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*Admiralty-Office, January 7, 1795.*

A Letter was this Day received from Captain Newcome, of His Majesty's Ship the Orpheus, to Mr. Stephens, Secretary of the Admiralty, dated in Madras Road, the 25th of July, 1794, of which the following is an Extract.

ON the 5th of May, Captain Osborne, of the Centurion, made the Signal for a Sail, and Captain Pakenham, of the Resistance, for seeing Two; Round Island bearing South-West by West, Six or Seven Leagues. I lay-to till the strange Sails ran down so near to us that we could lay up for them; I then made the Signal to chase: At Forty-five Minutes past Eleven I got near enough to fire a Shot at the Ship; at Fifty-five Minutes past Eleven I brought him to Action, and by a little after Twelve I got close upon his Starboard Quarter, where we kept, till Five Minutes past One, so very close, that at Times I expected to be on Board; and at that Time the Enemy struck, the Centurion and Resistance about Three Miles astern, under a great Press of Sail, coming up. She proves to be a French Frigate, called La Duguaytrouin, of Thirty-four Guns, and formerly the Princess Royal East-Indiaman, fitted out at the Isle of France, with Twenty-six Eighteen-Pounders, Two Nine-Pounders, and Six Four-Pounders, having Four Hundred and Three Men on Board. I cannot say too much in Praise of the steady, cool, and brave Conduct of the Officers, Seamen, and Marines of His Majesty's Ship Orpheus. Our Loss is very considerable, considering the superior Force of the Enemy: Mr. Singleton, Midshipman, killed; Mr. Scines, Mate, badly wounded in his Left Hand; and Eight Seamen slightly. The Enemy's Loss was Twenty-one killed and Sixty wounded.

I must beg Leave to recommend to their Lordships Notice Lieutenants Broughton and Goate, also Mr. Staines, who commanded the Guns in the Absence of Lieutenant Hodgskin, who was unfortunately on Board the Danish Ship, with One Mate, One Midshipman, and Twenty Seamen. At the Time the Ship struck we were about Two Leagues from the Passage between Fiat Island and Coin au Mire, and One League from the Shore; the other Sail, a

small Brig, made her Escape through the Channel, and got safe into Port Louis.

Finding the Bowspirit shot through and through, and Three of the Knees of the Head entirely cut away, the distressed State of the Duguaytrouin, from Sickness and Want of Water, obliged me to seek the first Port; and on the 16th of May I anchored with His Majesty's Ships at Mahé, one of the Sechelle Islands. Finding the French had formed a Settlement, and no Refreshments to be procured, I summoned the Place to surrender, and sent Lieutenant Goate, with Lieutenant Matthews and a Party of Marines, and took Possession of it the next Day for His Britannick Majesty. Not thinking it of sufficient Consequence to leave any Force, I quitted the Place, having taken the Republican Flag and all the Military and Naval Stores, also the Brig Le Olivete, leaving the Implements of Agriculture, for building Houses, &c. for the Use of the poor Inhabitants.

From the very sickly State of many of the French Prisoners, and almost a Certainty of their dying if embarked to proceed to Madras, I was induced, from Motives of Humanity, to leave behind several Officers and Men, having written to Mr. Malartie, Governor of the Isle of France, to request he would release the same Number of our Prisoners, and of the same Rank as those that I had left at Mahé; about One Hundred and Forty more deserted and got into the Woods. The 28th I made the Resistance's Signal to chase, and she brought in the Deux Andres, from Mozambique, loaded with Four Hundred and Eight Slaves. The 1st of June I sailed with His Majesty's Ships and Prizes, and on the 18th anchored at Madras.

*Dublin-Castle, January 4, 1795.*

The Earl Fitzwilliam, who embarked at Holyhead at Eight o'Clock Yesterday Evening, arrived safe in the Harbour of Balbrigen about One o'Clock this Day. His Lordship, on his Arrival in Dublin, was received by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs and Commons of the City of Dublin. The Infantry in the Garrison lined the Streets through which his Lordship, attended by a Squadron of Dragoon Guards, proceeded



proceeded to the Castle; and upon his Arrival there, at Seven o'Clock, was introduced in Form to his Excellency the Earl of Westmorland, who received him, sitting under the Canopy of State, in the Presence Chamber; from whence a Procession was made, in the usual State, to the Council Chamber. The Council sitting, his Lordship's Commission was read, and the Oaths being administered to him, his Excellency was invested with the Collar of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and received the Sword of State from Lord Westmorland. The Great Guns in His Majesty's Phoenix Park were then fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty. His Excellency afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon his safe Arrival and taking upon him the Government of this Kingdom.

ner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Visqualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
