as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or curities, Conditions, Regulations and Refirstions, Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the . Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permisfion shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose:

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ending the Twenty-second Day of November, 1794, that the General Average Price of Wheat in that Part of Great Britain called England. is above the Price at which Wheat, Wheat-Mea "and Flour are allowed by Law to be imported from : any Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the faid Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the faid Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order until the Third Day of June, 1795, or until fuch Time as His Majesty shall think fit to reveke this present Order, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, or load or lay on board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board of any Ship, Vestel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, any Wheat, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof.

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought hit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from England of any Foreign Wheat that shall have been imported, and shall be warehoused in Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in the faid Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwile (except as is hereinafter excepted) or carrying out, or the Exportation of Wheat, or the other Articles as aforefaid, from England, for any of the Purpofes mentioned in either of the faid Two Acts, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by faid Acts allowed, at fuch Times as Wheat or theother Articles before mentioned are prohibited to be exported, by reason of the Price of Wheat being at or above the Price mentioned in Table B. in the faid Act, passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, contained, Subject to the like Se-

Forfeitures and Penalties, as are in either of the faid Two Acts, or by any other Act now in Force, in any fuch Case, required and imposed; nor to prohibit the Exportation of such Wheat or other Arlicles as aforefaid, which shall have been entered Outwards, and shall have been actually shipped or laden on board, or to much thereof, expressed in such Entry, as shall have been so shipped or laden on board, at the Time of the Date of this present Order, in the same Manner as if this Prohibition to export had not been made.

Provided, nevertheless, that any luch Wheat or other Articles as aforefaid shall not be permitted to be carried Coasswife, or to be otherwise carried from any Port from which the Exportation thereof is not, at the Time of shipping the same, allowed by Law, and be landed and unfhipped at any other Port in Great Britain from which the fame may then be legally exported.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforcfaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order until the Third Day of June, 1795, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Wheat, Wheat-Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the faid Table marked E. and no other.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any

Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence
