To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty,
The Address of the Provincial Synod of Glenelg:
Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Glenelg, met in Synod, beg leave to approach your Throne, in all Humility, to express our sincere and heartfelt Attachment to your Royal Person and Government.

As public Teachers of Christianity we have Reason to acknowledge, that, under God, the Protection given by your Majesty to our Church, and to the Interests of Religion in general, affords the most consolatory Hope that our Labours will be crowned with Success:

While we view with Horror the direful Effects of Infidelity, and it's concomitant Evil, Anarchy, which have for some Time prevailed in a great neighbouring Nation, and peculiarly lament the Progress which these Principles are making in some Parts of your Majesty's Dominions, we exult in the Assurance, which we have it in our Power to give your Majesty, of the unshaken Loyalty to your illustrious House and Government, universal among the People committed to our Charge, comprehending an extensive District of this Part of the united Kingdom:

We trust your Majesty will have the Goodness to believe, that our most strenuous Efforts shall be uniformly directed to cherish and enliven these laudable Sentiments.

We congratulate our King and Country on the glorious Success of your Majesty's Arms; and we fervently pray, that the Lord of Hosts may continually go forth with your Fleets and Armies.

That the King of Kings may have under His Divine Protection your Royal Person, and that a King of your Royal Race may sway the Sceptre of these Realms to the End of Time, are the earnest Prayers of,

Naples, July 2.

The Mischief done by the Lava and Ashes, during
 the late Eruption of Mount Vesuvius, is very con-
 siderable. The former has covered and totally de-
 stroyed above Five Thousand Acres of rich Vineyards
 and cultivated Land, and driven Seventeen Thousand
 Inhabitants out of the Town of Torre del Greco,
 most of the Houses there being either buried under
 the Lava, or so injured by it as to be rendered un-
 inhabitable. The temporary Damage done to the
 Vineyards on the Somma Side of the Volcano, and
 for many Miles round it, by the prodigious Fall of
 Ashes (in some Places not less than Four Feet deep)
 is immense. It appears that not more than Fifteen
 Lives have been lost at Torre del Greco.
