Naples, July 1.

The Mischief done by the Lava and Ashes, during the late Eruption of Mount Vesuvius, is very confiderable. The former has covered and totally destrayed above Five Thousand Acres of rich Vineyards and cultivated Land, and driven Seventeen Thousand Inhabitants out of the Town of Torre del Greco, most of the Houses there being either buried under the Lava, or so injured by it as to be rendered uninhabitable. The temporary Damage done to the Vineyards on the Somma Side of the Volcano, and for many Miles round it, by the prodigious Fall of Ashes (in some Places not less than Four Feet deep) is immense. It appears that not more than Fisteen Lives have been loft at Torre del Greco.
