P R Ē S E N т, The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7HEREAS, in many of His Majefty's Vice-Admiralty Courts in the Welt Indies, Sentences of Condemnation have passed against Ships and Goods belonging to the Subjects of the United States of America; and whereas, from Ignorance of the Rules refpecting the Times of Appealing, or from Inability to find the Security required, or from other just and reasonable Impediments, the Claimants have been prevented from duly entering and proccuting their Appeals from the faid Sentences : And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty, on their Behalf, that they are defirous of entering and profecuting the fame; His Majefty is thereupon pleafed, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Parties shall be admitted to their respective Appeals, notwithstanding the ordinary Times for entering and profecuting the fame may have elapfed, provided the fame are entered and profecuted within a reafonable Time, to be approved by the Lords Commissioners of Appeals in Prize Caufes. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, 1792, to

promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should to enter themfelves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majefty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majefty was alfo gracioufly pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Perfon who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majefty's

Majefly's Ships or Veffels in the Ports or on the | henceforth inhabit within this Realm ; fuch Perfons Coafts of this Kingdom : And whereas the Time limited (by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty first Day of this inflant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service that the feid Bounties and Reward fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time dimited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant August, to the Thirty-first Day of October next, inclusive : Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

#### 'Whitehall, August 30.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of thefe Kingdoms, the fllow-ing Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Mujesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them : And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

#### Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and mall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and · imprifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaffador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from

shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devife or Purchafe, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Jultice of Peace, that any Perfon is endeavour-ing to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majetty's Dominions, for the Purpofes afore-faid, fuch Jultice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Juffice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witnefs, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the feid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions : And, if fuch Perfon shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law.' And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforefaid, he Thall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reafonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be profecuted in the Court of Jufficiary, or the Circuts there.

#### Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Perfon shall contract with, or endeavout to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cot-ton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufac-tures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Coun-try not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Affizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein fuch Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Beneh at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ireland ; the Perfon fo convicted shall, for every Ar-tificer contracted with, or seduced, forfert FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and fhall fuffer Imprifonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Cafe of a fubfequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Perfons fo again offending fhall forfeit, for every Perion contracted with of feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and fhall fuffer Imprifonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until fuch Forfeiture be paid.

If any Perfon in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other

other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures or any Part of fuch Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Weltminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. fhall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in fome of His Majesty's Warehouses, all fuch Tools or Utenfils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain ; and all Tools fo feized shall, after Condemnation, be pub. lickly fold to the beft Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Veffel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Veslel, he shall, for every fuch Offence, forfeitONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Perfons exporting the Tools; and, if the Veffel belongs to His Majefty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Empoyment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty. If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain,

or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and alfo forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majefly.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the fame.

# Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His prefent

Majesty. BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Perfons packing or putting on board any Veffel, not bound directly for fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Prefs, Paper, Utenfil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cot-ton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Perfons re-ceiving or being in Poffeffion of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the fame to Foreign Parts, and all Cuftom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Cafe of Tools and Utenfils ufed in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
