People, we cannot conceal the flattering Hope we entertain that the decisive Superiority of the British Navy, evinced by this auspicious Event, together with the valuable and important Acquisition of Territory, derived from the Success of your Majesty's Arms in the East and West Indies, will prove the Means of accelerating an honourable and lasting Peace.

Sensible as we are of the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under a Form of Government which has so long been the Envy and Admiration of the World, we cannot refrain from gratefully acknowledging your Majesty's paternal Care, in the Means you have adopted to avert the Danger which threatened the Destruction of our admirable Constitution, and the utter Subversion of all Law and Order; to defend and to preserve Constitution in its genuine Purity, as established at the glorious Revolution, we beg Leave to assure your Majesty we will most zealously co-operate in such Measures as shall be dictated by the Wisdom and Energy which distinguish your Majesty's Councils.
