PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-fixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to oblige Ships " more effectually to perform their Quarantine, " and for the better preventing the Plague being 46 brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, " Alderney, Sark or Man," it is, among many other Things, enacted, That all Ships and Vefsels arriving, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles beforementioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in fuch Place and Places, for fuch Time, and in fuch

Manner, as has been or shall, from Time to Time, be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successfors, by His or Their Order or Orders, made in His or Their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until fuch Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes shall have respectively performed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no fuch Person, Goods or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by fuch Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by fuch Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the fame, and all Ships, Vessels, Boats and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation or published in the London Gazette as aforementioned. under fuch Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the faid Act.

And whereas Information has been received that a Fever, which is fimilar in it's Symptoms and Mortality to the malignant and contagious Fever,

of the Nature of the Plague, which prevailed last Year in Philadelphia, in the State of Penfylvania, has manifested itself at Baltimore in the State of Maryland; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, judging it probable that the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom from Baltimore, or fome other Port or Place in the faid State of Maryland, doth thereupon deem it expedient, for the Safety of the Publick Health, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandize now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Po t of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, from Baltimore or any other Port or Place in the faid State of Maryland, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for the Performance of Quarentine, and not before.

That the Places herein after named shall be and are, hereby appointed to be the Places wherein fuch Ships or Vessels (not having the Infection on board) Thall respectively perform Quarantine; that is to fay: All Ships or Vessels which are or shall, be bound to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standgate Creek; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all Ships or Vesfels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlifle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgwater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ive's, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Brittol or Bridgwater, or within the faid Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and

fuch Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks or other Places within the faid Ports of Plymouth, Exeter and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ive's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Mother Bank, near Portsmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland. comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston-Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrofe and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay; all Ships or Veffels which are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltoun, Oban, Rothfay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer and Wigtoun, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Invernels, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carsthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coast of the faid Island, called Belle Croute, or at some Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; and all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Islands of Guernfey, Sark or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall Porshute Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island shall be bound to the Port of Plymouth, except of Guernicy, called the Little Road, or at some

Quarantine on the Coast of England.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board fuch Ship or Vessel, fuch Pilot or other Person shall persorm Quarantine, in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the fame.

That all Goods, Wares and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked and aired, unless His Majesty shall think ft, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown or wrought, Linen, Cotton-Wool, Cotton-Yarn or manufactured, Wool raw of any wife wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of silk and Cotton, Kid-Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chefts, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brothes, Matting, and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes, so as aforefaid ! enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Forthight.

That all Goods imported by fuch Ships and Vessels respectively shall be aired in the following Places, that is to say: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimfby; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlifle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Ifle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgwater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek

Place herein before appointed for Performance of of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ive's, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, of to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the faid Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Briftol or Bridgwater, or within the faid Members or Creeks, shall be aired in King Road and Porshute-Pill; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except fuch Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members, or Creeks or other Places, within the faid Ports of Plymouth, Exeter and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall be aired in a Place called St. Ive's Pool. within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall be aired at a Place called the Motherbank, near Portimouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston-Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay; all fuch Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltoun, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtoun, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Lamlash, in the Island of Arran; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay, in the Murray Firth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Southwest Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carsthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island called Belle Croute, or at fuch Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships in which fuch Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine; and all such Goods as shall be imported to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall be aired in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at such Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships in which such Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Veffel, for the taking any Good not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchanbefore enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods. Seamen or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Cuffems.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine before directed he duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof,

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Of-See of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Mujesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the faid respective Isles of Jersey, Guernfey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash (except as in the faid Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant November: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for fome Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom. any Pot-Ash or Pearl Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituted, " An Act for in-" demnifying all Persons who have been concerned " in advising or carrying into Execution an Order " of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's " Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot Ashes " or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in con-" fequence of the same; for authorizing His Ma-" jesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying " Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for " making further Provisions relative thereto," But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newscundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majetly's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Sestlements on

the Coust of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, | Camb' & Hunt' or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PRINCE of WALES's Council.

Dispatch, of which the following is a Copy, has been received from His Royal Highness the Duke of York by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Majusty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Head Quarters at Arnheim, November 7, 1794.

On Tuesday Asternoon, as the Enemy had began to construct their Batteries, Count Walmoden made a Sortie, with a Party of the Troops, in Nimeguen, consisting of the 8th, 27th, 28th, 55th, 63d, and 78th Regiments of British Infantry, under the Command of Major-General De Burgh, and Two Battalions of Dutch, supported by the 7th and 15th British Light Dragoons, the Hanoverian Horse-Guards, One Squadron of the 2d Regiment of Hanoverian Horse, One Squadron of the 5th Regiment of Hanoverian Dragoons, One Squadron of the 10th Hanoverian Light Dragoons, and the Legion de Damas, in the Dutch Service.

This Sortie had every Success which could be expected from it. The Troops advanced to the Enemy's Trenches under a very severe Fire, and jumped into them without returning a Shot.

The Lois of the Enemy was almost entirely by the Bayonet, and amounted to above Five Hundred Men; that of the British and Hanoverians will be seen by the enclosed Return.

I am persuaded that the Gallantry of the Troops upon this Occasion will merit His Majesty's Approbation.

Count Walmoden speaks in the highest Terms of the Conduct of Major-General De Burgh, whose Wound, I am happy to find, is very slight.

This Sortie had the Effect of checking the Enemy's Operations till Yesterday Morning, when they opened Two Batteries upon the Bridge and One upon the Town. The Effect of the former, which very easily sunk One of the Boats, determined me to withdraw every Thing from the Troops posted in the Town, beyond what is barely necessary for it's Desence; and Lieutenant Popham of the Navy having repaired the Damage done to the Bridge, all the Artillery of the Reserve, with the British, Hanoverian and Hessian Battalions, marched out last Night, without any Inconvenience, leaving Pickets, under the Command of Major-General De Burgh, to the Amount of Twentysive Hundred Men; which, with the Dutch Forces, has been judged sufficient to maintain the Place till the

the Certainty of the Austrian Movements can be determined.
