Naples, July 8.

The late Eruption of Mount Vesuvius seems to have occasioned a sensible Alteration in the Season. For Three Weeks past scarcely a Day has passed without a violent Storm of Thunder, Lightning and heavy Rain, quite unusual here in the Month of July; and the Damage done to the fertile Lands at the Foot of the Mountain, by Torrents of Water mixed with the Puzzolane Ashes (and which immediately forms into a hard Cement) is inconceivable. In some Places the Soil is covered by it, not less than Four Feet in Thickness. The Volcano begins now to make it's Appearance from under the Clouds of Ashes and Smoke which had obscured it ever since the beginning of the Eruption. It has lost near One-third of the Height of it's Cone; and to make up for that Loss, several very considerable conical Hills, with deep and extensive Craters, (some not less than a Mile in Circumference) have been formed by the late Eruption, and are visible on it's Flanks towards the Sea Side.
