The Troops under my Command quitted their Camp at Sempst on the 8th at Night, and arrived the next Morning at this Position.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Address of the Guild or Brotherhood of the Trinity House of Kingston upon Hull.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Wardens, Elder Brethren and Assistants of the Corporation of the Trinity House of Kingston upon Hull, in Council assembled, humbly beg Leave to tender your Majesty our sincere Congratulations on the late signal Victory obtained by the British Fleet, under the Command of Admiral Earl Howe, over the Fleet of the French; a Victory as brilliant as the Annuals of the British Navy furnishes an Instance of.

And whilst we contemplate with sincere Satisfaction this and other glorious Successes, with which it has pleased the Divine Providence to bless your Majesty's Arms in both the Indies and the Mediterranean, we rejoice greatly in viewing the Ardour and Intrepidity with which the violent Conflict is sustained by your Majesty's Forces on the Continent; and, encouraged by the bright Example set by your Majesty, in not withholding those Branches of your Royal Family, who cannot but be most dear to your Majesty's Domestic Happiness, we are persuaded that your loyal Subjects cannot consider any Sacrifice on their Parts too great, in order to preserve the inestimable Blessings of our Constitution and Laws.

May the Great Disposer of Events continue to give Energy and Success to your Majesty's Arms, in the Reduction of Anarchy and Disorder Abroad, and in securing and preserving to us a firm and honourable Peace; and may the Life of your Majesty be long continued to us, that the Blessings of Liberty and Prosperity may, under your Majesty's mild Government, be transmitted to the latest Posterity.
